most segregated hours in American life, with more than 8 in 10 congregations made up of one predominant racial group.

And most worshipers like it that way.

Two-thirds of American churchgoers (67%) say their church has done enough to become racially diverse. And less than half think their church should become more diverse.

Those are among the findings of a study of church segregation by Nashville-based LifeWay Research. Researchers surveyed

994 churchgoers—who attend worship at least at holidays or more often—about race and the church. They also surveyed 1,000 Americans as well as 1,000 Protestant senior pastors.

Churchgoers, researchers found, are lukewarm about diversity. More than half (53%) disagree with the statement, "My church needs to become more ethnically diverse." Four in 10 agree.


CHILI COOK OFF

PROGRAM:

El Salvador

Rotary C club members enjoyed a presentation about the Rotary Interact international service trip to El Salvador in April 2018. El Salvador is located in the middle of Central America on the Pacific Ocean. It is surrounded on the north by Guatemala and Honduras, and touches Nicaragua on its east borders.



The group was led by D6290 Interact Chair Doug Mealey. This was Doug's 18th trip taking Interact students to El Salvador and his third year with a Michigan contention since his retirement from his previous home in New Hampshire. Those participating in the trip flew to El Salvador on March 31 and returned on April 10. From our Club and area were Esther Ricco, Haley Knight, and John Noling from Muskegon Rotary ReWine Club. Hailing from Mona Shores Rotary Interact was Ava Bentley, Sydney Fetters, Erica Pletcher, Elizabeth Zuidema, Emily Mann, with Autumn Skantz. Angela Lindsay, Bella Lindsay, and Garrett Poulin from the North Muskegon Rotary Interact. Riley Tuttle, Brady Bowen, and Tommy Shawl were also representing the Orchard View Rotary Interact Club.

They worked in partnership with El Salvador Rotary: Club Rotario San Salvador Noro Este (North East) and Club Rotarian San Salvador Cuscatlán. Altogether, there were 72 participants in 2018 (51 Interactors and 21 Rotarians, Rotaractors, and many Interact Alumni). Several Interact clubs were represented: Muskegon had three clubs with 12 students, and Houghton Lake had 18 students. Ada Cascade; Allendale; South Kent; Charlestown, NH; Keene, NH; Keene Elm City, NH; and Corning, NY also sent representatives.

Since 2000, there has been one student trip per year, 138 homes have been built, known as "Rotary Town", they have remodeled the Child Care Center, built a medical clinic in a neighboring town, had \$300,000 in hospital donations, and 20 major clothing donations.

They have also started a chicken farm, three bakeries, three sewing trade shops, supplied seven elementary schools with

school supplies and athletic equipment, provided computers (not new, but in great working condition) for an orphanage, along with rebuilding its existing structure.

Interact VP; Bella Lindsay, daughter of **Zabrina Santiago**, and VP of North Muskegon Interact.

They spoke about their experiences working on houses in Tanique which is



about an hour by bus from their hotel, the Hotel Alamo. Everyone helped with the house building. They split into different teams in order to serve and be most effective. On Monday, April 2, they worked on four different houses, they being 60 El Salvadoran Interactors and there Rotaractors from Noro Este. Some local clubs arrived to help them out, so with their 70 people, there were at least 133 workers plus the families receiving the house, all more than helpful and extremely hard workers.



They didn't experience fear of anything negative. The area was overtly safe, but they did have a military escort. The people were happy to see them again and greeted them with smiles and hugs. All the Interactors mingled, worked and slept well, and had fun.

In the area of town where most of the work was done, the locals refer to it area as Rotary Town.



It was a life-changing experience for the participants. They were amazed at how happy people could be with so little, and



experienced cultures very different from what they were used to. Many fun things were not quite what they expected and not understood until cast in the middle of it. They found the people amazing, warm and inviting, and always ready to help. The families they were building the houses for are required to work a certain amount of time. But they found not just the families, but extended family, friends, and neighbors were out in the heat ready to lend a hand. Even the children worked hard

They made their lunches at the hotel (peanut butter and jelly sandwiches) and ate lunch at the worksite. After work one day, they went back to the hotel and got cleaned up and went to the home of the president of the Noro Este Rotary Club for a pizza party with the 70 of them and 30 Rotary Interactors from San Salvador. They had Coke, water and nuts. They danced and sang. It was a great international event.

Regarding food, they generally had breakfast (scrambled eggs with ham, refried beans, rolls, three kinds of cereal, yogurt, orange juice and coffee) and dinner at the hotel. One day their meal consisted of pancakes, cereal, yogurt, orange juice, rolls and, of course, some real New Hampshire maple syrup complements of one of the other Interactors; separated were baked potatoes, steamed veggies, chicken breast, rolls, and beverage. The food was terrific.

Another experience they had was a visit to the girl's school, one morning. They made crafts with the students and a

group of the girls performed a dance and then they danced together. The girl's school was a heartwarming experience that was unforgettable. The dances, games, crafts, communications and the bonds that were built with the young children of different culture was very emotional. Then lunch was on the bus while traveling to Tanique.

Along with all the hard work they got to have cultural exposure. They got to go to the ocean one day, a waterfall another day, and the Mayan ruins in a museum another day. They had a chance to visit them all and some of them got a chance to get ice cream there.

Many of them developed strong bonds with the kids over the week which made for very emotional goodbyes. The friendships that they made and the



experiences they had were amazing.

All this work helped them understand new things. They learned what real work there is in building houses. It shows them how lucky they had been throughout their lifetime. The kids there have to work. From age 5, they are shoveling mortar. They are very strong. That only from lifting Plex of cement, but they are they are mentally and emotionally strong as well.

They found everything they are in EI Salvador amazing. The food was amazing and they were very thankful for the amazing trip that they were on and many of them want to return in future years
