# Protecting Older Adults from Financial Exploitation: A Team Based Approach By Stacey Cornell

Last week, **Kris Collee**, Executive Director of AgeWell Services, introduced the presentation team and gave a brief overview of SafeSeniors Muskegon County. The panelists presented in the following order:

Kris opened the presentation and talked about the need to protect our seniors in the community and what's been happening. Scams are on the rise, both on phone and in person. Seniors are often somewhat isolated and this pandemic has increased that isolation.

Loneliness can increase vulnerability. With the rising costs of medical and nursing home care, seniors need their savings more than ever. We can prevent abuse through education.

Advocates are needed to prevent abuse and neglect. SafeSeniors is a collaborative that works well together. Previously known as Vulnerable Adult Multi-Disciplinary Team, the task force formed in Muskegon County in 2018 with the focus of justice for older adult victims of abuse, neglect and financial exploitation. It is funded by grants through Senior Resources of West Michigan, from the Muskegon County Senior Millage and the Older Americans Act.

Muskegon County Prosecutor **DJ Hilson**, below, gave thanks to many for their service on this task force which is even more important as the population ages and expands. Scams, financial exploitations and physical abuse are often perpetrated by someone the victim knows and loves.



task force is victim-centered and takes the extra time needed to support victims. The team can work anywhere in the county. Information to educate older citizens is delivered along with meals which allows them to reach the isolated who are more likely to be victimized. Even once the pandemic subsides, it's anticipated that older relatives will be targeted by scammers. The task force currently has 22 cases and statistics will be shared as the program continues.

Elder Abuse Task Force Detective Bruce Morningstar of the Norton Shores Police Department considers




the time put into the labor-intensive investigations well worth it for the long-term members of our community who have contributed so much. The goal is to stop victimization in a way that makes the perpetrators stop. This includes treating cases as criminal rather than just civil but also working at gaining restitution. It can take a while before missing funds are noticed.

Sometimes cases turn out to be linked and solving one case can lead to solving another.

**Chris Burnaw**, coordinator for SafeSeniors, provided tips and tricks for prevention and recognition of scams.

- 1. Protect yourself and your assets monitor your assets and/or work with a trusted reputable company to have them managed for you. Keep sensitive documents locked up. Emphasize that NO ONE is entitled to your assets unless you say so, even your family.
- 2. Remember that not everyone is a friend. Top scams right now are callers asking for banking and/or social security information to receive the

stimulus check, fake charities and fake contact tracing. People on the phone may not actually be from the institution listed on caller ID.



Scams are always changing. Call 211 or SafeSeniors for help.

# A little more history from Bob Scolnik

The lockdown has given me time to look through old photos, some of which I had forgotten I even had.

This picture was taken in Korea, in late 1969. I don't remember names, but the full Bird Colonel who was the Commander of the 2nd Transportation Terminal Command promoted me to Captain and was putting on my new Captain's insignia with his Executive Officer. This was a big deal for me, just 3 years after enlisting as a Private E1.

I was stationed at the Port of Pusan in southern Korea, as the Battalion S4 Officer. We were the only floating unit in the entire Army, with our offices located on a huge barge made of concrete. Our main function in those days was unloading large freighters, primarily carrying ammunition. There was a mountain of ammunition stored there, and I mean a mountain. Artillery shells, mortar rounds, rifle and machine gun ammunition...I have no idea, but much would go to Vietnam.

In those years, I was all-in and loved the Army. I had reenlisted for another year and received orders to go to Grand Rapids as the Senior Advisor to the Army Reserve in units throughout West Michigan. I had never heard of Grand Rapids and had to find a map to see where I was going.

I spent 8 weeks in a tent at Camp Grayling that summer evaluating various unit's summer training. Grand Rapids was not a suitable assignment for an Army career, Vietnam was starting to wind down and best of all, I met Merle at a church singles dance in Grand Rapids. I left the Army after 4 years in December 1970. That Church Singles Dance deserves another post! God had a plan.
