

This week's program: Hispanic Heritage Month

Contessa Alexander, as cochair of our DEI Committee, said in recognition of the recently completed Hispanic Heritage Month (Sept. 15-Oct. 15) we're hearing from two organizations doing outstanding work in our community, Centro de Esperanza and Latinos Working for the Future.

Among her many community

commitments, Angelita Valdez serves as board President and co-founder of Centro de Esperaza.



CENTRO DE Esperanza



She said this relatively new nonprofit organization's goal "is to break down obstacles and boost mental health support by utilizing strong referral programs and forming meaningful partnerships with local organizations. We are at the forefront of providing language services, dedicated to meeting the varied needs of the Muskegon community through

our broad range of services."

The organization is based on four Pillars:

- Providing a central location hosting specialists that provide direct contacts to supportive services. Reducing barriers of language access through interpretation and language services. Fostering a fun community that engages our senior population with social opportunities. Focusing on building
 - relationships between teens and parents, while encouraging healthy communication.

Valdez said the organization helps provide translation and interpretive services for individuals, businesses and local governments. She said Hispanic individuals come from as many as 20 different countries. The Cento de Esperaza provides language assistance in Spanish, Haitian Creole and French. She said Centro de Esperaza "is not trying to reinvent the wheel, but rather supporting other organizations in our community."

The other organization we learned more about, Latinos Working for the Future, has been around since 1991 and was founded by the late Connie Navarro, a well-known community leader who was honored by our Club as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Ana Olson, treasurer of Latinos Working for the Future, said the organization's mission is to unify

and organize the community of Muskegon County by celebrating our culture, and



increasing interest in our history, while preserving and honoring Latino Heritage.

To help fulfill this mission, Latinos Working for the Future has an annual fundraiser, the Muskegon County Latino Festival, downtown in Hackley Park. Olson said proceeds from the festival help provide grants to local Latino small businesses, entrepreneurs and youth.

"We want to have a space where people can feel welcome and express their individuality and their culture," said Olson, who has been treasurer since 2018.

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In addition, the group provides scholarships available for Muskegon County Latino youth who are graduating from high school and are enrolled in a higher education program, such as colleges, universities and trade centers.

Grants and Scholarships: LWFTF provides grants to local Latino small businesses and entrepreneurs. In addition, we provide scholarships available for Muskegon County Latino youth who are graduating from high school and are enrolled in a higher education program, such as, college, universities, and trade centers.



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In October, the organization hosted its first Latino Youth Conference at Muskegon Community College. Olson said "we were blown away" with the response from the Muskegon and Ottawa County areas. They even had to turn away some high school seniors when they hit their 250-person capacity.

Jon Gale introduced our newest Paul Harris Fellow with the following: I am proud to be able to announce the next Paul Harris Award recipient. This person has dedicated his life to public service. He truly fits the Rotary motto of Service above self. He is a Grand Valley State University graduate and attended the finest police academy in the state. Go Lakers. His extended education experience includes a list of supervision certifications from Northwestern University, Michigan State University, Michigan Sheriffs Association, and the FBI National Academy. He is even a certified firefighter. I think most can already figure out who I am talking about. He has received countless awards from state and national organizations including dozens of Traffic Awards including one called "Traffic is my Life award" and several awards from the Governor. There are over 20 of them. He is considered an expert in traffic safety in which he has served many years on the Governors Traffic Safety Committee. He has also spoken as an expert at many traffic safety conferences, tactical conferences, and leadership courses both statewide and nationally. He has also taught courses in other countries such as Kuwait and

Qatar. His professional affiliations are numerous, but I will highlight a few; he is the current President of the Michigan Sheriffs Association, the State of Michigan school grant committee, Pioneer Resources board of directors, president of the North Muskegon School board, he held many chair positions with Drug-Free Muskegon and was the co-founder of both the Muskegon Area Medical disposal program and the Muskegon Alcohol Liability program.

As our current Sheriff, he has led his police department and corrections department with the finest integrity and professionalism. He is the only person in this room who has had a gun to his head at the same time as me and the only person in this room who entered a building without hesitation with me during an active shooter situation. This is a person I would always trust to have my back and I would have his.

Mona Shores Middle School Interact elects first slate of club officers


