THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: Youth Exchange Students Farewell

Youth Exchange provides thousands of young people with the opportunity to meet people from other lands and to experience their cultures. This plants the seeds for a lifetime of international understanding." – Rotary District 6290



To start the program, **Kristi Pawlak** shared that the Youth Exchange Program has doubled over the past few years. She reported that interest among local students is growing immensely. Most recently, 52 students signed up to be considered for the program. Muskegon Rotary Club's program is part of the Central States Rotary Youth Exchange program for Inbounds and Outbounds that includes 18 Districts in the Great Lakes area. This year, they touched nine different countries.

Youth Exchange inbound Apichaya (Design) Laorattanakul from Thailand was first to share her experience and bid us farewell. She excitedly reported that she graduated from Reeths-Puffer High School a few weeks ago and is still in awe from all the amazing experiences.

Over the past year, she lived with two host families and attended five conferences – including Life Leadership, which she characterized as "the best conference ever."

Design went to Reeths-Puffer's homecoming dance, prom, football games, and more. She also learned how to build robotics and tried basketball for the very first time.



She ended with a big "thank you" to the families who hosted her and to Rotary for the opportunity to gain new insight into how people from other cultures view the world.

Next, Youth Exchange inbound Emma Krichbaum from Austria told us that she "feels really lucky" to be here. She said that they only do school work at the schools in her native country, so she really enjoyed the extracurricular activities at North Muskegon High School. She also graduated a couple of weeks ago.



Emma participated in lots of sports, including sideline cheerleading, competitive cheerleading, and track (100 dash, 200 dash, long-jump). She jokingly confessed that she "still don't know how football works." Emma reported that she vacationed at Disney in Florida with her first host family; travelled to Hawaii for a special conference in March and met a lot of other exchange students. And she visited Alabama with her 2nd host family. Finally, the club's three Youth Exchange outbound students shared their excitement for their upcoming experience abroad, as well as a bit of information about the countries they will be visiting.

Jillian said that she loves "Hello Kitty" and discovered that there is an abundance of Hello Kitty facilities in the country – even the airport. Kristi Pawlak returned to the podium to let us know that four Youth Exchange inbound students are approved to come to Muskegon this fall. Mildred taught at Muskegon Public Schools for over 30 years, where she started an annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. program at Marquette Elementary School, urging the school board to recognize Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, and honor it as a holiday. She also served as a longterm advocate for civil rights and equality. Mildred retired in 1994, and continued to serve others through volunteer work all over Muskegon County. Because she loves education, she has been a tutor and test proctor for Muskegon and Muskegon Heights Public Schools, and worked with Hands on Science through the Muskegon Community College (MCC) WINGS program. Because she cares deeply for her community, Mildred served meals for God's Kitchen, volunteers at the James Jackson African American Museum in

Muskegon Heights, and is a member of the Coalition for Community Development, showing children how to plant gardens, make recipes and cook. She has assisted in the selection of families for Habitat for Humanity and worked with the Muskegon Heights Zoning Board of Appeals.

Mildred is a lifetime member of the NAACP and attends New Bethel Baptist Evangelical Ministries, where she serves as a Trustee and Church Mother, sings in the Choir, teaches Sunday School, participates in the Hospital Ministry and organizes the youth program.



Her accolades are many. She is a recipient of the Muskegon Public Schools "Teacher of the Year" award, and the Muskegon Community College "Love In Action" award that honors the unsung heroes in our community. She received a Visiting Scholar Award with Western Michigan University, Certificate of **Recognition-Distinguished Educator** from the City of Muskegon Heights, and a Special Tribute-Valuable Contribution to African American History from the State of Michigan. In 2018, she received a Woman of Accomplishment Award from the Greater Muskegon Woman's Club, and in 2019, she was presented with the Dr. Martin Luther King Legacy Award at the annual Unity Day Breakfast and also honored as Senior Volunteer of the Year by Governor Whitmer. She was also highlighted as a Community Legacy by the

Community Foundation for Muskegon County.

