COVID-19 Updates

Kathy Moore - as of late Monday, our numbers are gradually inclining. However, our positivity rate is continuing to decline--we are now at a 2.5% or slightly below. This could be just an indication of more testing capacity. Early on it was really hard to get a test and required a physician referral; most of those referred were having symptoms. That resulted in a higher than 10% rate.

Cases as of late Monday were 1,635 active with 72 Covid deaths. Stats show 43% male and 56% female. We are seeing a resurgence in cases in long-term care and assisted living.

As of today, Mercy Health has 19 inpatients and as of 10/13 only one was on a ventilator. The gradual increase is also happening across the state

Where to get tested? Christ Temple Church, 412 E Sherman Blvd., has testing available for any reason. It is recommended to call ahead so that you don't have to wait. Hours are Mondays & Tuesdays 10am-5pm, Thursdays noon-7 pm.

Mercy Health has also partnered to test individuals who may have been exposed to a positive confirmed case. The Mercy at the Lakes site will take referrals from a physician or Public Health.

This Week's Program: Andy O'Riley

Lisa Tyler introduced the "Self-Declared Unofficial Mayor of Facebook" himself, Andy O'Riley, with a very consolidated summary of this remarkable guy's career and his impact on Muskegon.



A native of Sparta, Andy charged into his future just 5 months after graduating from high school. After interning for a while, he found himself second in command. When Andy relocated to Muskegon 20 years ago he was asked to replace the morning guy who was going to be fired. Andy said, "no." That person was important to Muskegon and needed to stay on. He went on to help make that radio station #1 in the market in two years with very little resources.

After taking a year off to do a stint with Nascar, he returned and eventually started the <u>Positively</u> <u>Muskegon Blog</u> with a financed GoPro

and limited resources. His motivation arose from the moral situation he faced when a spaghetti fundraiser for a grandmother with cancer wouldn't be published on the radio without payment. Andy couldn't see that happening.

Armed with his new GoPro, Andy found himself with Andrea Rosema and four of her friends in Wolf Lake as she was in her freezing December garage-converted-to-she-shed putting on the biggest event she's ever done: cookies, soldier letters, wrapping presents, etc. He found he needed to give her an advertising tool with a relevant platform she wouldn't find anywhere else. He decided to take the Positively Muskegon Blog and start to find those stories and give those people the platform so they can say "look what I did," and somebody will notice and share all over social media.

"Radio is where we gather a town hall every morning."

As Positively Muskegon grew to 350,000 page views, they found they didn't want to damage the presence. They wanted a platform for "the little guy" who does something great, so they started Muskegon Channel www.muskegonchannel.com; more of the same vibe, but daily and weekly programs, cooking, exercise, and today they are working on a Paranormal Muskegon episode.

For 20 years Andy has gone to schools to talk about broadcasting. He speaks to grades 8th on up and asks, "when you hear or see something about Muskegon on the news, what is it?" It's always the same answer: "somebody got shot."

As we all work to rebuild and reform and reshape the way we're seen, that perception sets their mindset that someday they're going to get out of here. That's the erosion of our future and we have to start to change the way that is seen.

The betrayal of us has been so negative for so long Andy figured somebody had to start standing up. Big media only comes out when somebody gets shot and that is not doing Muskegon any favors. They started to do more and were challenged with how to get the message further out.

They started using things like YouTube, from there a different video server, then Roku and Amazon Fire. Soon folks were watching on big screens and it's available all over the world.

From there they took over a project called Skeetown Stereo and turned it into Muskegon Channel Radio and put it all on a phone app.

Meanwhile, Andy looked out into the future and supposed that someday Muskegon would have some big emergency; not that he wished for it, but realistically knew it would just happen and they would be able to show what having willful media means.

And then it did—a pandemic hit. Suddenly, everything was cancelled; but fortunately, through their growth they had everything in place. Public Health called and said "can you help?" They said 'absolutely' and in a moment's notice had all their live equipment ready to go. They got the word out across the internet, tv, radio, in an instant when the pandemic shutdown first started.

Andy started with a GoPro. Now there are multiple cameras, live stream on tv instantly, and an operator can be there in 5 minutes.

Today, video views from Muskegon Channel reach 455,000, Channel 96 has 80,000 all-time views and now local high school football, Mona Shores and Muskegon, equate to 76,000 of those. They tell sponsors, "your banner in the side of a stadium is wonderful, but now we've got 76,000 people watching the games as well as a national audience." The goal long term is taking two-hour blocks with programs and have them directly benefit the schools. Inside those two hours, any ad dollars generated go back to the schools.

The future for programming on Channel 96 is community access to a program anybody can get on. Produce your own program and they'll help you get it on the air. The most important thing for all of us is to know what's going on here in town. We are big enough support a local access channel. We have the technology and knowhow.
