End Polio Now

Susan Crain: Despite a significant shortfall a couple months out, RI reached the \$50 million annual PolioPlus commitment and was therefore matched \$100 million by the Gates Foundation. This was in addition to the \$20 million RI provided earlier in year to communities worldwide for Covid-19 response.

District 6290 clubs donated \$64,485 to PolioPlus during the year. Down from previous year's \$97,374, but not bad considering many PP fundraising events were canceled. Shout-outs go to the District's top 5 donating clubs; Petoskey, Muskegon, Lowell, Spring Lake and Grayling.... Nicely done clubs! In 1988 the annual number of cases was 350,000. It has been reduced by 99.9%.

Love Lives Here

Marcia Hovey-Wright reported the LLH committee decided they are not going to do any events. However, they will be offering pins for \$3 and (coming soon) masks. Brianna Scott still has about 12 signs at her office. Many signs were distributed during a demonstration at the Farmers Market.

COVID-19 Update

Kathy Moore: Muskegon County is currently at 1,051 cases of unduplicated cases with a total of 55 deaths. They continue to see a slight uptick in the number of testings and cases, although the positive rate remains the same. The increase continues to be in the younger age groups (20-29) and mostly related to unstructured social activities. Yesterday Governor Whitmer put into place an executive order to limit indoor gatherings to 10 people and outdoor to 100 people. That means no in-person Rotary meetings in sight yet.

July 30 Program: Mental Health in Muskegon presented by Cece Riley and Lauren Meldrum from HealthWest.

HealthWest (formerly Community Mental Health) is a service provider for Muskegon County. Operationally it looks quite different since the COVID-19 pandemic, but continues to be fully operational. There are about 350 staff members in seven locations; although during COVID they went down to one main campus (the Mental Health Center Campus on Apple Ave.). Slowly they are now opening other locations.



The type of support they provide varies for people who are enrolled and the community at large. Active enrollees are primarily Medicaid; however, they are starting to take more private insurance. They offer a variety of services including pharmaceutical, dental, lab, and psychicatric services. Community-wide they are moving in a direction of prevention and education services. They are now offering mental health training, suicide prevention, social media, burnout and compassion training for businesses and individuals on request. They are rotating one-onone work with organizations like West Michigan Works, Hackley Library, and the Lakeshore Museum Center to meet needs of their employees. A psychiatric first aid team led by HealthWest staff responds to traumatic events in the community such as a natural disaster, death, anything that a person or family deems was a traumatic experience.

Their longstanding relationship with local law enforcement includes the Handle With Care Initiative. Partnering with law enforcement and the Intermediate School District, this is a model implemented in other communities that they have replicated. When there are children in a home affected by trauma, law enforcement sends a form to the school with childrens' names that just says "handle with care" to give the school a heads up.

They have also done a great deal of deescalization training in mental health, as well as jail diversion services with the court system.

Something new developed during COVID is police departments equipped with iPads to reach clinicians directly when out on a call. This could involve deescalization or just to connect with the family. This program just started with Norton Shores and recently Muskegon Township.

My Alliance is s county-wide mobile response unit for a family or youth in crisis can be dispatched to a home or location of choice to create a safety plan.



Lauren Meldrum, HealthWest

HealthWest has worked closely with Muskegon County with the Mask Up campaign. This includes collecting fabric masks at HealthWest and redistributing. They have provided fabric masks to all MATS bus riders, all inmates released from Muskegon County Jail, and COVID Care Kit giveaways. They have partnerships with organizations in Muskegon Heights and will receive about 4000 more masks to distribute. If you know somewhere that could use them, reach out to HealthWest. The kit comes with a card that tells how COVID spreads.

A Business Honors campaign has been started to celebrate and recognize businesses that have gone above and beyond. They have received over 55 nominations for various businesses in Muskegon County and have celebrated about 10 businessess so far. They encourage nominations for something they have done that is innovative or cool in response to COVID-19. Check their Facebook page to see businesses awarded or nominate a business here.
