

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

1. Caste: The Origins of our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson (a NYT bestseller) which is an eye-opening story of people and history and a reexamination of what lies under the surface of

2. I'm Still Here: Black Dignity in a world made for whiteness by Austin Channing Brown (a Michigan author and NYT bestseller). Austin writes candidly about the existence of

WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Thank you again to Kathy Moore!

This week the total number of active cases is up to 1,170 (up from 773 last week). It did cause us to repurpose staff from vaccination clinics to work on case investigation and close contact traces. We currently have a 20% positivity rate as of 4/5/2021. Our highest to date was 24.9% in November, and we were as low as 1.6% in February. The antigen tests are influencing this rate because people are taking the rapid test but only take the lab test if they are positive.

We are considered moderate risk exposure at 349.6 new cases per million as of 4/2/2021 at 17.5%.

A concern to focus on is our hospitalization status. As you can see on the chart on the last page of this RIM, the hospitalizations are up to 39 as of 4/8/2021. 11 of those are in ICU and 3 are on ventilators. Mercy Health is ranked one of the highest nationally so our care here is superb.

Vaccination statistics are looking great for Muskegon County! 16 years old and older are now eligible for the vaccine due to the increased amount of vaccines available than initially anticipated. Those age 16 and 17 can only be administered the Pfizer vaccine at this time.

Kris Collee introduced our program Professionally, Samantha has and speakers. Muskegon Young Black Professionals is a newly formed organization that is committed to strengthening the community by improving the lives of young black professionals by providing social outlets and professional opportunities that will equip them to be successful personally and professionally.



Samantha Ferguson has an MPA graduate degree and is a Muskegon native. She currently serves as the grant compliance and programs manager for Oakland County. While in Saginaw, she attended Saginaw Valley State University as a marketing and communication major. After a few years as an SVSU Cardinal, Samantha returned to Muskegon and completed her education at Baker College of Muskegon, receiving both her associates and bachelors degrees in human services. In 2016, Samantha obtained her Masters in public administration with emphasis on government and public policy. She is returning to school in January 2022 to complete her doctoral program in occupational and industrial psychology.



worked for the city of Muskegon for over 17 years, moving from city to Community Foundation of Muskegon County, and now is in Oakland County. Even though residing on the east side of the state, she is still very connected with home. In addition to serving on the board of MYBP, she also serves as development committee chair for the coalition of community development and remains active in her sorority, the Muskegon Heights alumni chapter of Delta Sigma Theta sorority.



Jocelyn Hines was also born and raised in Muskegon Heights. She attended Muskegon Heights High School and later went to Michigan State University, studying social relations and policy with a minor in public relations. After graduating in 2016, Jocelyn worked on several political campaigns, including a mayoral and a state representative campaign. She has a heart for civic engagement and community service and spends a lot of her free time volunteering.

Currently she is the chair of the MYBP, vice chair of United Way of the Lakeshore Community Engagement Advisory Council, a board member of Muskegon Civic Theatre, and a member of Delta Sigma Theta sorority. Faith is also important to Jocelyn as she enjoys serving in her local church. She is truly dedicated to building strong diverse communities and making sure all voices are heard and represented. She often serves on

committees and boards dedicated to diversity, equity and inclusion and will continue to be a voice for young black professionals. Jocelyn still lives in Muskegon and is pursuing her masters degree in public administration at GVSU. She currently works for the Community Foundation of Muskegon County as a program officer.

Jocelyn told us that years ago she was her Rotarian member of the Rotary Rewind, so it's nice to be among familiar faces. MYBY started back in 2017. After returning from college, she noticed how important social spaces and networking spaces had been for her college. She visited a friend in Detroit who took her to a major networking event, a rooftop brunch for other professionals who got together, had a good time, ate food, listen to music and just bonded in a safe place as their authentic selves.



After that, she realized this would be amazing to bring to Muskegon. So she made a Facebook status post and asked if anyone was interested in starting an organization like this where we have either people who are coming back after college or are like new in their careers and are looking for social networking spaces. After getting some responses on the post, she decided to invite them to breakfast. After breakfast, they decided this was something they wanted to do. They had breakfast in February and the first social event in April 2017 at Unruly Brewing Company. Things exceeded her

expectations. They had over 40 professionals of color from Muskegon and Grand Rapids attending that event and the organization was formed. The majority of the organization create safe spaces for young black professionals of Muskegon County. The emphasis is on safe spaces.

Young professionals of color don't feel they can be their authentic and organic selves in the workspace. To have an opportunity to be authentic and organic is important to self-care and mental health as are navigating these professional spaces in their lives. Besides socializing and networking, the organization Also provides professional development opportunities.

