Bowelscan: Rotary no longer organising this program Kits available all year round online or from pharmacies

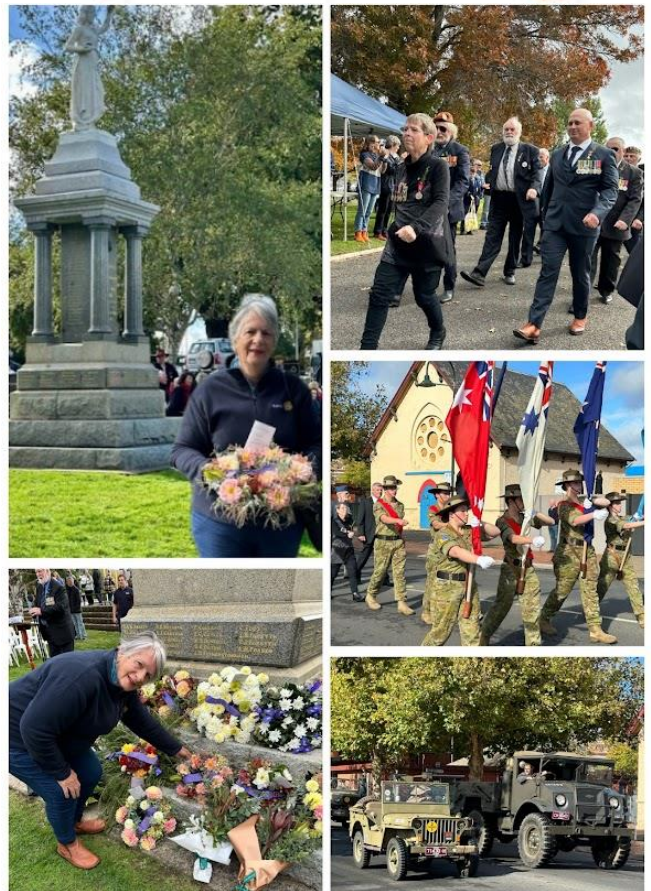

VACCINES SAVE 154M SINCE 1974

Geneva: Global immunisation efforts have saved at least 154 million lives in the past 50 years, the World Health Organisation says, adding most of those to benefit were infants.

That is the equivalent of six lives saved every minute of every year of the half century, the UN health agency said.

In a study published in the Lancet, WHO gave a comprehensive analysis of the impact of 14 vaccines used under the Expanded Programme on Immunisation, which celebrates its 50th anniversary next month.

Thanks to these vaccines, "a child born today is 40 per cent more likely to see their fifth birthday than a child born 50 years ago", WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told reporters.

"Vaccines are among the most powerful inventions in history, making once-feared diseases preventable," he said.

"Smallpox has been eradicated, polio is on the brink, and with the more recent development of vaccines against diseases like malaria and cervical cancer, we are pushing back the frontiers of disease." Infants accounted for 101 million of the lives saved through immunisation over the five decades, says the study. (Herald Sun Friday 26 April 2024)
