# This Week's Program:

# Muskegon Area Intermediate School District

Kris Collee introduced our esteemed speaker and fellow Rotarian, Dr John Severson, Superintendent of Muskegon Area Intermediate School District (MAISD). School administrators have spent the summer knee-deep in making plans for a safe return to school, working closely with Kathy Moore.

John shared both the process up to now as well as the goals for the future and how we solve problems through the lens of those that we serve.

So, how is it going so far?



When schools closed their doors on Friday, March 13th, staff had to quickly reimagine not only learning but how to continue to serve equitably. Chromebooks were distributed, connectivity issues solved, safety issues addressed and lots of communication occurred over a variety of mediums. The Internet is still not possible in all parts of Muskegon so paper packets were delivered, phone calls were made and solutions were explored. School is not just about education though and by May 1, over a million meals had been provided to students since food is not always available at home. Wellness checks were also done for all students since safety is not always a given either.

Twelve school districts worked together with the common goal of meeting the needs of their students in whatever way was best for the families. Flexibility has been crucial in these odd times and the result has been new ways to celebrate our old traditions like graduation, smaller classes, increased interagency cooperation and teaching kids new hygiene rules, helping the little ones learn in a fun way, with music. Kudos to Head Start for prepping the little ones for the new kindergarten atmosphere.

Where are we today? School is back in session and many hours of work over the summer is making it possible to learn in new ways. It was acknowledged that a cookie cutter approach, while simpler, is not the best way to serve different schools and students. Schools submit information to the state and are held accountable for the results. This new normal is different from last spring and schools continue to communicate and remain flexible.



There have been some issues such as the cost of PPE (\$130,000), increased parent anxiety, the technology and hardware needed for remote options and the difficulty of building relationships between kids and staff remotely, but each was anticipated and addressed.

There have also been some bright spots. The tech and security millage passed, a mental health grant from the state was received and the CTC was able to open. The number of students taking advantage of Muskegon Area Promise has increased.

What does the future look like? Safety will continue to be top priority. Career fairs will be virtual. School will continue to be two days a week inperson until other schedules are deemed available or necessary. Teachers will continue to be creative and flexible in their service to our kids. John, who chairs the UW board, understands that schools cannot do this alone and is appreciative of community support. It's a tough time but, as always, we can get through it together. With leaders like John and Randy Lindquist, we will.

Keep in mind, even with the innovations that allow us to work and learn remotely, we as human beings have a need to connect in person. Leveraging technology will help teachers teach, but mental health needs can be extreme. Schools for some are safer than home and social isolation can be an issue. Kids need to feel good about themselves and teachers excel at providing that affirmation. Food has been delivered weekly, thousands of Chromebook have been sent to homes, the districts have worked with cell phone companies to provide hot spots. Talent 2025 has been a great supporter. Schools are about so much more than education.

A lot was learned from the spring experience that was forced upon our educational system. Those lessons were leveraged into a better experience for this school year. Face to face cannot be replaced though. Basic needs such as food insecurity need to be addressed before we can expect kids to learn well and we need to remember that parents sometimes have to deal with household illness

and job schedules along with helping their children learn.

Thank you to our schools! They've done their best in a difficult situation. Be sure to include them as you consider places you can volunteer.
