THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: This is What I Do

Today's program kicked off a vocational video series, hosted by local Rotarians DJ Hilson, Brianna Scott, Aaron Maike, Ammy Seymour, Emily Morgenstern, Kendrah Robinson, and Randy Lindquist, who interview men and women employed at various jobs throughout Muskegon County. Each month we interview a young person about their journey to the job they are in. The program is posted to our Muskegon Rotary web site and YouTube Channel. The MAISD is providing support to put the programs to work with local students. This program will show local Rotarians how they can help.

Rotary International celebrates seven areas of services and one is economic and community development. Rotarians will be interviewing local personnel about their careers in Muskegon.

DJ Hilson spent time with Dakota Hanson at Eagle Alloy. Dakota is the senior engineer and robotics manager. Dakota supports the production side of Eagle Alloy. He primarily is programming their robotics. Dakota noted he grew up in Muskegon and wanted to remain local. He attended Muskegon Community College and a number of other job training programs. He loves Eagle Alloy and being a part of the Muskegon Community.


Brianna Scott interviewed Contessa Alexander about her role with Greater Muskegon Economic Development. Contessa noted she helps to connect employers with employees as part of her role. She also works collaboratively to increase opportunities for growth in the employment sector. Contessa shared that we must continue to invest in our young people and their talents to enrich and diversify our workforce.

Brianna Scott noted it is great to ensure that we show students that there are viable employment opportunities in our community. There are many viable post July 13 program Muskegon Rotarians host vocational programs for youth

Aaron Maike and Emily Morgenstern noted that we have tremendous talent here in the greater Muskegon Community and we are working hard to communicate that there are fantastic career opportunities available throughout the area. There are economic opportunities available in

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both the public, private and non-profit sector. Both noted, as did their interviewee's that networking opportunities are also available along the lakeshore, such as an advertising group that meets and help each other with opportunities.

All noted that it is important for Rotarians to give back to the community and to support our youth in determining their passions, gifts and talents. They all spoke about having people in their lives that helped them to develop confidence, connections and tenacity. As Rotarians, we strengthen our community by mentoring youth and young adults, show casing the resources available to support job training and how remaining in Muskegon county grows economic stability.

New Paul Harris Fellow Jenny Hart Locke

I have been planning to present this Paul Harris Award for several years. I spoke with the Club's Paul Harris Committee Chair, Ginny Sprague, (and it's been so long that Ginny is now the Club President) about my plan, and she has reminded me more times than I can count to schedule this Paul Harris Award. It seemed like I never had the time to write the nomination and then later, my honoree was too busy to attend a meeting and of course, that individual had no idea that I was even thinking about presenting this award to them. But the time has come, and my personal, seriously planned, and dreaded retirement has been here for over 6 months, and I finally sat down and put my thoughts in order.



The highest award in Rotary is the Paul Harris Award. It is given to a Rotarian or a member of the community that has made an outstanding contribution to the community. A request can be made for an individual to be recognized as a Paul Harris Fellow and that person can be a Rotarian or a member of the community who is not a Rotarian. Rotary's overriding thought..." Service Above Self" is the motto adopted by Rotary International and signifies the belief that Rotarians...and hopefully all individuals...would put their duty to help others before their own needs.

Today's awardee is not a Rotarian and fulfills all the qualities expected of our organization and has become a close friend...really, we've become part of each other's families...and we have a remarkable relationship. We met about 13 years ago when she owned the Village Inn restaurant in Fruitport. I was part of a regular Saturday breakfast posse there and somehow; we began to bond. Her life wasn't always easy, and her mom & Dad were divorced when she and her sister were eight & five. Her Mom was bi-polar, and her dad got custody and there were many problems. Her mother, Sue, had bought the Village Inn and it was renamed Suzi's Village Inn. But she struggled with her illness and unexpectedly died in 2004. Today's awardee graduated from the nursing program at MCC and had been a Registered Nurse with Mercy for 6 years. But, after her mother died, she wanted to continue the tradition of the restaurant and bought it in 2005, and left Mercy Hospital. She owned the Village Inn for 15 years and both her sisters worked there. It was a wonderful place and I always felt like it was the TV show "Cheers," where everybody knew your name. It was a real family restaurant and showed how big a heart today's awardee has.

Today's honoree has an exceptionally long history of service above self. Her original career, as a Registered Nurse, plus her strong commitment to her Catholic faith shows that she always wanted to help others. When Father Bob Hart, the Priest at Prince of Peace Church fell ill with cancer, he was at Spectrum Hospital for almost 3 months. When he returned to Muskegon, today's honoree moved into the basement of the Rectory with her two children to care for Father Bob until his death in September 2008. Just months later, her own father was diagnosed with cancer and once again, she and her children moved in with him to provide needed

care until he died in 2010. But she has done so much more for our community. Because of her strong Catholic faith, she has worked on Catholic Central's signature fundraiser, the Rainbow Auction through the years. She has quietly helped many, many people, without publicity when they needed help. Providing food and numerous other things for her restaurant customers and friends and anyone in need.



The work that really inspired me today was her work for the Boys & Girls Club of the Muskegon Lakeshore. Before the Club formally opened...and the Board had to raise \$1,000,000 before the national organization would issue our charter... today's honoree held the Club's very first fundraiser, on her own, in the Fall of 2015 at Bella Maria's event center. Next, she hosted a second fundraiser at her home, that she called the Fall Frenzy, complete with a band and her food, which raised thousands for the brandnew club. Then, in 2016, as a new Club Board Member, she agreed to be the Co-Chair of the Great Futures Gala, to be held at my home on Mona Lake, now the signature fundraiser for the Boys & Girls Club. I was also very involved in this event in the beginning and can honestly say, her energy, time, enthusiasm, and sheer will to make it a success, is a key reason that this event has become the largest single night fundraising event in Muskegon. She won't give up and has

found many large sponsors, auction items, and helped corral her friends into volunteering, attending, and donating. Plus, her enthusiasm has been contagious and in just the brief history of the event, it has brought in well over \$1.4 Million, thanks in large part to her hard work. There are many others who have worked extremely hard on this event, and it takes a team for such a large event, but it also takes the enthusiasm of volunteers, and she a key piece of that enthusiasm.

So, today's new Paul Harris Fellow is like a daughter to me. She is married to her husband Kurt Kammeraad, and has three children, Haleigh, Brayden, and Kenzie plus a brand-new Grandson, Bodie Richard. Please help me welcome the World's newest Paul Harris Fellow and my BFF, JENNY HART LOCKE!
