
- Lorraine noted that jobs were being allocated for our 80th next Saturday, to be circulated by email. She also noted that the directors and service committee chairmen need to prepare their reports and email them to her for inclusion in the annual report. The youth exchange program is still looking for host clubs.
- Noel reported that we will need people for the Harness racing on the Queen's Birthday Monday (12th June).
- May is bowel scan month and it seems to be going well, but reminders to anyone who has not yet participated.
- Kevin reported that the HDSC project for transporting the Casterton students will be assisted by Jodie ringing to remind drivers.
- Murray then ran a quick fines session.

John then introduced Simon Wilson to talk about his role as an Air Observer for fire spotting with the CFA. The air observers are a small group of volunteers who act as eyes in the sky to report any fire activity. There are both CFA and DELWP observers, they are both trained and accredited to the same standards. This training needs to be updated every 5 years and they need to be flying at least every 15 months to remain current. Simon's role is based at Hamilton airport and covers district 5 for the CFA, although occasionally they will get called out to assist in other districts. These CFA volunteers go into action on bad fire days. They are members of the headquarters brigade. Hamilton air base is one of the best in Victoria and is fully staffed by CFA volunteers and that is quite unusual. All aircraft in the aviation fire service are under the control of the State Aircraft Unit.

On a typical fire risk day, they start with a briefing in the morning and then do a patrol around region 5 taking 1.5 - 2 hours, come back for lunch and then do it again in the afternoon. This will be looking for new fires and reviewing old ones. Of course, if they spot something then the action happens and they report it in. Basically, they are looking for smoke or blackened areas, because flames are quite hard to see from the air. They will usually be the first people to see a fire and they report it in to the incident control centre, then hang around to assist. An interesting recent improvement is the ability to use a phone app to photograph the fire and automatically note its location using the built-in GPS ability. The planes are flown by very experienced pilots and they need to be because flying conditions on these days can be quite poor. On most days, nothing happens and it is relatively boring, but that is a good result.

When there is a fire, the airspace can become quite crowded with fire attack bombers and an air attack supervisor as well as any ground crews in tankers etc so a lot of co-ordination is required. The CFA has recently adopted Pre- Determined Dispatch (PDD) for the air tankers. This means that they are notified at the same time as the ground trucks and they can usually get the fire before the trucks, this means that the fire can be slowed down giving the trucks a much better chance to achieve quick control. Simon believes this DPP system has revolutionized fire-fighting - quick action keeps them small! They use several different types of planes but the common one is a Cessna 337 with a push pull engine/propeller system. Although it is an old plane it is kept up to date and very suitable for the purpose. Simon's work space in the plane is very limited and he juggles notepads, maps, GPS, IPads, log books, many pens and 3-4 radios. Thanks Simon for an interesting talk and it was good to see some aerial photos of the fire scenes.
