WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Kathy Moore seeing a gradual decline in new COVID 19 cases, positivity rate is 5.2% down from 24.9% which was our high in November. Hospital capacity is well managed and under control: 21 adults inpatient and 8 in ICU and 6 on ventilators. Bed occupancy in our region is available and we are seeing surgeries and other illnesses being addressed versus only COVID patients. We are still seeing a higher prevalence of deaths compared to our contiguous counties. Epidemiologists are studying this link: perhaps poverty and ethnicity may be a factor. Prison cases are currently under control and remaining steady. Vaccination timeline: (see chart) ages 65-74 population are able to get the vaccine if the vaccine is available. Muskegon County is still scheduling persons in phase 1B. Please be patient with vaccine rollout. 27,581 requests have been made for

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the COVID 19 vaccine. Collaboration between HealthWest, Public Health, Muskegon Family Care, Hackley Community Care and other partnerships are key in service and vaccine delivery.

- 7,133 the number of 75-85 year-olds have been vaccinated. 12,000+ of 65-74 year-olds have requested the vaccine. Under 65, 6,000+ applications and hoping to touch this group this summer.
- Kathy noted two ways to register for the vaccine and are included on the slides that she shared.
- Most vulnerable population are those individuals that do not have access to computer or internet. This is one of our most vulnerable populations. Kathy is trying to obtain clarification on whether or not under-documented or undocumented individuals are able to obtain the vaccine.

Expecting additional doses of the Moderna vaccine next week.

Kelly Richards introduced Jonathon Wilson (DTE Regional Manager) and Dr. Dale Nesbary (President at Muskegon Community College) and discussion on systemic racism. Video link here:

Both **Dr. Nesbary** and Mr. **Wilson** shared some personal history and the research that they have conducted regarding systemic racism. **Dr. Nesbary's** doctoral dissertation focused on law enforcement, housing, and economic opportunities and the impact that these organizations are having in combating systemic racism. As organizations work to improve and address systemic barriers, they are better equipped to serve their communities in a positive and efficient manner.

Kelly also requested feedback and discussion on responses our community has had since the January 6, 2021 violence in the United States Capitol. The three men clarified that the criminal justice system is unfavorable to communities of color. All three men observed that black men are treated differently in

the criminal justice system and there are disproportionate sentences noted for men of color. Dr. Nesbary further noted in his research regarding part one or part two crimes, there is no statistical difference from the time a call is made and a police response is made. There is no disparity in how quickly law enforcement responds but disparity begins to take effect once police arrive on the scene of the crime. Lack of training and lack of hiring strong professionals to do the work would hopefully improve policing outcomes, per Dr. Nesbary and his research. Our laws were created during a time when slavery, Jim Crow and other laws were enacted by congress persons and lawyers that had inadvertent effects that continued systemic disparity. In discussing the insurrection at the Capitol, it was painfully obvious of white privilege in the United States as the Capitol police did not anticipate that the primarily white persons would become violent. Their response of force and number of officers was substantially higher with the Black Lives Matter protest occurred and protestors were treated in very different manners. All three men noted a significant difference in how the protesters were handled in these two situations, noting more officers were present during the Black Lives Matter protests than during the insurrection in Washington DC; and how the protestors were engaged by law enforcement.



All three men also addressed how research has born out racial disparity in the service industry and restaurant industry which starts primarily as white

(servers, hostesses, managers) in the visible areas of the restaurant to persons of color in the back (kitchen staff, custodians). Mr. Wilson notes that he has observed this significantly in the restaurant industry; and provided examples of not addressing that he and his wife (who is Caucasian) are dining together or providing her the check at the end of the meal. Dr.



Nesbury and Mr. Wilson report that we have historically run away from the issue of systemic racism. We did not become a democracy in the mid 1960's as many of us would think. Our country did not; noting that many persons of color could not serve in the military during World War II or could not vote in our current election. Many persons of colors could not become law enforcement officers until very recently. Although we are making progress, there is still so much more to unpack and discuss.

During the virtual question and answer session, many Rotarians asked how we can continue to support our community and to ensure we are breaking barriers and understanding one another. Putting forth an effort to have frank and honest discussions, Love Lives Here initiative, having a diversity, equity and inclusion committee; we are recognizing that people are treated differently and need to feel the support of the greater community. Many are starting to use the term "Belonging"-meaning that all should be at the table to address systemic racism. Inclusion infers that we are invited to participate whereas "Belonging" implies all should be at the table.

All three men noted that systemic racism is still present in our community and there are local businesses that they will not frequent due to their treatment and service of persons of colors.


Mercy Health (local) COVID-19 patient status as of January 27, 2021


