

Seventy-five hundred (7,500) pounds of fresh fruit, produce, milk, and frozen meat was distributed to more than 125 vehicles, many representing multiple households.

We had a good volunteer turnout including eleven (11) Rotarians, four (4) staff from Every Woman's Place, and a representative from the local Jackson Hewitt office who have

decided to become active in the food truck program, following the lead of local Rotary involvement. THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Artist Ashley Nash

This week's program was led by artist and Rotary guest Ashley Nash. Ashley was one of four artists who were commissioned for the Muskegon Rails Project to paint four separate murals on the previously rusted railroad bridges that were over Seaway Drive. The Muskegon Rails project was a collaborative effort through the Muskegon City Public Art initiative and the cities of Muskegon, Norton Shores, and Muskegon Heights.

Ashley's mural, "Pride and Opportunity," is the on the south-facing side of the bridge near Laketon Avenue.

Ashely was born in Ann Arbor,
Michigan, but raised right here in
Muskegon. She graduated from
Muskegon High School in 2011, and
then went on to Grand Valley State
University where she received her BA
in Illustration.



Throughout her presentation she spoke about her influences and artistic journey that has led her to where she is today. She credits her parents for noticing her creative side from an early age and nurturing it throughout her childhood, enrolling her in extracurricular programs like Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, and the Lakeshore School of Fine Arts.

One of her passions through her art is to shed a light on things that society had previously discarded, or







forgot. Whether it be a shirt from Goodwill, an old mason jar, or a rusty old railroad bridge.

Her passion was further nurtured at GVSU, and led to a larger perspective shift, whereas Ashley says, "There my eyes were opened to the endless possibilities of art, what it was, and what it could do."

This new perspective inspired greater growth in Ashley as she began to focus back on the original mediums she loved in her youth, painting, and sewing. She then started integrating them with other mediums and skills she had developed over the years like use of repurposed material, black and white drawings, and digital animation.

As her tool belt of skills grew, so did her discipline, and confidence as an artist. The opportunities for her to make a career out of art began to present themselves. In 2017 she began working as store manager and graphic designer for the Grand Rapids Griffins.

After working for the Griffins, Ashley began freelancing and traveling. She felt her discipline beginning to slip in her craft though, and challenged herself in response to a 90-day challenge where she would do a piece of art each day and post on her Instagram (@nashleyillustration) for the world to see.

Ashely continued to take on newer and more challenging opportunities, working for the Civic Theater to do backdrops in December 2020, and ultimately winning the commission to work on the Muskegon Rails Project, which was just completed this summer.

Ashley continues to both work and do freelance on the side with the goal of being a full-time freelance artist in the near future.

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
