THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Fair Housing Rights

Speaker: Liz Keegan *Reporter: Jackie Farrar* The Fair Housing Center of West Michigan was founded in 1980 as a private, non-profit organization (501c3), out of a combined grassroots effort to desegregate schools and integrate neighborhoods. Their mission is to prevent and eliminate illegal housing discrimination, to ensure equal housing opportunity, and to promote inclusive communities.

Fair housing is the right to choose housing free from unlawful discrimination based on protected classes under Federal, State, and Local Fair Housing Laws. Fair Housing provides education & outreach, research & systemic investigations, complaint assistance, and advocacy. Fair housing does not have attorneys on staff or offer legal advice, services are free, and discrimination can be reported anonymously.

Housing Discrimination

 Refusal to sell/rent after making a bona fide offer based on a protected class, otherwise make unavailable or deny

- Discrimination in the terms, conditions or privileges of sale or rental of a dwelling
- Make, print, or publish a notice or statement that indicates a discriminatory preference
- Falsely telling someone a dwelling is not for sale or rent
- Steering people toward or away from particular buildings, floors, neighborhoods, etc.

Possible Discrimination

- Requiring residents to have a job or work a certain number of hours
- Rejecting an application because of a "no felonies" policy
- Making rules that only apply to kids or charging extra for kids
- Only renting to adults or single mothers
- Putting people into certain buildings because of age, gender, or children

• Experiencing sexual harassment by a landlord or maintenance person

Housing

Modifications/Accommodations for individuals with Disabilities

- Reasonable modifications are a structural or other physical change to the unit or housing structure to provide a person with a disability physical access. These may include widening doorways, installing grab bars, lowering kitchen cabinets, adjusting heights on outlets or thermostats, and altering a walkway
- Reasonable accommodations are a change in any rule, policy, procedure, or service if the changes are needed for a person with a disability to have equal access and enjoyment of their housing. These may include waiving a "no pet" policy, allowing a live-in aide, or assigning accessible parking

Request for services can be in writing, in person, over the phone, through a friend, family member, or caregiver, and any time. Requests will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis and The Fair Housing Center of West Michigan is here to help!
