an impressive introduction. Dr. Deborah VanDuinen is the Associate Professor of Education at Hope College and the founding director of Big Read Lakeshore. She joined the Hope College faculty in 2010 and teaches in the areas of English education, disciplinary literacy, young adult literature and adolescent literacy. Dr. VanDuinen is also an award-

winning author who recently published the book Widening the Lens: Integrating Multiple Approaches to Support Adolescent Literacy (Teachers College Press, 2024).

Dr. VanDuinen began the program presentation with a



big overview of the Big Read Lakeshore program. Designed to create and foster a culture where "reading matters", the 'Big Read' brings community together every October and November around one book (per age group). Numerous events are held in partnership with libraries, schools, businesses, museums, art centers, etc. throughout Ottawa, Allegan and Muskegon counties. The overarching objective is for readers to explore the themes of the book as a springboard to share, learn and listen to each other. This year's program will include over 150 events in collaboration with over 75 partners to reach over 20,000 readers. That's a BIG community impact!


Dr. VanDuinen shared that the 2024 Big Read Lakeshore will feature the 1925 novel "The Great Gatsby," by F. Scott Fitzgerald. She announced that the Middle Read Lakeshore



(for upper-elementary and junior high grades) will feature "Mexikid: A Graphic Memoir," by Pedro Martin and highlighted that the book was recommended by one of the guests in the audience today. The book is a graphic novel that



shares the author's childhood memory of a family road trip to Mexico, during which he learns more about his own Mexican identity.



Then Dr. VanDuinen described the term "graphic novel" by first explaining what it is not. Graphic novel is not a genre. It is not a comic book. It is not subpar literature. Nor is it just for reluctant readers. "Graphic novels are stories told in words, images and in the ways they interact (think film)," VanDuinen expressed. In conclusion, Dr. Deborah VanDuinen encouraged Rotarians to get involved by reading the book, attending events, interacting with others, and promoting positive changes in response to the knowledge gained.





No-Show Charge Revision

Submitted by **President Tim Arter** Some Background:

- Muskegon Rotarians have raised concerns with the current policy of charging members a "No-Show Fee" who have signed up for a weekly meeting but were unable to attend.
- In today's world, especially younger members who have many business and family responsibilities and cannot always predict in advance their availability to attend Thursday noon meetings.
- 3. To accommodate this scheduling reality, this past Tuesday the Board of Directors revised the meal charge policy for the benefit of members.

Processes which are NOT changing:

- Members will still use Sign-Up Genius to register for luncheons by the Monday immediately prior to the luncheon.
- 2. If members need to cancel their registration, they can still contact Kim Boersema to cancel.
- 3. Those members who missed the Monday signup deadline can still contact Kim to be put on a wait list to fill a cancellation.
- Kim will do her best to replace a cancelled registration with another member who wishes to attend the luncheon.
- Through these processes and a lot of hard work by Kim, we have significantly reduced the number of meal charges for those who need to cancel.

Here is what has changed for the benefit of members:

In addition to exiting processes already in place to alleviate meal charges, here is what is changing:

- Every member will be able to have one "No-Show" charge cancelled per quarter.
- 2. Members should consider the signup process for luncheon meetings as reserving a meal.
- 3. Rotarians who need more flexibility in their schedules:
 - a. Still have the ability to participate in the weekly meetings via Zoom, or
 - b. There will be chairs set up at the back of the meeting location to accommodate them.
 They are invited to have water or coffee and fully participate in the meeting.
