The restrictions provided opportunities to improve our remote e-communication skills and to keep in touch with virtual and in-person presentations from our local community. Following the Rotary monthly themes gave us a workable structure and we made use of the time to plan for a different future.

Our meetings were well attended, 18 - 25 regularly on zoom similar to in-person dinner meetings. Some of our members took leave because of the dramatic impact that COVID 19 was having on their health, businesses and families, yet retained their interest and support even when they could not attend club meetings and events. Some members advised that Zoom was not easy for them and attended only when in person.

Our members not only give to Rotary at many levels, but also to the wider Maryborough community organisations such as Havilah Hostel Inc, Committee for Maryborough, Goldfields Education and Learning Centre, Maryborough Aeromedical Transfer Service, Probus and Bendigo Community Bank to name a few. It is this community volunteer service that makes Maryborough special.

Also, I wish to thank Barbara Duffin, Havilah CEO PHF and the Havilah Auxiliary for working patiently with us through the restrictions.

RI President Holger Knaack

The theme for 2020-2021 RI President Holger Knaack is *Rotary Opens Opportunities* which challenged us all in COVID-19 Pandemic times.

The message from both RI President Holger and District Governor Phil Beasley was, to look out for each other and families and friends, and to adapt, learn new ways of being Rotarians and how to operate remotely.

By July 2020, it was apparent we were in for the long haul and that the Covid-19 Pandemic was turning into a marathon involving major adjustments, while health safety measures and the prolonged lockdowns affected all Victorians. Many of our patterns of doing things were just not possible.

Being able to have great speakers on zoom, locally, regionally and from locked down cities was an opportunity taken, not wasted. This is illustrated in our Program 2020-2021 which is included in this Annual Report.

The Club had been meeting remotely mainly by Zoom since March 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic arrived and this continued on and off throughout 2020 – 2021.

Our Club did not pause or stop our regular weekly meetings, whether in person or by zoom, including its first changeover remotely by zoom on 25th Jun 2020. Twentynine of our fifty weekly meetings were held remotely, twenty-four were in the first 6 months.

Investigations found that for a modest fee, Rotary clubs could meet for more than the usual 45 minutes by zoom and have unlimited people on board. This helped enormously to keep us connected

There were opportunities for remotely getting together at District and Zone when events became virtual and open to more Rotarians. There is now a valuable virtual on-line library of presentations from around the world.

This led to the chances to discuss what we were learning about our traditional ways of club meetings and learning to improve our on-line skills, screen shares, zoom polls, breaking into small groups. Board meeting moved effortlessly to zoom. Unfortunately, not many service clubs were able to keep meeting in the early phases of the COVID-19 Restrictions.

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District Governor Visits

Our club spirits were lifted by our District Governor visits, twice by DG Phil Beasley and then by DG John Clue for Changeover 2021-2022.

As well as celebrating R100 with the Centenary Baton, Phil, encouraged us to remember to support the critical work of our Rotary Foundation, whose fundraising was affected worldwide by the pandemic.

We were heartened to support the Project of Judy Beasley, The Indigenous Literacy Foundation with over \$1000.00, which was a part of the \$30,000 raised by our District.

Paul Harris Fellows

Maryborough Club has a proud legacy of recognition of Paul Harris Fellows. (PHF) Since the late Frank Lowery was recognised in 1980, over eighty local people have been recognised by the Club including fifteen multiple PHFs and several are PHF benefactors.

Paul Harris Fellows, PP Leigh Williamson, PP John Stewart, Rtn Partner Sue Edmondson and I were recognised in August 2020 with friends and families zooming in from Melbourne, Canberra and as far away as Glasgow.

PP Terry Allan has an additional PHF Sapphire.

Tracey Smith was recognised as a new PHF at our Changeover Dinner in July 2021.

The Paul Harris Fellowship is an international level of recognition acknowledged by the giving of \$1000,00 to the Rotary Foundation.

The significance of the 2020 Christmas Break up

The Christmas party at Past President's Leigh and Jan Williamson's Gairnshiel farm garden was our first Club Meeting in person. Covid-19 restrictions limited outside private gatherings to 30 people.

A delicious individually boxed dinner was served and members and partners really enjoyed being together for the first time in over six months in such a beautiful setting on the deck in the country.

