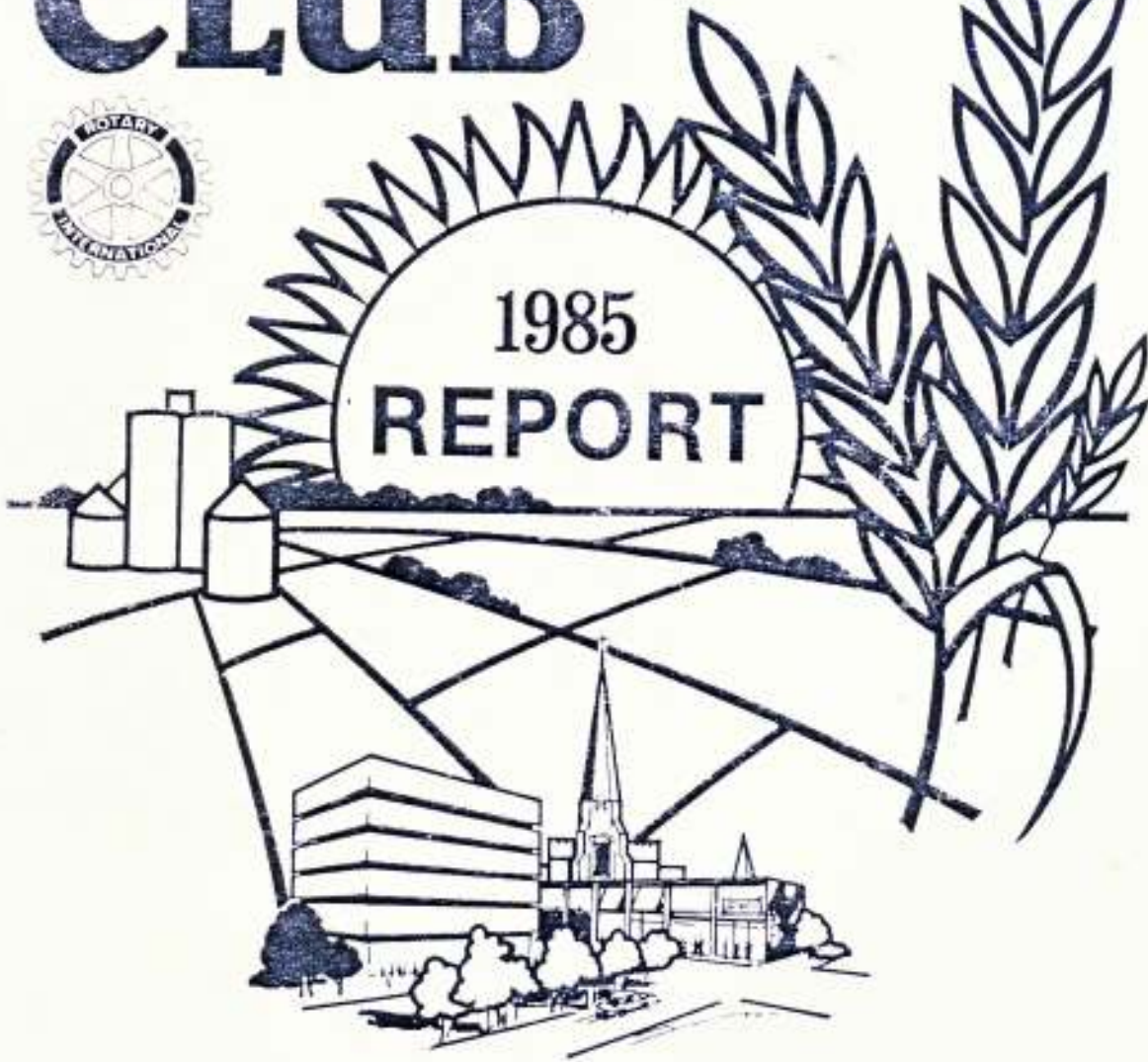

Service Association Incorporated", the incorporated body.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT 1984-1985

It is with considerable pleasure that I submit this report on the activities in the field of International Service during the past year.

Due to the excellent efforts of Rotarian Joe Freijah, our club can now claim to have a much larger percentage of Life Membership in FAIM. From the numbers which could have been counted on the fingers of one hand, we now record 47 Life Members for this worthy organization. PP Barry Downs of Hamilton presented an interesting record of a FAIM working team on October 31st. Perhaps as a result of this, four of our Rotarians made application to serve in a similar experience, but more on this later.

Unfortunately, our efforts to establish contact by mail with a club in District 187, West Germany, seem to be unsuccessful at this stage. Contact with R.C. of Gelsenkirchen-Nord indicated that they were heavily committed in this field and a subsequent attempt has been disappointing to date.

