found that the individuals had children, were working hard just to pay bills, and were real people. She said regardless of your political views, this is the humanity piece of immigration. It's been a great effort that now includes Detroit, where Michigan's immigration office is located allowing for attorneys on the east side of the state to practice in court. Most of the cases are in Dearborn, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Traverse City and Ypsilanti. They will expand to Muskegon, if the need grows.

Most cases are family petitions for a close relative in another country such as grandparents, children, or parents. The cases include adjustment of status, green card, naturalization, asylum applications (can take up to 5 years) representation in Immigration Court, and students trying to go to college. They offer advice and counsel, and