We resumed in January with a casual dinner at the Carisbrook Post Office Café and a stroll around the Avenue of Honour. The Club then rolled through more lock downs and had less access to Havilah for club dinner meetings.

We then began meeting at local hospitality venues, like the Highland Society's Pipes Bistro (and the Members and Board rooms) and The Bull & Mouth Hotel. Sincere thanks to those venues and staff for their hospitality and service. It was so good to enjoy real time conversations over a meal.

Fund raising and Support

Fund raising was heavily affected and this is outlined in the Treasurer's Report. The Club's morale was tested when many regular fundraising events were cancelled, such as the Blue Pyrenees Magic Bike Ride, Energy Breakthrough and Ballarat Swap Meet. A Pop-up Oaks Day 2020 was held in the Sports Bar Garden at the Highland Society and raised funds and some Bunnings BBQs at Bendigo recommenced.

By not being able to meet at Havilah for dinner meetings, the funds raised internally was markedly reduced and missed, with fewer raffles, fines, and bar profits. Some members responded by donating what would have been part of their dinner funds directly to the Club and to the Rotary Foundation.

Robert Rowe is to be thanked for the humorous way the Friday Footy Frenzy continued.

The International Committee identified Rotary causes that we had regularly donated to, like Polio Plus, RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service), RABS (Rotary Australia Benevolent Society), ROMAC (Rotary Oceanic Medical Aid for Children), Days for Girls, Peace Scholars, Interplast, Disaster Aid and Donations in Kind-Geelong. Donations were made to all of these.

Locally, the Club supported Bowelscan, Neighbourhood House GELC for food supplies, Salvation Army beds, Coffee for First Responders and the Maryborough Girl Guides.

The MEC Driving Education program and the Baby Book Program were supported.

#SayNo2familyviolence project

#SayNO2familyviolence campaign, our flagship project, continued as it was able to work remotely to a new level during the year. The work initiated by this Club is now a collaboration within Maryborough District Health Service, VICPOL, The Orange Door, Anglicare, Centre for Non Violence and GoGoldfields. The working group has expanded to include partners of Rotarians, other Rotary Clubs, two in Portland and two in Horsham are now involved.

The final stage is developing a *How To* guide for any Rotary or Community group to use, continued within the restrictions. The on-line Manual will be released in the next months. Also a grant application for the interactive website was submitted to Bendigo Bank.

Comments

Financial Position

Whilst the bank balance is lower than the previous year, the Club is in a relatively strong financial position partly due to the Managed Fund and also to a decrease in expenditure.

The decrease in funds is mainly due to the drawing down of the Fundraising Account, these funds have been used to make donations to several local groups and Rotary programs. The recipients can be found in the detailed P&L above. This is seen as a prudent use of Club funds that have been raised from community events and not necessarily fully expended each year.

I would like it to be recorded that the Fundraising account has been the recipient of considerable donations from members throughout the year. This was certainly appreciated given the lack of fundraising activities able to be held. A big thankyou to those members.

Profit & Loss

Income

As can be seen activities to raise funds from Community Events was very restricted with the Bunnings BBQ's being the substantial contributor, the Bowelscan program also created a sizable in-flow of cash but it was straight in and out for those funds. Rotary programs which are traditionally events such as Film nights, income from NYSF students etc was non-existent as the Theatre was closed and student programs were not held.

Expenses

The off shoot of not having fundraising events is that expenses are not incurred which is the reason for the reduced program expenses.

Similarly, the member expense which traditionally is high, is largely for meals at Dinner meetings, but as we had very few Dinner meetings the expense was not incurred (also no income).

As previously indicated the Rotary programs was to a large extent funded by drawing down the Fundraising Account.

In closing, I would like to thank the Club for allowing me the opportunity to be Treasurer, it certainly was a learning process including changing our accounting system to Xero.

To the members thank you for your help and patience and a big thank you to Kerrie for putting up with me spending hours and hours in the office on Rotary "stuff".

Administration Committee

Strategic Planning Committee Report

Maryborough Rotary completed its 2015-2019 Strategic Plan at the end of June 2019, and during 2019, a new plan was developed for the 2019-23 Rotary years. Theoretically, we were not due to start a new strategic planning process plan until 2023. However, Covid-19 put paid to that. Because of the Pandemic, few of our committees were able to make inroads into their collections of objectives, so as the club started to get back to "covid-normal" in early 2021, we had the choice of trying to slowly resurrect the old plan or start a completely new one.

