CONSIDERING CULTURE

Culture is all around us. It is in our families, schools, businesses, churches, and communities. Culture is largely considered the ecosystem of humanity with its invisible attitudes, habits, patterns, and behaviors. It can be guiet or loud, healthy or unhealthy, well designed for the long-term or short-term and unmeasurable. One way or another, culture is always present.

Consider with me today the corporate culture of businesses and organizations; those entities where the habits of employees, leadership, stakeholders and vendors happen every day. A company may experience a corporate climate of success and productivity, where goals and customer service exceed expectation and employees are working beyond physical capacity. "The bottom line is good...and could be healthier"; so, we add pressure to management and team leads to make the company even more lean. Retention is good but there is an unusual number of employees who have job jeopardy status due to being disengaged. What is really happening here? What is running the company? When leadership isn't present, what is it like?

Shadow Culture is the existence of default habits and behaviors that really run the organization (although it looks differently, this also happens in families). It has immense influence over the direction and longevity of a company. It carries within its sphere of influence attributes such as low employee engagement, absenteeism, workplace distress, bullying and harassment, and poor mental and physical health. Shadow culture is hard to recognize by management and leadership teams while slowly creeping into processes and systems, creating pain points for employees and organization, and leaving nearly 50% of the workforce unengaged. As Peter Drucker puts it, "Shadow culture eats strategy for breakfast".

Aspiration Culture is found when there is a healthy environment that is fully aligned with its corporate (and family) mission and a competent leadership team that is walking its talk. This culture inspires and influences first through trust, which is built with doing what you say you are going to do, alignment, authenticity, training, transformation, and healthy habits. The result is improved engagement. When employees feel cared for and are comfortable bringing their 'whole self' (with all its humanness) to work each day, they are confident those in leadership positions are intentional about helping them become their 'best self'.


