scheduled program falls through. While in the past he's pulled these together on a few hours' notice, he had a little more time for this one, and the result was fantastic. Five Rotarians and community leaders gave brief updates (5 minutes or less) on their organizations.

WATCH MUSKEGON
Muskegon County

Bob Lukens, director of community development for Muskegon County, provided updates on several areas of the county under his



responsibility. He joked that he would do "four departments in five minutes." Jet service is returning to the Muskegon County Airport with the Nov. 1 start of daily flights to Chicago on Denver Air Connection. The parks department is in the midst of its 2025-29 recreation plan and public input is encouraged; see the county's website for more information at

https://muskegoncountyparks.org.
MATS, the Muskegon Area Transit
System, is considering forming an
independent governmental authority,
with likely representatives from the
cities of Muskegon, Muskegon
Heights, Norton Shores and Roosevelt
Park. And finally, the county is
working with Smith Group on
waterfront development concepts
from Heritage Landing to Terrace
Point. The latest proposals will be
shared soon for the public to provide
its feedback.





Missy Horton, executive director of the Lakeshore Museum Center, provided an update of work and

activities at its three museum sites. At the Hackley and Hume site, the smell of fresh cedar shingles is still in the air as a new roof is in place atop the Hackley House. Similar work will be done next year at the Hume House. The organization is working on a facilities management plan for the site, planning and executing work from turrets to chimneys and doors and carriage barn doors "as we continue to take care of these gems." She also encouraged to attend the upcoming "obituary tours" and holiday tours at the site. At the main

History and Science Museum, real dinosaur bones are still on display through the end of December, with monthly talks with a paleontologist who curated the exhibit. At the Business and Industry Museum, on display is an industrial knitting machine, similar to what was used at the Amazon Knitting Company in the early 20th Century. In 2025, the Lakeshore Museum Center is one of seven area museums joining forces to mark the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II. Also, next year, the museum will have a one-time millage proposal on the May ballot to make the main museum completely accessible and provide critically needed collection storage space.



Heidi Sytsema, vice president of development for the Community Foundation for Muskegon County, provided an overview



of several foundation initiatives. The foundation completed a strategic plan five years ago with a focus in three areas: Education, community and economic development and diversity, equity and inclusion. In the education area, the foundation has provided 17 "welcome home" scholarships the last several years to provide incentives for educators to locate in Muskegon County. The foundation has created 13,000 "kickstart to career" education savings accounts for kindergarten to sixth grade students each seeded with \$50 from the community foundation. As a

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follow up to the recent countywide housing student, the foundation is partnering with Muskegon County and Greater Muskegon Economic Development to create a new position that will focus on increasing housing availability, accessibility and affordability. In the area of DEI, the foundation continues to work with Muskegon Community College's program run by Rotarian Ken James and provide scholarships for individuals to attend training. The foundation has also created a giving circle of younger givers called LEAD (Leading Efforts Against Discrimination), which has contributed \$65,000 into a foundation LEAD fund and has granted out \$24,000 in DEI focused projects. The foundation continues to assist with other community led funds, including the Business Equity Initiative Fund, led by Rotarians Nancy McCarthy and Mary Anne Gorman.





Kathy Moore, director of Public Health Muskegon County joked "aging" should be added to its

vision statement because of the county's aging population. She said she's very pleased the senior millage renewal passed. There is a good process in place to fund important programs for seniors. Moore said of the many things the public health department does, she wanted to focus on two areas. Environmental

health does numerous regular inspections, from public swimming pools to campgrounds. They also provide inspections of public waterways and beaches to check on e coli and algae blooms and issue public health advisories if needed. They also work with citizens for PFAS testing. The other area Kathy discussed is a new focus for the department. They are expanding outreach to smaller community-based organizations with a passion for helping others. This is in addition to their existing partnerships with organizations like United Way, Trinity Health, Access Health and the Community Health Project. Other outreach areas of focus are in rural areas and innovative ways to connect with younger residents.



Randy Lindquist, superintendent of the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District, provided an overview of many



of the leadership programs and services the MAISD offers. The organization's mantra this year is "going further, together." The Career Tech Center continues to grow, with 895 students enrolled this year. The Muskegon Promise marks its 10th anniversary this year, providing free tuition to thousands to students at Muskegon Community College and Baker College. Currently 882 Promise students are enrolled. The MAISD also provides special education services, including the Craig Transition Campus for more than 100 adult students, Wesley School with about 90 younger students and about 20 students at the Lakeshore Learning Center for

individuals with high emotional impairments. Two years ago, the ISD added a deaf and hard of hearing program which continues to grow. The program is based in the Reeths--Puffer district, providing a local option for students who had to travel to Holland or Detroit in the past. In the early childhood area, the MAISD offers several programs. It is the largest provider of pre-K programs in the county; most of them are offered within individual school districts. There is a special education program, based off doctor referrals, for over a thousand children up to age 3 who show developmental delays to help get them ready for kindergarten. Randy also highlighted the good work of the MAISD's technology and communication departments.
