## THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Mission for Area People

Program presenter Kristen Turgeon from Mission for Area People (MAP)

The Mission for Area people (previously known as MWP) is a faith-based nonprofit organization that cares about the community. Their goal is to provide Muskegon County residents with resources to meet basic needs, promote dignity & respect, and improve quality of life. The Mission for Area People has been providing assistance to Muskegon County Residents for 57 years.

ALICE is an acronym for **A**sset Limited, Income **C**onstrained, **E**mployed. The ALICE threshold are households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county. Many Muskegon County households struggle with the cost of household essentials (housing, childcare, food, transportation, health care, and basic smartphone plan)

## Muskegon County ALICE Statistics

- 65% of the City of Muskegon are ALICE Households.
- 36% of Children are living in Poverty.
- 43% of Muskegon County are ALICE Households.
- 70% of the City of Muskegon Heights are ALICE Households.
- 62% are Countywide eligible for free & reduced school meals.

# Assistance provided in 2022

#### Transportation

• 95 individuals served (value of assistance \$31,000.00)

#### Medical & Dental Fund

• 78 individuals serviced (average \$318.00 per client)

#### Rental & Utility Assistance

• 314 individuals served (average \$4,673.00 per family)

#### Healthy Choice Food & Personal Needs Pantry

• 1,353 individuals served (\$65.00 average per person)



#### **Clothing Pantry**

• 586 people serviced (\$30.00 average received per visit)

#### Teen Town Christmas Program

• 142 Teens services (\$100.00 average per teen - ages 15-18)

### New Programs in 2023

Happy Feet Back- to- School Program

• 165 low-income families or families facing poverty served (\$55.00 average spent on shoes) The Children were empowered by choice from the Shoe Carnival

#### New Start Daycare Financial Assistance

- Provides financial daycare assistance to newly employed individuals/families facing unexpected financial hardships.
- Ensures families have the ability to accept new employment or keep daycare slots during statewide daycare shortage.
- This program is made possible by a grant from the Greater Muskegon Service League's Women and Children's Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County.

## Interact Insider

MHS Interact Club President Zuri LaBrenz wrote an essay about her experience in El Salvador.

Dear El Salvador,

The dark clouds began to roll in, the moon shining brighter than any star. It was midnight as the cold air began to hit my bare arms. Waiting for the bus; stuck in the blue polos everyone had to wear. The bright headlights came into view. I remember my hands sweating. My anxiety began to build up as I began doubting myself. My thoughts are a jumbled mess "Away from home- farther than I've gone before.. What would happen to everyone while I was gone? What would happen to me?"



My leg was shaking uncontrollably, the vibrations of the turbulence scaring me more. I'm here in El Salvador. The sun is blazing down on my skin, I already feel like it's burning off. The trees are a mix of what you'd find in Michigan and California. It smells weird; fresh and a bit of musk. But little did I know, the next day would change my view on everything. The numbers on my phone change from 9:45 to 9:46 and the bus comes to a stop. It was time to get to work. My heart swells for the people sleeping on the side of the roads and digging through the garbage just for some food. We got to the site and I felt as if my heart dropped. People and animals everywhere. Some dirty, some skinny, and some begging for even a crumb of food. I couldn't understand them the best, but I

understood them and I felt for them. The trip I was anxious for; it actually scared me. Once we started the day, sweat dripped down my body. The bricks are heavy. My muscles feel like they're being pulled apart. Kids voices screaming, running, and tagging each other. "MIKA!!" Eliva screamed as she tagged me. I set the brick down and started to chase her. Even as none of them had homes or food to eat; all of them had a smile on their face. All of them were happy and I never felt that with all I had at home. Even with it, I still had one goal in mind. "Help them." That's the only goal I had going throughout my mind that entire trip. My stomach swarmed with butterflies; for two different reasons. How were they so happy with so little, but also how could I personally help them.

As we were done for the day and the sky is still as bright as ever; maybe brighter. As we all got back on the bus going to a party. Watching the cities change from lower statues to a higher statue. A house; I take that back. A mansion- many chairs surround the back yard and it feels as if there is still room for another football field. The place was beautiful, don't get me wrong. But I envied them and I wasn't even in a bad living situation. Do they just throw people to the side like Talnique? Why don't they help them out? Most of them are just kids. Soon the Mission trip came to an end, and it was like when we left. The sun was shining bright onto us as

we stood outside of the hotel with luggage by our sides. Waiting for the bus with the same blue polos everyone is wearing. But this time; instead of the scared anxious feeling. We accomplished something great; we were all tired, but we made a few families lives a little better.

The trip taught me so much, from never forgetting my sun screen, to how little can make one person so euphoric. The things this trip taught me honestly will stay with me forever. I always make sure not to waste any food because people somewhere in the world need it. I always make sure I'm happy for the little things. I get a new backpack or clothes. I look up to the sky and hope that those kids can get those things as well. I appreciate my mom more than I used to; at once we were like them. Barely any money couldn't get much food, she rather I'd be fed and happy before herself. I really was, but I never realized how much she's done for me until now. This trip also taught me how wealthy people don't really care about what is happening in society. The impact this trip gave me is something greater than sitting at home watching about it on tv. Its taught me to always and I mean ALWAYS be grateful for the things I have and that come my way; it's also taught me to always give back in the world. I hope one day, I can help make a bigger difference in the world, and it's all thanks to El Salvador.



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
