### GUEST SPEAKER – JENNY CLARK, SPEAKING ON HER TIME IN UGANDA:

Jenny is a school teacher and has been working in Uganda for an Australian organization called School for Life Foundation, which only works in Uganda. It was started on 2008, and hundreds of thousands of dollars have been raised for the children and schools, so that the children in the Primary and Secondary schools can get the education they are entitled to.

The schools have a student teacher ratio of 20:1, and only employed qualified teachers.

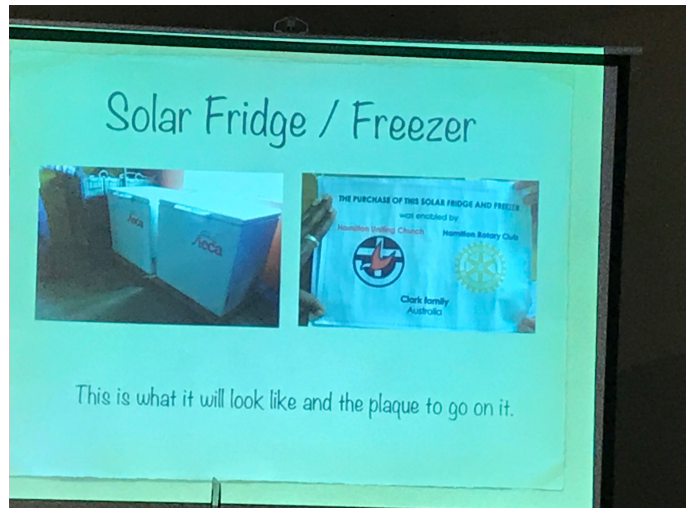
Both schools have their own Health Clinics, with a full-time registered nurse who offers much-needed primary healthcare to students and staff. As well as providing First Aid, basic check-ups, malaria testing and medication, the school nurses provide health promotion campaigns and workshops for the whole community. They also provide mosquito nets, and have organised pit latrines and hand-washing facilities. School for Life provides vegetables from the school farm. They provide clean drinking water to the community, and have installed two 100,000 litre underground tanks to catch clean water from the school roof.

The solar refrigerator that the Hamilton Rotary Club helped to provide keeps the medications in it.

There is no electricity so it had to be a solar one.

Many of the women in the village learn to sew, to earn some money to pay school fees, and the men are learning subsistence farming.

## EDITOR'S NOTE.

It's important to tell readers of the Bulletin what our club members do at Hamilton Harness Races. On a regular meeting, at least 3 members are needed for 2 hour shifts to man the horse entrance. To record each Trainer and horse as they arrive and advise them which stall they are allocated. On average, it is about 60 horse arrivals to record. For safety reasons, if a horse bolts, the Rotarian is to close the sliding gate to prevent the horse bolting into the car park. It nearly happened yesterday when Kevin was there as a horse did bolt unattended. Annually the club can earn about \$2000 from providing this service.

Willis Duncan co-ordinates the roster and maintains a liaison with Hamilton Harness Club. The photographs show a horse on arrival being greeted by Kevin Safe, the office recording system and of the stalls with horses waiting their turn to race.
