This week's program: World Polio Day

Rotary members and their partners in service come together each World Polio Day on October 24 to recognize progress in the fight to end the disease. World Polio Day was established by Rotary International to commemorate the birth of Jonas Salk, who led the first team to develop a vaccine against poliomyelitis. Use of this inactivated poliovirus vaccine and subsequent widespread use of the oral poliovirus vaccine developed by Albert Sabin led to establishment of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988. Since then, GPEI has reduced polio worldwide by 99.9 percent.

World Polio Day is an annual observance when members of Rotary International, along with public health advocates and individuals committed to a poliofree world, convene to commemorate their accomplishments in the global campaign against polio. This day also provides a platform for deliberation on the requisite measures to permanently eliminate polio from the face of the Earth.



Dave Alexander introduced our program today. Rotary members have contributed

2.5 billion dollars and have vaccinated millions of children worldwide. Rotary is a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. There are only 12 cases in Afghanistan and Pakistan. If we stopped our efforts today, we run the risk of polio returning to quickly infect 10,000 children and 200, 000 in 10 years. There are two vaccines available: a pill or an injection. Jonas Salk developed the first injectable vaccine. He gave away all of the patent rights. Vaccine testing was completed on his own family and in Grand Rapids. GPEI includes Rotary, UNICEF, US Center for Disease Control, WHO and the Gates Foundation and governments around the world. Vaccination of children is the only way to curb the spread of polio.

We need to continue to raise funds to build awareness, fundraising, sponsoring of events, presentations, volunteer or donate to continue eradication efforts. Rotary uses funds to purchase vaccines and administer them to children. They also conduct regular surveillance to detect the disease and to raise awareness of the

Polio is a highly infectious disease transmitted ingesting contaminated water (fecal oral transmission). There is no cure for polio.



effectiveness of vaccines. We are this close to eradication is Rotary's top philanthropic plan of action. Rotary has promised the children of the world that we will eliminate this hideous virus. We need to continue to donate money to the Polio Plus Foundation.

Tom Palmer and **Walter Mrotz** also shared testimonials on their personal experiences with Polio.



Tom shared that both of his older sisters contracted polio as children. Both of his sisters have physical impairments that keep them from walking without assistive devices and are short in stature due to effects of polio. Tom shared that both of his sisters are very tough, and Tom shared that they obtained their toughness from their mother. Tom shared that she was his sisters' champion. Tom views his sisters as heroes. Every day presents challenges for his siblings, but they continue to fight and persevere. Tom challenged us to be "that" club.



Walter also shared that he contracted polio at the age of 1. It took 3 additional years before he could walk, and he wore steel and leather braces to keep his legs straight. Walter noted pain in his legs and back due to the disease. Walter shared that he tried very hard to ignore the pain, doing his level best to compete with his peers during hiking adventures during Boy Scouts. Walter credits his mother and her perseverance. He shared how his mother often thought that she hated him for all the things she did to help him when he was younger. He shared that he remembers very little of those things, just her love and affection for him. Walter stays very active biking and walking around the world. Walter noted that polio affects the nerves that connect to our muscles and continues to suffer pain from postpolio syndrome.

Bob Scolnik was pleased to present **Karen Buie Jenkins** with a Paul Harris Fellow Award. Fellow Rotarian **Kristi Nagengast**, who had received the right to name a Paul Harris Fellow, asked Bob to do the formal presentation because the honoree is a long-time friend. Karen was born in Muskegon Heights. Bob knew both of her parents, George and Mildred Washington.

Karen has lived a tremendously blessed life and has accomplished a great deal in her life. She attended Muskegon Catholic Central, then graduated from Muskegon Community College and graduated from Michigan State University with a degree is Criminal Justice. She is married to Dr. Larry Jenkins, the love of her life, and has three sons, David, Aaron, and Joshua and has four grandchildren.

Karen was crowned Mrs. Michigan in 1999 and went on to become the third runner-up in the Mrs. International Pageant. She was also the first runner-up in the Mrs. America Pageant in 2002. Karen has had a long spanning career in public service. She worked for the State of Michigan as a Juvenile Probation Officer, for the Department of Human Services as a Children's Protective Services Officer, a Bail Review Officer, a Strate Probations Officer and later as a Human Resources Analyst. She was Superintendent of the Way Point Charter School. She was also elected to the City of Muskegon City Commission, serving as Vice-Mayor. She later successfully ran for Muskegon County Clerk where she served from 2002 through 2009. She was defeated in the next election and became a flight attendant for American Airlines for 11 years, commuting to Texas from Muskegon and flew throughout the world. On May 1, 2023, she was reappointed Muskegon County Clerk after a request by the early retirement of Nancy Waters...the individual who had defeated Karen earlier...and a unanimous vote of all the Muskegon County Judges. Karen is currently running for reelection as County Clerk. She recently received a national award from Tyler Technologies for her innovative program of providing free birth certificates to the indigent community through partnerships with the Muskegon Rescue Mission, The Exit Program, Goodwill Industries and Muskegon Family Care. Karen was recognized by the Michigan Secretary of State for her County Clerk's Election Office providing a consolidated early voting site for Muskegon County, which saved over 1.4 million dollars for the County. Karen Buie Jenkins, despite a remarkably busy life, has found time to serve on numerous non-profit boards. She has served on the Boards of the Muskegon Rescue Mission, Habitat for Humanity, the Muskegon County Museum, and The Michigan County Clerks Association. The one thing about her that Bob is most proud of, is when she asked me to give her away at her wedding to Larry Jenkins on May 26, 2007. Congratulations, Karen!



Youth Exchange Auction Results & More Donations Needed



No-Show Charge Revision

Submitted by **President Tim Arter** <u>Some Background:</u>

- Muskegon Rotarians have raised concerns with the current policy of charging members a "No-Show Fee" who have signed up for a weekly meeting but were unable to attend.
- In today's world, especially younger members who have many business and family responsibilities and cannot always predict in advance their availability to attend Thursday noon meetings.
- To accommodate this scheduling reality, this past Tuesday the Board of Directors revised the meal charge policy for the benefit of members.

Processes which are NOT changing:

- Members will still use Sign-Up Genius to register for luncheons by the Monday immediately prior to the luncheon.
- 2. If members need to cancel their registration, they can still contact Kim Boersema to cancel.
- Those members who missed the Monday signup deadline can still contact Kim to be put on a wait list to fill a cancellation.
- Kim will do her best to replace a cancelled registration with another member who wishes to attend the luncheon.
- Through these processes and a lot of hard work by Kim, we have significantly reduced the number of meal charges for those who need to cancel.

Here is what has changed for the benefit of members:

In addition to exiting processes already in place to alleviate meal charges, here is what is changing:

- Every member will be able to have one "No-Show" charge cancelled per quarter.
- 2. Members should consider the signup process for luncheon meetings as reserving a meal.
- 3. Rotarians who need more flexibility in their schedules:
 - a. Still have the ability to participate in the weekly meetings via Zoom, or
 - b. There will be chairs set up at the back of the meeting location to accommodate them.
 They are invited to have water or coffee and fully participate in the meeting.