Mildred received a Bachelor's of Science degree in Secondary Education at Tennessee State University; and continued postgraduate studies at Wayne State University and Western Michigan University.

She was married to the late Louis H. Johnson, Sr. for thirty-two years; and raised three amazing children who all graduated from Muskegon Heights High School and obtained college degrees: daughter Maria Johnson graduated from Michigan State University's School of Engineering; daughter Angela Johnson graduated from Tennessee State University and Western Michigan University in elementary/secondary education and administration; and son Louis Henderson Johnson, Jr. graduated from Michigan State University's School of Engineering.

Life Leadership Conference Attendees Share Their Experiences

"Initially hearing about the Life Leadership Conference, I was skeptical about attending. Not knowing if I would enjoy it, I took what I assumed to be a risk and applied anyway. Learning about leadership was just the tip of the iceberg at the conference. From the lecture content and unique backgrounds of staff to the structure of scheduling, and the various Rotary moments from speakers, this conference was truly one of the best experiences of my life.

Specifically, some of the best content provided in this conference flourished from Molly Kennedy. Molly's perfected art of motivational speaking combined with her human experiences, allowed for her to inspire and connect every soul in the conference from total strangers to best friends. Molly's content wasn't the only special thing about the conference.

The staff was absolutely amazing. Each member shared a background story in brief Rotary moments which helped get to know each family leader. A few friends and I really connected with the staff on the first night when we asked if we could DoorDash food later in the evening. Instead of shutting down the idea, the staff expressed their kindness by helping us pioneer DoorDashing food to the Life Leadership Conference.

An activity that impacted me the most was in a breakout room session. A very effective hands-on simulation displayed the differences of a boss vs. a leader. Under the boss's rules, the group was very ineffective. On the other hand, the leader let the group decide what to do themselves, as opposed to being told what to do. This turned out to be much more effective. Applying this to the real world can be super beneficial, since it sparks creativity.

Harassment Policy Adopted by the Board of Dircetors May 9, 2023

Rotary is committed to maintaining an environment that promotes safety, courtesy, dignity, and respect. All Rotary club members and individuals attending or participating in Rotary events or activities have the right to an environment free of harassment, including unwelcome physical contact, advances, or comments.

Rotarians and their guests shall demonstrate good character, integrity, and leadership by fostering a professional environment at club events and activities.

Allegations of unwelcome physical contact, advances, or comments at Rotary events or activities shall be reported to the Club President or any Board Member and shall be reviewed by the Club Board and responded to within a reasonable timeframe. If the offending individual is a member of the club board, he or she is expected to recuse himself or herself from the discussion.

Any allegation of criminal behavior should be referred to local law enforcement.

Failure to adequately address allegations of inappropriate behavior may be referred to the District Governor.

Harassment may include (but is not limited to):

- Unnecessary familiarity such as brushing against another person
- Offensive gestures, staring, ogling, or leering
- Sexual propositions or continual requests or invitations
- Physical contact, such as touching or grabbing
- Displays of sexually graphic material
- Crude or suggestive jokes

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- Unsolicited comments about a person's personal or sex life
- Physical intimidation, such as invading another person's space or blocking the way
- Comments based on gender stereotypes

Harassment may involve adults or children. Anyone, regardless of gender, can be sexually harassed. Disciplinary action may be taken against a member engaging in such conduct.

All Rotary members have a responsibility to:

- Understand what constitutes harassment
- Refrain from this behavior
- Discourage any such behavior of which they become aware

Rotary Club Presidents have a responsibility to:

- Listen and provide support to complainants
- Resolve the matter informally, locally, or
- Refer the matter to the District Governor, if unresolved

The District Governor will address unresolved complaints referred from clubs or members. All inquiries or complaints will be taken seriously, and be dealt with confidentiality and promptly.

This policy aligns with Rotary International and District 6290 Policy

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
