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WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Total active cases as of 2/10/2021 is 643. Our goal is under 500 and positivity rate is 4.5% but can fluctuate Kathy Moore, Muskegon County Director of Public Health, mentioned. We are in a good position overall. There is a central database for requests for the COVID-19 Vaccine. Total requests are 33,694 as of 2/10/2021. More than 20% of our population do not have internet access so looking at options for outreach to account for these.

Reaching New Muskegon Heights

"Reaching New Muskegon Heights" is a new term that has been heard circling around the county recently. It is not just a new phrase, but instead it is more of an expression of hope and resilience for the future of down town Muskegon Heights. As some may be aware, The City of Muskegon Heights, Greater Muskegon Economic Development, SmithGroup, and the MEDC have come together to create the **Reaching New Muskegon Heights Vision**

Plan for the future of downtown Muskegon Heights. This plan will bring community voices together in order to develop and construct a clearer consensus around priorities for reinvestment. We have provided DIY (Do It Yourself) survey kits which are

available online at <u>Muskegon-heights</u> (reachingnewmuskegonheights.org),

as well as various locations throughout downtown Muskegon Heights. The surveys provide us with vital information about community priorities and the different opportunities Muskegon Heights desires for the future of downtown.

In order to reach the community and advertise the DIY Survey Kits, we have teamed up with Mike Vogas, Corey Blackman, and Glen Gray to create a video that expresses the current views of the community, personal experiences, the potential reinvestments, and the importance of filling out the DIY Survey Kits. Within the video you will hear from various community leaders and city officials of Downtown Muskegon Heights sharing their insight about the community. "There is so much pride, history, and culture in the City of

Muskegon Heights," mentioned Jocelyn Hines, of Community Foundation of Muskegon County, in the *Reaching New Muskegon Heights Video.*

We ask that you watch the video, take the survey and share this information. It is imperative for all of us to do our individual part, come together, and help; creating both long lasting change and continued development leading to the overall strengthening of our communities. 'Black Rosies': The Forgotten African American Heroines of the WWII Homefront by Aaron Randle from History.com

Rosie the Riveter—the steelyeyed World War II heroine with her red bandanna, blue coveralls and flexed bicep—stands as one of America's most indelible military images. Positioned under the maxim "We Can Do It," the "Rosie" image has come to broadly represent the steadfast American working woman, and more specifically, the millions of female laborers who kept the factories and offices of the U.S. defense industries humming.

What the iconic Rosie image doesn't convey is the diversity of that work force-specifically the more than halfmillion "Black Rosies" who worked alongside their white counterparts in the war effort. Coming from throughout the United States, these "Black Rosies" worked tirelessly—in shipyards and factories, along railroads, inside administrative offices and elsewhere-to fight both the foreign enemy of authoritarianism abroad and the familiar enemy of racism at home. For decades, they received little historical recognition or acknowledgement.

Pound Buddies

Since 1998, when it was founded by Connie Karry and a small group of like-minded volunteers to change the way Muskegon County cared

for its shelter animals, <u>Pound</u> <u>Buddies</u> has helped change



the way shelter animals are cared for in Muskegon County. It has increased opportunities for adoption and actively works on reuniting lost pets with their owners. They have reduced the euthanasia rate by 67% and set new standards for the humane treatment of shelter animals. Work is being done to reduce the unwanted pet population through spay and neuter efforts.

Pound Buddies is presently located at 1300 E.Keating in a building that was built in the 1960's. At that time the purpose was just to get dogs off the street. This is where Muskegon County's animal shelter has always been. The building is owned by the township, rented out by Muskegon County, and then Pound Buddies is the service provider. The building has many problems so a new location is being created.

At the present time, Pound Buddies has assumed



contractual responsibilities for all animal care and control operations in Muskegon County (a 10 year contract) until at least 2029. Pound Buddies, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, operates with a 16 member staff and over 200 volunteers. While receiving some targeted funding from the County (less than 40% of budget), Pound Buddies relies on community support and grants to bridge the more than 50% budget deficit. Charitable donations give Pound Buddies the ability to provide shelter and care for over 1200 animals annually-many who are in need of urgent and critical veterinary attention due to abuse or neglect.



Pound Buddies is Muskegon County's largest and only open admission shelter, meaning they take in all dogs, regardless of age, breed, health, behavior or adoptability. In 2018, Pound Buddies sheltered 1,534 animals. Of those, 550 were adopted into new families, 384 were reunited with their owners and 241 were transferred to other rescue organizations, giving them added opportunities for foster and adoption. Pound Buddies remains steadfast in their commitment to never euthanize healthy, adoptable animals. However, as an open admission shelter, instances remain when quality of life issues may limit options, due to aggression, severe illness or injury or acute shelter stress. At all times, animals under the care of Pound Buddies are handled with the utmost humane and compassionate treatment.



The new facility will be 3 miles east on Laketon Avenue in the old Robert Hughes building that is undergoing renovations and additions. There will be dramatic improvements for sheltering animals. At present there are 98 kennels in the old facility; the new will have 140. The old kennels were Vital for Muskegon County 3 x 5 which were not up to present standards for shelter care. The new will have 5 x 8, with some 8 x 8 for extra large dogs. There will be an indoor area for exercise. The old facility total was 8000 ft.²; the new facility will be approximately 25,000 ft.². There will be an indoor play area, an area for cats, rooms for offices, and an intake area, and an isolation area for dogs to be evaluated. Behind the building are 4 fenced in acres with plans for walking trails and outside exercise areas. The intent of the new shelter is to preserve the true personality of the dogs by enhancing their emotional, physical, and mental health while being in the shelter.

Donations will be used to help build a much-needed new animal center. Our current building no longer

meets USDA mandates, and basic repair estimates exceed \$1 million, making it fiscally unreasonable. There is an ever-increasing demand for progressive communities to provide higher quality practices and facilities for the care of shelter animals. In keeping pace with the renaissance of the greater Muskegon area, it is evident the time has come to bring a new municipal animal center to our community.






