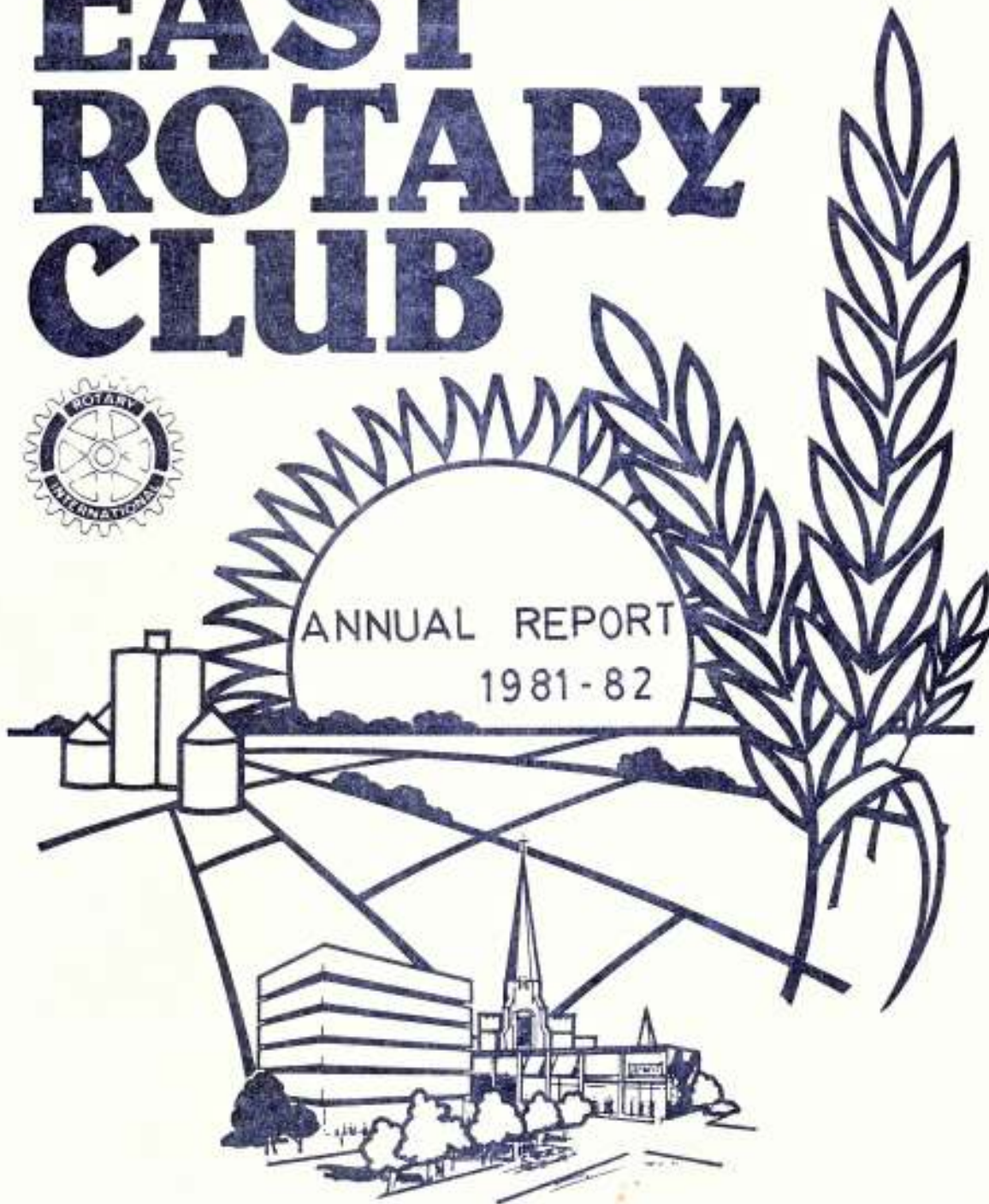

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1981/82

Another Rotary year has passed and so we progress from an old theme to a new one.

The 1981/82 Rotary International slogan was "World Understanding and Peace through Rotary", and what a great challenge that slogan represented. How did we, the Horsham East Rotary Club, measure up?

During the year our programmes encompassed a wide variety of speakers and functions. To recall just a few we remember a successful Golf Day after which our families enjoyed a meal together, a Quiz Night under the leadership of Rotn Peter Halse, a Ladies Night with Ann Coates who spoke to us about India. Speakers from England, Canada and the U.S.A., speakers from our own Club, Club Assemblies, combined meetings with the Horsham, Stavell and Varracknabeal Rotary Clubs, a Christmas Dinner, Family Barbecues, and a wonderful Karkans Disco.

Amongst the club projects were the successful drink selling days at the Show, the record door knock collection for the Heart Appeal and our Annual Art Show.

