
Food Trucks




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Book Discussions on Racial Equality are Back!

10 Rotarians needed for ongoing book discussions on racial equality. The DEI Book Discussion Subcommittee invites you to be part of these discussions and has two [2] excellent book selections for you to choose from:

1. Caste: The Origins of our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson (a NYT bestseller) which is an eye-opening story of people and history and a reexamination of what lies under the surface of



American life today. It combines history, research and story-telling, written in an easy to read, conversational style.

2. I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a world made for whiteness by Austin Channing Brown (a Michigan author and NYT bestseller). Austin writes candidly about the existence of



systemic racism that she has witnessed all her life. She will make you laugh and cry as she offers insightful commentary and helpful suggestions on changing the balance of power.

Note: Both of these authors have multiple interviews on You Tube or you can Google their names and find reviews.

WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Thank you again to Kathy Moore!

This week the total number of active cases is up to 773 (up from 472 last week and from 357 the week before). We currently have a 12% positivity rate. Our highest to date was 24.9% in November, and we were as low as 1.6% in February.

COVID-related deaths were five in February with all of them occurring the first week of February (one of those cases took a while to get the data back to us because of the death occurring out of our county). Now after almost six weeks with no deaths in March we have had one in a nursing home.

Vaccination statistics are looking great for Muskegon County! 16 years old and older are now eligible for the vaccine due to the increased amount of vaccines available than initially anticipated. Those age 16 and 17 can only be administered the Pfizer vaccine at this time.

Christine Robere currently reports no positive cases of homeless individuals in isolation but will be cautious and ready if needed. The greatest unmet need is affordable housing and they have not seen changes due to the eviction ban (no Muskegon Rotary in Motion Newsletter - Page 3



DIVERSITY

Rotary welcomes people of all backgrounds, cultures, experiences, and identities.

Why we started - In 2013 the Diversity Equity and Inclusion committee was formed. Muskegon County residents where segregating themselves to parts of the community that they felt comfortable in. Some people continued to project their opinion based on what they heard but not what they had experienced. Rotary wanted to challenge people to do things differently. They wanted to get all people into a community and this is how the Community Mixer was formed. This event started with 200 people in attendance and has grown to over 900 at the last event.

ENhancing Police And Community Trust

Setting Examples – Enhancing police and community trust is crucial. We need all parties to get together in one room to have discussions. Last summer, the sheriff met with protesters and took time to listen and talk with them. He let them know that he is here to support them. We need to continue to build relationships in the community and not to wait for something to happen. The peaceful protest is a direct result of

the relationship between the police and the community members.

Planning to Grow – We are bringing speakers into the community, reviewing not just ethnicity and race but looking at faith and culture, reviewing policy and practices of this club, looking at how we can ensure our membership reflects our community, and that everyone needs to feel equal, comfortable, and represented in our club.

Looking Deeper - Dr. Joy DeGruy came

to Muskegon and presented to a full house of community members. The Community Foundation gave



a small grant to Rotary to purchase 60 books from Dr. Joy DeGruy and a few members from Rotary facilitated the small group book discussions. Rotary continues to have a book club and they meet regularly to discuss the book they are currently reading. The Library also has all the books that have been read by the book club, you can check them out at your local Library.

Reaching Out – The community Mixer started in 2016 at Rowan Park and has continued annually (except in 2020 due to COVID). This event is an opportunity for people to get together to eat and talk. Some community agencies have tables with information for anyone who wants to learn more about who they are, and all communities are invited to attend. In 2019 attendance was over 900 and the expectation is it will continue to grow over the years.

Love Lives Here – We want to learn more about ethnic back grounds, values, and cultures in Muskegon County. We want good will for everyone and we want our community to move forward in love. We have yard signs, pins, and facemasks that say Love Lives Here. The message is clear Love Lives Here!






