WEEKLY COVID REPORT



Kathy Moore gave a great message that Muskegon County, out of all the counties near us and throughout the state, is in a great position. Our positivity rate is 2.6% which has averaged below 5% for the past 16 days in a row. That is enough to say that this is not just a fluctuating incident and we are doing a great job. New cases per million is 33.8 compared to 57.4 in Michigan. Mercy Health Hospital capacity is in a superb position! Zero outbreaks in February and the number of deaths is holding steady at three for the month (Zero for the last two weeks). Some anxiety here is the vaccine timeline. The vaccination timeline chart is attached on the last page of this RIM. 14,372 are still waiting for vaccination but all vaccination partners here in Muskegon County are committed that anyone age 65 and older who wants a vaccination to be able to get a vaccination before the end of March. Bob Scolnik commended Kathy Moore, stating, "We are blessed to have her as the Director of the Health Department." She has done an extraordinary job with not only this virus but also with the public relations part too. She is not just the COVID director, but is also managing all the other Health Department duties as well with a staff that is still down about 50 people from a couple years ago. Many, many thanks to Kathy Moore. President Mark Meyers also wanted to extend the appreciation to Kathy Moore, Chairman Scolnik, and Mark Eisenbarth for the great communications with each municipality as well.

Paul Harris Fellow Award

Dr. Dale Nesbary was born and raised in Muskegon. He studied at Reeths-Puffer High School where he played trombone



in the band. He met his wife, Connie, at a Norton Shores Youth Symphony when they were playing at Muskegon Community College. He went on to earn a BA at MSU, Master's Degree in Public Administration at WMU, and a Ph.D. in Law, Policy, and Society at Northeastern University in Boston. He was an associate professor and director of the Master's of Public Administration Program at Oakland University and served as Vice President and Dean of Academic Affairs at Adrian College. In June 2009, Dr. Nesbary was selected from a national search to become the President of MCC and is now in his 12th year (2nd longest serving President in the college history). Under his leadership, MCC completed a \$55 million infrastructure upgrade (the largest investement in the college since the original campus was constructed in 1967). This is important because it has consistently been rated in the top three-four Community Colleges in Michigan consistently under his leadership. He is currently the Chair of The Michigan Community College Association Board of Directors and Chair of Trinity Health System Regional Board. He's received numerous awards and published three books. Congratulations and thank you, Dr. Dale Nesbary.

Making It Happen – Community Leaders On Driving Positive Growth RIM Reporter: Susan Besteman Facilitator: D.J. Hilson

Speakers: Brianna Scott, Frank Peterson, and Bob Scolnik

Over the last several years, Muskegon has been making positive growth. **D.J. Hilson** (a community leader) led the

discussion with three other community leaders regarding tips on how one person can make a difference.

Brianna Scott remembered a song from her youth, "This Little Light of Mine" and inspired us to be a light transferring positivity for change and growth to all those that see and/or meet us. She also reminded us to find



a passion which can create that spark of light and be contagious positivity to those around you. Therefore, emanating to those who see your light to also make a difference in the community.

Frank Peterson has been part of the city structure for several years. He experienced first hand the many people who didn't believe Muskegon could build buildings into downtown and that people would want to visit downtown to shop (or even live downtown). However, the negativity almost made it easy to overcome doubts and goals. Frank also

mentioned there are always people that do care and gave great advice to focus on that support to set up smaller incremental changes to

impact the community in major ways. His focus has been on consistently improving everyone's quality of life.

Being a member of this community for a number of years, part of several organizations and even leading many projects on his own passion, **Bob Scolnik** believes in personal initiative and passion. If you are passionate about something, go for it. You may be able to do it yourself or you may have to bring others in too but if you have the passion to see the change, you can be the start to that change with your own initiative.

D.J. posed the question to the panel of leaders, "Where do you see the need for improvement?" Seeing first hand how segregated Muskegon County is, Brianna (former chair of the DEI Committee) would like to see communities reach out to each other. Change is difficult; however, she posed a challenge to diversify our own community and break down barriers through personal experience and increased knowledge. Seek out our community mixers at our local parks and eat at restaurants in every neighborhood. With Frank's city expertise, he agreed with Brianna's challenge to break down barriers and diversify our neighborhoods. He stated the investments we have made with the city have already started to see much improvement with regards to diversity. For example, the new housing initiative movement is building new structures (houses and

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other various types) for low-income, moderate-income, and market-rate housing to allow everyone to feel they are welcome, can afford it, and that the neighborhood is for them. Frank believes that our community is headed in the right direction and is taking the time to reinvest in neighborhoods so everyone feels comfortable.

D.J. then took the discussion from the city level to the county level and posed the final question to Bob regarding what he sees



as a need for improvement and how the County government can assist in achieving this goal. Bob touched on how it is difficult to make progress when there are two sides not willing to work together. One thing he would like to get done is to reduce the amount of animosity and focus on a more healthy way to run government. Muskegon County is in excellent shape: the County's fund balanace (unallocated amount of money they have to work with) has never been higher, our credit rating is AA Stable (which is not AAA Stable only due to our smaller county size), and has many numerous positive achievements. The County is very efficient and is a big operation with a \$225 million budget and over 1000 employees.


Muskegon is in great shape. Eminate your light, overcome incremental changes to impact the community in

major ways, and show your initiative to drive positive growth. Make it






Preliminary vaccination timeline
