WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Kathy Moore reported we have bent the curve. Though still higher than our highest point back in April 2020, we do see progress. The hospitals have managed this pandemic very well. If you do receive a vaccine and are on multiple lists, contact the other locations to have them remove you from their lists for better tracking. Muskegon County received 9,000 doses and administered 3,473 (Muskegon County Public Health received 800 and administered 800). Second doses are in a reserved location. As of Jan 11, 2021, MDHHS is moving forward with vaccination of age 65+, frontline essential workers, childcare through high school staff, and congregate care facilities. Vaccinations are ongoing for the previous groups of health care workers and long term care workers and staff.

Youth Activities

Three young people from our Muskegon Rotary Interact Clubs brought our club up-to-date on their activities, reasons for belonging to Interact, the response to the pandemic, and future plans for their clubs.



Simran Tumber is a junior at Mona Shores HS and President of MS Interact. She joined as a freshman and has been in for three years.



Georgette Kersman has been part of Interact for about seven years. She is the President of the North Muskegon Interact and she attended the Life Leadership Conference in 2019.



Justin Smith is a junior at Oakridge HS; this is his second year in interact and is now Vice President of the Oakridge interact. He's also a member of Life Leadership this year.

Simran Tumber informed us that Mona Shores has 10 members on their board and around 12 to 15 members in the club. Trying to recruit new members is very important because most members are seniors. They operate using zoom meetings and are hoping to try for more in person meetings as things get better. They're also trying to find more service opportunities for the spring.

Georgette told us that the North Muskegon Interact as a little over 40 members with six members on the council. The group participated in the Pop Can drive, worked with Mona Shores to raise money to send to Honduras, were a part of the North Side Adopt A Family (they are adopted eight children) and also have a little boy in the Dominican Republic that they sponsor. The officers have been meeting in person about two times a month. To stay in contact with the rest of the club they've divided the members between the officers to contact after the meetings to keep up with what is happening. They are looking forward to working with Rotary once again in the future especially with the Chili Kits this year. They are also raising money for the

whole project and also looking into Soddo Christian Hospital and the WRAPs Project. They've been in contact with the Karnes's.

Justin told us that Oakridge has board meetings once a month. There are nine members in the group total and three are them on the board. They partnered with Orchard View to accomplish a project. It's been hard to recruit new members. They are doing the Holton Townhall heroes, they have distributed 160 bags to Mercy Health, 30 bags to Healthwest, 30 to Hackley Community Care, and 20 to Hospice Poppin health workers. These were delivered on Wednesday and Thursday. The group will also be working on Chili Kits and working to raise money to do more projects. They adopted a few families for Christmas. The gift bags have been the highlight of their year.

Mona Shores Interact worked alongside ReWine to provide hurricane relief to Honduras. They've collected donations and they have a student in their high school who just moved from Honduras. She wanted to help her people in any way she could so she reached out to their club since she knew they helped Honduras and had members in Honduras. Donations were collected and donated to the hurricane relief.

North Muskegon has a committee that is working on building the idea of the Chili Kits since they can't have a cook off to raise money for Honduras and the people that are going there. Instead they will be building kits. They are planning to have people sponsor the kits and then the kits will be sent to food pantries for the less fortunate to keep the idea of a cook off going and help in future to keep the project running. **Randy Linquist** told us that ReWine is still working on the logistics of the Chili Kit project.



Mona Shores feel they have adapted well to the effects of the pandemic. They don't have in person meetings but are going with zoom but that makes recruiting difficult because people are busy with other things. They find it difficult to gather in large groups for service activities.

North Muskegon told us that they find it difficult to keep in touch using distant forms of communications it's also difficult not having the usual fundraisers such as the Irish Music Festival, donkey basketball, wrestle mania and pinkies for polio. They're also used to sending to people Honduras which is not happening right now. It's been hard to slow down and not have the usual opportunities and projects to do.

At Oakridge, they find it difficult not being together. It's hard having masks and social distancing for projects that they're doing. One project they did they had to work at separate tables 6 feet apart. When they were wrapping presents for families at Christmas along with Orchard View they could not meet at the same school. They found room at a church to complete the project.

Simran from Mona Shores told us that as a freshman she hadn't done much extra curricular activity so she wanted to participate in something that would look good on resumes for college but also something to help her community. She talked to friends who are already in high school and heard about Interact. She joined as a freshman and in her sophomore year became secretary. At the end of that time she wanted to be more involved with behind the scenes to help create things and direct things and have an impact and to see how the activities were created. So she decided to run for president.

Georgette from North Muskegon originally joined to have something to do in her free time for fun. She saw the impact that interact could have on the people in her community and also globally. Over the years she worked her way up. As a freshman she was a member, then became an officer for local and global projects and now is president. She wants to be president because over the years she's had an opportunity to organize a couple of events and found that it's her strong suit. So especially in this time of Covid when everyone is kind of struggling, she felt this would be the best way to help her club.



Justin at Oakridge was asked to be become a leader because Anna Burns asked him to step up and run for vice president. He's glad he agreed.

All three agreed that they're trying to find more opportunities to get more involved. They hope that with the course of the vaccine they will be able to have more in person meetings.

Mona Shores is planning another tree sale in the spring and working alongside of the United Way Of The Lakeshore. They did a goodwill book organizing project last year for the Reading Buddies project by collecting books for preschoolers so there would be more for resources for reading and learning. Justin told us that Oakridge has started to raise funds for another project for the community. Not really sure what it will be yet and they are also raising money for the Chili Kits because they definitely plan on working on that project. They've been bouncing ideas around about doing fundraising in school, but have been having difficulties because they can't have bake sales or sell food which they did last year. They are thinking about doing a raffle on some item that they purchase. They really want to help the community in anyway possible. They just need ideas.




