Last Week's Program Eviction Prevention Program

Muskegon's Eviction Prevention Court launched in 2018 under the guidance of Maria Ladas-Hoopes, Chief Judge of the 60th District Court. A partnership was formed between Judge Ladas-Hoopes, Community enCompass, and the Department of Human Services. The three work together to support individuals in the community who receive an eviction notice by developing a solution so they are able to reside in their home.

To date, 157 households have participated in the program and 90% have paid all back rent and stayed in their homes.

A typical rent eviction is a 10-day process. However, through the eviction prevention court, tenants enter into an agreement with their landlord to pay off back rent within a 21-day period. The Department of Human Services and Community enCompass will meet with individuals to develop a plan on how they can pay the back rent in a three-week timeline. They are also addressing underlying issues, such as life skills, financial assistance, and budgeting. At the end of 21-day period, if they follow the agreement, the case will be dismissed, the tenant remains in the home with no eviction judgement on their record.

To date, 157 households have participated in the program and 90% have paid all back rent and stayed in their homes. There is still a need for more landlord participation in this community for this program. The Muskegon Community Foundation provided funding to start this program and over time the program has grown and could use additional funding to support casework.
