## THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Seaway Run Update

The Seaway Run started in 1981 and celebrated 40 years strong in 2021. The participation in this race has almost doubled since Rotary and the YMCA took it over in 2012.

The Seaway Run Steering Committee includes Bruce Spoelman, Mark Meyers, Jason Piasecki, and Sam Nedeau. This event has a variety of options for individuals to pick from such as 5k, 10k, Half Marathon, and a 5k walk. In 2020 due to COVID -19 and state mandates the Seaway Run provided a virtual run/walk that gave participants a week to share pictures or post results when they finished the race.

In 2021 the Seaway Run had a variety of challenges (timeline below) that they faced to make this race successful.

- December 8, 2020 Mercy Health signed a three-year agreement
- February 9, 2021 A decision was made that the run/walk would be virtual
- March 29, 2021 A decision was made that the run would be in person after providing a plan to the Health Department that participants would show proof of vaccine, wear a mask, and complete a covid rapid test before the race
- March 30, 2021 Continued discussion on requirements to participate in the race due to changes in the state mandates
- April 13, 2021 Rotary board approved the plan to move forward with the race
- May 20, 2021 The Governor lifted the outside gathering guidelines
- June 17, 2021 The Governor was lifting mask requirements on June 22nd and the weather forecast did not look promising for the week of the race
- June 26, 2021 Race Day! It was a struggle to set up due to the rain but with group effort it happened and the rain ended within 30 minutes of the race starting

The Seaway Run is the largest annual fundraiser for both Muskegon YMCA and Rotary. This year 1,359 individuals registered for the race, 1100 of the packets got picked up, and 860 individuals took part in the Seaway Run. Between the weather and Covid – 19 this event was considered a huge win for our community. The Seaway Run raised \$53,000. Both clubs received \$20,000 and \$10,000 went towards startup cost for next year.



The Seaway Run is made possible due to sponsorships and volunteers. The event is a staple in our community with beautiful views that brings so many people together from all over. We look forward to the Seaway Run each year and are grateful to all who partake in making it happen.