Five Horsham East Rotarians were fortunate enough to attend the Pacific Regional Conference. It was certainly a privilege to see and listen to the Leaders of Rotary in our region of the world. However, the highlight of that conference was to sit at the feet of Rotary International World President Stan McCaffrey who was a tremendous source of inspiration and motivation in conveying and putting into practice, his theme of 'World Understanding and Peace' through Rotary.

In the early days of March Horsham East together with Horsham Rotary Clubs had the honour of hosting the Group Study Exchange team from Iowa, U.S.A. What wonderful ambassadors these young men were. Through their visit we were able to identify with the citizens of their community and with their way of life.

In reviewing the year's programme we recall the District Governor's guidelines left with us at his visit in August. He said, "Be enthusiastic, be patient, have confidence, have pride in Rotary, wherever you are and whatever you are doing, do it with a smile".

District Governor Jack Hill need not be disappointed. I believe that his qualifications have been fulfilled by the members of Horsham East Rotary Club, firstly in their regular attendance at club meetings, secondly in their support of their directors programmes and the rallying together at working bees and thirdly in the unsurpassed fellowship that we have enjoyed together this year.

It has been a year where understanding and peace has begun on a member to member basis, extended to a club to club basis and has even reached, through Group Study Exchange and Student Exchange, to a country to country level. Given the strong spirit of fellowship which prevails within the Rotary Club the Fellowship Committee were very well supported by Rotarians and wives during the year and overall did not have a very difficult job to do at all.

The close liaison with the Programme Committee meant those functions involving the Fellowship Committee were very much part of the total Club Programme and this was a most satisfactory arrangement.

A brief outline of these activities follows :-

1. LADIES NIGHTS

Early in the Rotary year the Vocational Service Committee decided it would approach its year's task on two levels. The underlying task was to make Rotary applicable to each Rotarian's work. This is the unique aspect of Rotary, reflected in the object of Rotary, and the obligation that derives from holding a classification in a Rotary club. At the first level we brought forward the need to apply Rotary principles to each Rotarian's business dealings by verbal and written appeals to members.

At a second, indirect, level members of the committee organised various activities. Each fortnight Bob Hibus organised members to present two-minute talks on new developments in their vocations. Bob has also put in a great deal of groundwork preparing for vocational exchanges for Horsham apprentices. Following a great deal of assistance from Tom Deans, and others at Horsham Technical School, we are hoping for an initial exchange between an apprentice from Lind-Weight Autos and a G.M.H. apprentice from Melbourne. This could pave the way for future apprentice exchanges.

Roger Halse led the club in a vocational case study during Rotary's Vocational Service Week in October. Roger also organised the vocational visit to Wimmera Base Hospital's engineering department. Members who attended saw behind the scenes operations that service the better known activities of the hospital - the boilers, water filtration plant, bulk oxygen, medical gases, group laundry and the new intensive care unit. Thanks to Tom Martin and John Hudson for sharing their time and expertise.

This visit took the place of the originally planned visit to Wallace Reynold's Sharlea wood producing property. The work put in by Kevin Plush and Fred Guy should be helpful for next year's committee. Another planned activity, an Equal Opportunities discussion evening, was adopted by the Fellowship committee. An address by the Immediate Past State President of the Royal Victorian Association of Honorary Justices, Mr Bill Cuddihy, informed us about Justices of the Peace and their vocations.

Past President Bill Ower organised a "think-tank" evening to discuss business problems. Schwarz Breads Pty Ltd supplied the problems and a number of club members supplied constructive suggestions. This proved to be an informative exercise for all who participated and we wish Soft-n-Fresh and the other innovations the best of luck. It is hoped that other businesses will share problems for future think-tanks (perhaps smaller problems??!!).

We hope that our efforts have been rewarded by more Rotarians applying the four-way test to their vocational dealings.

COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT

The year commenced in a flurry with activities planned for practically each of the first six months tapering off in 1982.

Under the capable leadership of Rtn Tom Speakman the Rotary Golf Day on the 9th August 1981 proved an outstanding success. The members and their families joined the golfers at the barbecue evening meal to add to the enjoyment.

The month of October saw the sale of drinks and ice-cream at the Horsham Show on the 1st and the National Heart Appeal on the 25th. Receipts from both of these functions of Show \$939 and Appeal of \$3,632.70, resulting in a donation of \$729.94 to the Wimmera Base Hospital, reflected the energy devoted to and the fellowship gained from these activities.

This was followed by the Wimmera Art Show on the 5th, 6th and 7th November 1981 which achieved its objective in contributing to the art appreciation of the citizens of Horsham and district. Thanks Chairman Geoff Chisholm and his team for their efforts.