Enter, PP Garry Higgins OAM.

In making himself available to be President in 2021-22, Garry came with a vision that our club really needs a "reset" if we are going to get back to anything like our former "glory" – if that is the correct word. As a consequence, the club and groups of members had a series of discussions about how we should best move forward, and a new type of Board structure was proposed along with a number of other strategies that resulted in a new, 2021-24 Strategic and Action Planning document.

There are several things that the club is doing differently with this new plan. First, we started with a set of principles that should drive the new plan and the club. Appropriately, those principles were based directly on Rotary International's four Strategic priorities:

- Increase our impact on the local community and wider world.
- Expand our reach and raise interest in Rotary's work in Maryborough.
- Enhance member engagement and make effective use of members' skills and interests.
- Increase our ability to adapt and keep pace with global trends in delivering service.

Secondly, we changed the structure of the service committees in the club. Instead of starting with the traditional four service committees (Community, International, Vocational and Youth), and a large legacy of service project objectives, many of which had not been addressed, we asked members to forget about all we had done in the past and think of the service projects they would really like to see happening in our club and which would address all or most of the four strategic priorities mentioned above.

We then asked them to put up their hand and propose their desired projects to members at our Club Planning night and be prepared to run with them. It was certainly exciting to hear the list of innovative and ambitious projects that emerged from that event.

Each service project will be managed by a service project sub-committee that will meet at its own time and report to the newly appointed Service Projects Director who will monitor and summarize the progress of those committees on the Board.

We are obliged by Rotary to keep the four Governance committees of Administration, Membership, Public Image and Foundation, and we obviously need to keep a Fundraising committee to manage fundraising in general and assist the various fundraising sub committees that will actually raise the funds we need to operate. Having said that, because we particularly want to revitalize membership in the club, Garry's vision is that we ensure that both the membership and Public Image committees work closely together throughout the year. So, with that new structure in place, we now have a new, streamlined Strategic plan for 2021-24, and all committees are in the process of developing their Action Plans (or Scoping Documents) to drive their actions over the coming year.

We all look forward to seeing this new structure and the service and fundraising project committees flourish over the coming months. In closing, I'd like to sincerely thank the hard-working members who have worked with me on the Strategic Planning committee: PDG Anthony Ohlsen, Austin Taylor, PP Garry Higgins OAM, PP John Caulfield, PP Thea Allan, and Tracey Smith.

The club is looking into the possibility of running these events in the future despite the pandemic.

The Family Violence Awareness project is continuing to grow and expand. More interest from other communities is evident and additional Rotary Clubs are continuing to participate with Maryborough Rotary in this area. The emphasis is still one of changing from awareness to one of action.

A Forum was held in between lockdowns and the Race Days have been put off until after the pandemic or until we can be confident that a lockdown will not be imposed.

Family Violence Awareness Committee #sayNO2familyviolence

A refocus from the GoGoldfield Alliance has resulted in the Central Goldfields Shire family violence action group no longer existing. As a result of this refocus the funding that enabled Raelene Williams to resource our group has also ceased.

Maryborough Rotary still sits on the Maryborough District Health Service family violence governance board and we continue to work with the Services Review working group. Representation on these two groups is testimony to the perspective that Maryborough Rotary brings to the table.

Our family violence awareness working group has been able to continue its good work through trying times and has responded positively to these changes.

We welcome new members Joyce Sedunary and Vicki Taylor who bring a wealth of experience in child protection, homelessness, coercive control and the criminal justice system.

In addition to her time and expertise, Raelene Williams has so generously committed to assist our project and will provide this vital resource along with her valuable knowledge and networks.

Our main area of work has been the development of our "How To" resource. This project catalogues the history and the development of the project from its very conception to its current situation.

It provides a comprehensive resource to any Rotary club or community that is considering the #SayNO program for their community. The resource provides information and advice on what has worked in our local community including the process, training and subject information, examples of case studies, branding and style guides as well as valuable contacts.

Again, can I thank our team of amazing people who have, over many years, provided their time and passion to the #SayNO2familyviolence project. Our team has raised in excess of \$50,000 over the years, which has enabled us to achieve much. More importantly they have continued to provide their expertise, knowledge and support to ensure that families live their lives free from violence.

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Foundation Report

The last twelve months have been incredibly challenging for everyone, including The Rotary Foundation.

