### **16 BRAVE ROTARIANS** MARCH—MADNESS SWEET SIXTEEN CONTEST



### WEEKLY COVID REPORT

Kathy Moore: 5 quick slides noted with the COVID 19 update. Around March 11 we noticed a slight uptick and are over 5% positivity rate. The positivity rate is a reflection of testing. Testing is down and the demand for testing is due to exposure or active symptoms. Hospital capacity is fantastic and 0 outbreaks during the month of March. No deaths noted in the month of March. Last death was reported on February 5. 28.9% of eligible persons have received their vaccine. Please continue to socially distance, wash your hands and stay home if you are feeling ill. Prioritizing by age group, but if eligible, you are able to receive your vaccine. Anticipating 50-64+age group will be the next age group eligible to receive the vaccine. Continuing to focus on social equitability

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and vulnerability. Kathy Moore and her team are doing a fantastic job and providing excellent service delivery.

# Mercy Health Physician Partners

Dr. Kristen Woods shared an update on Mercy Health Physician Partners. They are a



part of Mercy Health and Trinity Health; while her particular arm is the health delivery by physicians. They provide a high guality and well-coordinated effort of service delivery and patient care. She has a focus on highly engaged patients that work effectively with service providers. They continue to evaluate service locations and being accessible to all patients, including those that utilize public transportation. They recently opened their Norton Shores location which includes a number of primary care physicians under one roof, including physical therapy, lab services and a pharmacy.



There is also a new clinic that is embedded on the campus of Muskegon Community College and serves the community, staff and students in that area.



Dr. Woods discussed how technology is further assisting patients in accessing services and communicating with their primary care doctors and specialist appointments. Online scheduling is being utilized by over 22,000 patients. All patients have access to their chart, message their

providers or schedule via the Epic Portal.





Mercy Health is also using technology to conduct virtual visits and telemedicine visits. This was especially vital during the early days of the COVID 19 pandemic and is likely to continue for many patients post pandemic. Mercy Health has also made upgrades to their phone systems for patients that prefer to pick up the phone and contact their primary care physicians with questions or to schedule.

Mercy Health has recorded a number of physicians and nurses leave the network and a number of new providers have been added throughout the network. There is a find a physician functionality on the

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new website which includes filters on gender and doctor specialities. The plan is to add a navigator function for new patients to assist them in navigating scheduling appointments and patient care.



Dr. Woods noted that there is specialist care available in Muskegon County. Primary care services also provide wrap around services and partner with Care Management regarding medication management, social well being and patient needs. Mercy Health Partners did recently achieve an award for managing Hyper Tension Management. Cardiac Care and pulmonology are areas are growth in the Muskegon area and are now able to provide a number of new non-evasive procedures. Another area of growth is osteopathic manipulation of pain management and neurology services, including a specialist in epilepsy. The need to travel to Grand Rapids or Ann Arbor is no longer necessary. Dr. Woods noted that they are hoping to expand the number of primary care physicians and add support services, such as behavioral health providers in primary care offices. They also hope to expand the number of psychiatrists in our community.

MHPP was founded by the Sisters of Mercy and work very hard to ensure social equity throughout the

MHPP network.

Mother Catherine McAuley, foundress of the Religious Sisters of Mercy The missions and

values they were founded on continue to be a major focus of Mercy Health. They continue to promote that all are able to receive high quality medical care and affordability. MHPP has a diversity, equity and inclusion committee: create greater diversity in governance, diversity of staff, ensure all persons have access, grow and develop diversity in supplies, and eliminate health disparity. There is an emphasis to grow a diverse staff and to recruit these talented individuals to our diverse community. Female providers is an area MHPP that has really grown and should be celebrated.

Dr. Woods noted that the practice of medical care has become very complex. The expense of technology has meant that many private providers have joined larger medical providers, such as Mercy Health. There is heavy regulation among insurance providers which has caused many physicians to either join larger networks or to begin offering more concierge style services. If your primary care physician is not part of Mercy Health, you are still able to access service providers via Mercy Health.

### An Extra Tought

Charles Plumb was a US Navy jet pilot in Vietnam. After 75 combat missions, his plane was destroyed by a surface-to-air missile. Plumb ejected and parachuted into enemy hands.

He was captured and spent six years in a communist Vietnamese prison. He survived the ordeal and now lectures on lessons learned from that experience! One day, when Plumb and his wife were sitting in a restaurant, a man at another table came up and said,

'You're Plumb! You flew jet fighters in Vietnam from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk. You were shot down! 'How in the world did you know that?' asked Plumb. 'I packed your parachute,' the man replied. Plumb gasped in surprise and gratitude. The man pumped his hand and said, 'I guess it worked!' Plumb assured him, 'It sure did. If your chute hadn't worked, I wouldn't be here today.' Plumb couldn't sleep that night, thinking about that man. Plumb says, 'I kept wondering what he had looked like in a Navy uniform: a white hat; a bib in the back; and bellbottom trousers. I wonder how many times I might have seen him and not even said 'Good morning, how are you?' or anything because, you see, I was a fighter pilot and he was just a sailor.'

Plumb thought of the many hours the sailor had spent at a long wooden table in the bowels of the ship, carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands each time the fate of someone he didn't know.

Now, Plumb asks his audience, 'Who's packing your parachute?' Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day. He also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territory he needed his physical parachute, his mental parachute, his emotional parachute, and his spiritual parachute. He called on all these supports before reaching safety.

Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We may fail to say hello, please, or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give a compliment, or just do something nice for no reason.


As you go through this week, this month, this year, recognize people who pack your parachutes. I am sending you this as my way of thanking you for your part in packing my parachute.