Mrs Kate McIntyre gained by the exertion and herculean energies of the "old" team, particularly Jim Lonsdale and John Heid in the preparation and sowing of the hectare of nature strip - blisters, manure and all.

Extended planning for a disco/barbecue night culminated in the event occurring at the Karkana Centre on the 6th May 1982. The joy and pleasure shown by the students and Terang visitors aided by the generous donation of sponsors amply repaid the endeavours of the Committee.

Continuing commitments associated with Meals on Wheels, attendance at River Beautification Committee meetings and maintenance of the Club's river frontage area and Veta Landt Memorial Foundation were undertaken to further consolidate the name of Horsham East Rotary.

Now commencing as a continuing project in 1982/83 is the restoration of the Samuel May Monument in May Park. Planning is well in hand with the objective of completing the work by the City of Horsham Centenary celebrations commencing on the 17th November 1982.

Such achievements cannot occur without the support and encouragement of all participants and for this I must express my appreciation to the Community Service members in particular and all Rotarians in general.

Such behoves success and dedication to voluntary projects gains a far greater reward than money can buy, however do not let us rest on our laurels. Let us look to wider horizons and expand Rotary Service to a level worthy of Rotary and ourselves.

INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT.

Our Committee's first project, a follow on from the previous year, was to take part in a committee to bring out refugees from the camps in Asia. We succeeded in bringing out four Vietmanese families, one of them sponsored by Horsham East Rotary Club. As well as offering financial support to help the family obtain a house to rent and purchase suitable clothes, we considered giving the family moral support to be our most important task. As our family was a single parent family we bought them a few meals and visited the mother daily when they first arrived.

As the original house was too large and expensive for the family's circumstances, we arranged the rental of a cheaper flat and held a working bee to clean and paint it. Because of domestic problems the family left Horsham after a while. The other families were only able to find part-time work, despite our efforts to find full-time work for them, and eventually moved to Melbourne. In Melbourne they have been able to find full-time employment so we have been successful in helping some people escape the horrors of refugee camps.

A family night, in the form of a barbeque, was held by the Committee. The wives of committee members provided salads to supplement the meat. The night was a great social and financial success, and the money raised is going to help leprosy patients in New Guinea - an International Projects Advisory Committee project.

As in past years members of the Club supported Fourth Avenue in Motion projects in the Pacific region by making a donation to F.A.I.M. Once again we achieved 100% membership.

Rotary Foundation's Group Study Exchange programme were supported on both an outgoing and incoming basis. Of the four nominees from Club members for outgoing exchange, Steve Devlin was formally nominated by Horsham Rotary Club, and was selected to represent District 978 in the team which visited West Germany. Three of the incoming team from Iowa U.S.A. were hosted by Club members. At a combined meeting with the Horsham Rotary Club we had the pleasure of learning more about Iowa.

We hope that through the above programme, we have done our small part in helping advance international understanding, goodwill and peace through Rotary.

During the year the Club decided to host and exchange student every alternate year and consequently we will not be involved in the 1982/83 programme.

Rotarian Ivan Pearson continued to serve in the area of youth activities at district level and he now brings to our Club great experience in this field.

Rotarian Tom Martin handled this aspect in conjunction with Horsham Rotary. Our successful applicant was Rotaractor John Klowss who attended the week long course at Glenormiston College in May this year. The experience should be very valuable to John to Rotaract over the next few years.

All Youth Committee members and some of our Past Presidents have regularly attended Rotaract meetings throughout the year. The Club, which was unfortunate in losing a number of good members during the first half of the year, started to experience some difficulties. Rotarians were quick to see this trend and a sub-committee of Daryl Schwarz, Gordon Ryan and Cliff Evans was formed to advise the Clubs' executive. At the same time we endeavoured to assist in building Club membership. Steady progress has been made and our Committee feels that the Rotaract Club can look forward to a successful year in 1982/83 under the guidance of the Horsham Rotary Club.

I would like to thank members of the Youth Committee for their efforts throughout the year and President James for his encouragement.

TREASURER'S REPORT

1. Deficit on the Fellowship line caused mainly by dinners ordered and not paid for by members (A/L).
2. A cheque payable to Fairey Australasia (Not Negotiable) was inadvertently sent to RDU and was banked by them.
As a consequence RDU hold a credit of \$52.50 - Recommended that all cheques be stamped Credit Account Payee Only.
3. Rotary Foundation line in the General Account stands at \$81.90 credit.
4. Despite expenditure on two years (or more) supply of banners and gift glasses as well as several other non-recurring expenses, a modest surplus (\$215) was developed. This reinforces the need for accurate budgetting.
5. With respect to National Heart Foundation Appeal - Gross donations amounted to \$3,598.69. Of this amount \$729.94 was refunded by the National Heart Foundation and subsequently donated to the Timmers Base Hospital as required.