World understanding Month of February was celebrated by members of our club when they worked hard with assistance at the Horsham Indoor Archery Tournament. Although the event did not attract a large international entry, (6 visitors from USA and 1 from Holland), the 187 participants were greatly impressed by the efforts of Rotary to assist. The international side of archery was explained by Keith Gaisford of W.A. to a general meeting on February 20th.

Although this project is much too large to be undertaken on a regular annual basis by the Horsham Company of Archers, much experience was gained and contacts were made. There is no doubt that the event was particularly well received and indications are that a much wider overseas response could be expected should the event be continued. It might be that this is Horsham's opportunity to regularly stage a world recognized event. There is no doubt that others are waiting for an opening to replace the event in NSW or Queensland.

An orphanage on Bholia Island (Bangladesh) was the recipient of a donation of \$360 from our Club. This establishment caters for boys in a rural environment and aims at self sufficiency. The contribution is sufficient to provide sponsorship for 2 boys for 12 months.

The board similarly approved a contribution of \$200.00 towards a joint aid project with other clubs in our zone. This is being directed towards a Nursing and Health Centre at Dogura, Milne Bay Province, Papua New Guinea.

During the month of March we had opportunity to greet members of incoming Group Study Exchange team from district 712, New York State. On March 7th members had opportunity to meet these visitors during the day as well as at a joint meeting with the Horsham Club.

As you read this report, Rotarian Kevin Plush and Joan, and Rotarian Norm Murch are making final arrangements for their participation in working teams on Yule Island off Port Moresby. We wish them well and look forward eagerly to hear of their experiences on return.

In conclusion, I extend my thanks to members of the International Service Committee for their support and assistance.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT 1984-85

Members of the Vocational Service Committee at their first meeting were conscious of the vocational problems within the Community and the serious nature of some of these particularly Youth Unemployment. At the same time they felt powerless to take any meaningful action to in any way alleviate this complex and widespread difficulty. This inability to take action was rather disappointing and frustrating.

However, in some other areas efforts were more successful. Ross Both kept the Program Committee supplied with names of Rotarians to provide two minute vocational talks each fortnight, these talks again proved to be one of the most interesting and popular segments of our meetings.

Two successful factory visits were held during the year. In August the Club met at the Wimmera Wool Factory for a meal and meeting in the Administrative Building, followed by a guided tour of the Factory and Workshop; and in October to mark Vocational Service Month, Rotarians were shown over the Lysaght (now L.B.I.) plant by Graham Colley, after dinner and a shortened meeting at the Golf Club.

The Committee also considered the possibility of arranging a public screening of safety films but had difficulty in deciding the most effective way of carrying this out. Finally to gauge the reaction of Rotarians two films were shown at a Club Meeting in February. As a result it was considered that a safety week could be planned with displays of safety and protective clothing and appliances, showing of films and hopefully with the co-operation and backing of Local Small Industrial and Commercial Firms. These ideas will be passed on to the incoming Vocational Committee.

In May a Computer Awareness night was held at Longerenong College which proved to be a most interesting and instructive evening. Computers were on display from the College, Wimmera Office and School Supplies, and Vulcan Foundry - in all seven different machines showing differing application. The displays were the centre of attraction after introductions by Lindsay Smith and representatives of the three organisations.

The Committee Wishes to sincerely thank all Rotarians and others who have assisted in any way, particularly those who helped to make the Wool Factory, Lysaght and Longeranong visits so successful.

Applicants were called for outward exchange students, the schools were written to and an Ad. was placed in the papers. This resulted in only one application being submitted who was not successful at the interview, a very disappointing result for this valuable and very worthwhile program.

A similar situation exists with an inward exchange student; both the Committee and Board rejected an applicant and we requested another, but to the end of May we had not received another application. However, it was ratified on the 19th June 1985 that the Club accept an inward exchange student from the Netherlands. Her Name is Ann Hulsoff and we can expect to see her sometime in August - September this year.

The Develop Victoria Council called applications for a Community Service Award, in the International Year of the Youth; the Horsham entrant was Gary White Conductor of the Horsham High School Concert Band.

Our final activity for the year was to assist the District Interviews by way of arranging Host Families for 5 exchange students, on the Friday and Saturday night.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all Committee Men who were ready and willing when any requests were made of them - A sincere "thanks".

This is International Year of the Youth and I commend this to the Incoming Committee. Nothing has been finally decided as to how the Club may participate, therefore I urge all members to give consideration and in turn pass on their ideas to the Incoming Committee.

The twelfth Wimmera Art-Craft Exhibition was held in the Horsham Town Hall on May 3rd, 4th and 5th this year and proved to be a most successful show.

The entries were of a particularly high standard as was reflected in the value of sales which amounted to \$11,796.60. Displays of craft work were numerous and well presented proving to be popular among the many people who attended the Exhibition over the three days.

Profit from the Exhibition was approximately \$1,850.00 was incurred in addition for the construction of a set of magnificent stands which displayed the paintings to their best advantage and; provided the Club with an asset of several times this cost.