Their Vision

Statement states: Muskegon Young Black Professionals endeavors to be the primary resource for professional and social development for young black professionals in Muskegon County. Their Mission Statement states: Muskegon Young Black Professionals is an organization that is committed to strengthening the community by improving the lives of young black professionals by providing social outlets and professional development opportunities that will equip them to be successful personally and professionally. MYBP serves Professionals of color in Muskegon County ages 18-45.

There are now nine members on the board of MYBP. Some are

entrepreneurs, some in education, some in the public sector, and some of the private. MYBP also was created to create more opportunities for black people to participate in boards and committees, creating a pipeline for people who aren't usually called to give a little bit a board experience on their resume.



Samantha told us about past and upcoming events. The focus is on three areas for the events: social, some kind of community service. and a professional development opportunity. They have been able to stay connected to social events virtually, to stay safe during the pandemic, and stay connected to each other. Several events have regarded social events where they could takeoff their hats and unwind and just be among people who share like experience and endeavor. These have been great networking opportunities. These have helped develop bonds and partnerships, especially during the



pandemic. They have created more involvement.

One of their programs was on how to land a job with great panelists from Muskegon and Grand Rapids top industries such as the City of Grand Rapids and Spectrum Health. They gave tips about how to land a job, resumes, salary negotiations, all that being a person of color going into a job interview space. This program was well received and attended. Other events included an

Inauguration Watch Party & Happy Hour (Jan 2021), Black Excellence in Industry Poetry Experience (Feb 2021), West Michigan Black Authors

Showcase (March 2021)(authors of color presentation where individuals who had written books within the area were able to share their experience as an author and provide some insight for those who are interested in writing as well.) Future programs will be MYBP Movie Night (Summer 2021) and Juneteenth/Muskegon Heights Festival in the Park (June 2021), MYBP Showcase and much more. (Fall 2021)



They have really been focused on financial idea - Wealth management, building credit, and debt management. Right now everything is virtual. They still need to make sure it is a safe space, but also give some thing to take when you leave.

Socials are every Fourth Friday and professional development events are quarterly.

Just emphasize that people who have attended their events have

found their family among us. It feels like we have created a community among each other where we can hang out outside of social stay and talk about things that are heavy on our hearts or things experienced at jobs, things happening in society. What's been really fulfilling for our group is we created these communities of spaces where people can feel welcomed and appreciated.

Canaan people of color attend events and programming? Yes, the events are open to anyone and everyone, but need to come with an understanding that these are safe spaces for people attending. The space was created for people of color to be authentic and organic and be able to share their experiences at work or just walking down the street. Don't want to create a space were nine people of color think we have to answer to any race questions they may have. It's not a place to deal with hard questions. Keep this in mind if asking to collaborate or attend events. We're open for anybody and everybody.

MYBP is looking forward to creating more partnerships and sponsorships after this.

How can you support MYBP? The main thing is financially. They are on a shoestring budget. Actually probably don't have a budget right now. Since 2017, every single event they've had has been free of charge too young black professionals. Except for one which if he didn't have money would probably still have let you in. They wanted to make it accessible and hassle free to anybody who wanted to attend one of the events or professional development opportunities. Financial support will be much easier after they have their 501(c)(3) status, which hopefully will be at the end of this summer.

You can also support with a sponsorship. Just reach out and say you want a partner with us and even host. Some have hosted at their own building, building they own, or even their favorite restaurant.(paid for first two drinks.) sponsored food for the socials, or just the space.) don't have formal sponsorship but are open to opportunities if anyone has any ideas how they want to sponsor an event we may have as one of our socials. We have socials every Friday. Professional development We are willing and able to partner with other organizations to want to bring resources to professionals of color, and even people of color in general. We are open to all kinds of professional development opportunities such as offering professional services to entrepreneurs, ownership classes or things related to mental health, things around financial literacy, and building wealth.

Kris Collee commented, "I feel that all roads lead back to Muskegon and so many of us leave this town thinking we're never going to come back. We go away to college, we go to different communities, and we have a different taste for what diversity looks like and how it feels to feel a little bit more included and a little less segregated." Kris asked, "How is MYBP the opportunity to help those folks transition back to Muskegon or that welcoming nature of new individuals coming into our community that are looking for that safe space?"

Jocelyn told us they are trying to create a saving grace for those people who are looking to come back to Muskegon and find their family. The social and networking opportunities are really important for those willing to transition back into Muskegon County who have been away for college and other opportunities. So now I feel some of my best friends literally came from people coming to socials every single month. We started hanging out outside of socials. So I think we create those families and those opportunities for people who are transitioning back to Muskegon County that you don't have to feel alone if you were working in white spaces or you don't have to feel

alone if you were experiencing anything in your job or even in the community. So we create a space where we have those tough conversations and support each other in a way you don't feel isolated and you won't want to leave our community.


