Purple Pinkie Project



As detailed in last week's RIM, the Purple Pinkie Project is a push for additional contributions to the End Polio Now campaign which has been underway since the 1980s. We heard from Interact members **Ashton Ross** and **McKenna Weiler** who helped collect more than \$530 from members during Thursday's luncheon.



Combined with \$110 from Thursday's ReWine meeting, and a doubling by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, that means more than \$1,900 to help eradicate polio (which is still an ongoing medical concern especially in Pakistan and Afghanistan).

Food Trucks

Last Wednesday, in damp but relatively mild weather, more than a dozen Rotarians and friends coordinated a very successful food truck at Temple Methodist Church in Muskegon Heights with the help of Muskegon Cooperating Churches and Feeding America-West Michigan.



We dodged the worst of the rainy weather and with the help of 19 volunteers (13 Rotarians, 5 spouses/significant others, Mona Shores Interactor Bailee McMillan) did a FABULOUS job of distributing 7,767lbs of fresh food – including 150 - 20 pound frozen turkeys to 123 drive thru vehicles and about a dozen walk-thru recipients representing more than 325 area households. With so many great helping hands available, we finished the actual food distribution in record time in little more than an hour.

Committee Palooza #1

Speakers: A cast of thousands (OK eight awesome Rotarians)
RIM Reporter: Roger Morgenstern



As **President Jason** told us as we kicked off the meeting, we were making Rotary history with the FIRST EVER Committee Palooza, all beautifully choreographed by **Mike Vogas** in a 20-minute video featuring two representatives from four committees. You can view the video here—click here. And this week was just the tip of the Palooza iceberg...# 2 is coming in February, Jason promised.

The four committees featured this week were Community Grants, Program, Life Leadership and last, but **certainly** not least in this reporter's opinion, the RIM Committee.



Arn Boezaart and **Nancy Crandall** provided background on the types of activities Community Grants has funded



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over the years, from pavers in Hackley Park to food trucks the last two years, including this week's successful distribution reported elsewhere in this RIM. The Club's endowment fund held at the Community Foundation for Muskegon County, created in 1991 with the Club's sale of Camp Emory, has allowed for more than \$472,000 in grants to benefit the community.



Week after week, our Club is treated to amazing programs, but it doesn't happen without a lot of work from the Program Committee. Members Kris Collee and Tim Arter explained how the committee seeks to have speakers and/or panels of speakers, to bring awareness to both important community issues but also Rotary International and our Avenues of Service. An important aspect in selecting programs is how the topic touches on diversity, equity and inclusion. COVID-19 has provided unique challenges and opportunities with first all Zoom and now hybrid club meetings. While the production of these meetings (thank you Mike Vogas!) is a lot more involved, allowing remote and inperson options has led to more Club engagement for those unable to make an entire meeting because of their schedule or difficulty in getting to meetings for mobility or other medical or personal reasons.





The Life Leadership Committee focuses on the future by developing tomorrow's leaders, **Brianna Scott** and **John Noling** explained. The major task of the committee is recruiting and interviewing more than a dozen high school students from across Muskegon County to attend the RI District's annual Life Leadership Conference. The goal is to build future leaders to keep moving our community forward.



Finally, the RIM Committee produces the weekly Rotary In Motion (RIM) newsletter. Co-Editors **Lori Weiler** and **Susan Besterman** said such a Herculean task is only accomplished by a reliable stable of nearly a dozen volunteer reporters.



Both Lori and Susan agreed "We don't know how <u>Bill Johanson</u> did this single-handedly" in the early years, immediately after his retirement from Consumers Energy in mid 2003. As *this* RIM reporter can attest (as Bill's "Grasshopper" protégé at Consumers Energy and Rotary), he worked with the Club's leadership to transform a photocopied and mailed single-page newsletter into a clever, witty, fun-to-read online publication which saved the club money (no postage) and conveyed to

members and others in the community all the good work Rotary was doing. Lori, who joined the Club in 2017, was first asked by Bill to be a reporter and in time, for she and Susan to become co-editors. Says Lori: "He's so charming, how can you tell him no?" This reporter heartily agrees and suggests that Bill be hereafter referred to as RIM's Founder and Editor Emeritus.

Many thanks to these four committees and all Rotarians who work to make our Club a community leader by embodying Service Above Self. Stay tuned for Committee Palooza # 2 early next year!

The Lakeshore honored our local veterans in a HUGE way. As a celebration of United Way and our local heroes, Veterans Day parades took place down Main Street in Fremont, and Western Avenue in Muskegon. Thousands gathered to pay tribute to those who served. The Heroes United festival was a special event put on by a large group of partners led by Campaign Chair, Tom Schultz; Leadership Chair, Jim Tyler; UW Volunteer & Event Assistant, Emma Coppock; Director of Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency, Zaneta Adams, and several community committee volunteers.

With over 77 agencies represented, the Veterans Day parades highlighted local veteran organizations, first responders, nonprofit agencies, local bands, and the Budweiser Clydesdales! Following the Muskegon parade, a concert was hosted in the Mercy Health Arena featuring West Side Soul Surfers and Brena.

During the concert, Congressman Huizenga, Senator Bumstead, Representative Sabo, and Muskegon County Commissioner Chairman Bob Scolnik, along with Zaneta Adams presented an award to 3 outstanding veterans:

Lawrence Dixon proudly served our country in the 160th Army Infantry Regiment from February 14, 1952 to November 13, 1953 during the Korean War where he was wounded in Mundong South Korea, and was awarded a Purple Heart. He celebrated his 90th birthday during the festival!

Gerrit Veldman is a 100-year-old veteran who served in WWII. During his years of service, he earned a Purple Heart, Bronze Star, Combat Infantry Badge, Victory Medal, Good Conduct, and European-African-Middle Eastern with 6 campaign stars

Jack Sheehan is a 100-year-old Veteran who courageously flew B-26 Bombers over Germany in WWII. He served as the Captain in the Army Air Corps which later became known as the Air Force.