Many clubs have been severely restricted in their fundraising, and this has reflected in funds being made available to our charity of choice, The Rotary Foundation.

The members of the Rotary Club of Maryborough donate to The Rotary Foundation in different ways. Some by weekly and monthly direct contributions, others by gifts on their birthday, wedding anniversary and Club anniversaries. The Centurion program is funded with a donation of \$2 each week when members pay their dinner fees and a top up at the end of the year to cover missed meetings.

This past year has seen our meetings being held in different ways and via different mediums. This has seriously affected the weekly donation of \$2.00 towards their Centurion contribution, but to our members credit extra personal contributions were made, achieving a total for the year of \$1,979.00.

Rock & Roll Dance


The Rock and Roll dance was another casualty of Covid. Planners Shane and Jacki Dellavedova, musicians Geoff and Meryl James and the club were disappointed

We started our Rotary year in July 2020 with 45 members and with the losses and plus one detailed below we finished the year with 41 members.



International Committee

The International Committee oversees a diverse program to encourage international engagement and aims to support a range of Rotary Projects internationally and Indigenous Projects in Australia.

The club activity which continued with the International Toasts at meetings both online and in person. Many of the activities such as Rotary Friendship Exchanges (RFE), Days for Girls workshop with Zonta, raising funds through book sales and movie nights were restricted by COVID-19 and were not possible.

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation (ILF) was the District Governor and Partner's Project and Maryborough raised \$1065 especially for this cause. This contributed to District 9780 donating \$30,000 to the ILF, a fantastic project. The funds were raised by donations for figs picked from Lochinver Farm trees and a great fine session at the DG Phil's visit

The International Committee recommended to continue the Club's regular annual donation program despite specific fund raising being limited. The Rotary Foundation (TRF) and to a range of Rotary related entities featured including Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC), Donations in Kind (DIK), ShelterBox Australia, Interplast Australia and Days for Girls.

A new project for Maryborough is the *Give Every Child A Future*, a Project for Rotary Zone 8 Australia and New Zealand is timely because it is a part of the honoring the R100 Rotary Centenary. This Project in collaboration with UNICEF with a vaccination plan for 100,000 of the most disadvantaged children across the Pacific.

In addition, donations were made to

- the Dandenong Ranges Disaster Appeal via Rotary Australia Benevolent Society (RABS) and to
- the Gippsland Bushfire Appeal via The Rotary Club of Essendon.

Unfortunately, most other activities were curtailed by Covid-19 restrictions

However, President Elect Garry Higgins (Vocational Service Director) had a very productive meeting and following is the proposed reset for 2021-2222.

October, 2020

The committee discussed and debated the "Diagnostic Reset" concept and what Maryborough Rotary may look like after this review.

It was felt that there is no need to alter our four areas of service; Youth, Vocational, International, Community, but we may examine ways in which our committees can work more collaboratively towards fewer but more significant projects. [Less is better]

As a starting point we need to establish our Club's capability by completing a "Skills and Resources Matrix".

We adopted three overarching principles upon which all our service work should be based upon.

1. Maryborough Rotary needs a formal, ongoing process to establish and understand contemporary issues within our community. [How do we see people in 3D?]

- Regular listening posts with children, grandchildren, school students.
- Discussion with other community agencies.eg. Central Goldfields Shire Council, Education providers Maryborough District Health Service, Committee4Maryborough.

2. Ensuring that projects get maximum community exposure and benefit many. Projects need not only provide maximum benefit, but also to enhance the community's perception of our Club and Rotary.

3. Maryborough Rotary needs to drive community change by reflecting contemporary issues in its own work, collaborating with other community agencies and actively supporting other projects within our community.

We noted that this new direction requires the Board to devote a meeting to discuss this and that we should then present the concept to the Club for consideration.

An example of the new approach could be:

Issues that have been identified for many years by GoGoldfields, Committee 4 Maryborough (C4M) and the Central Goldfields Shire (CGSC) is the lack of community connectedness and the need for more community art.

Past member Garry Brooker came into the bakery one Saturday morning and we were talking about the Community Arts Trail that is proving so popular throughout our area, except for Maryborough.

Garry suggested that rather than use our hidden silo that we use our tower to become part of this program.

It started me thinking how this might become a new Rotary project using the three principles recommended.

Rotary adopts this as a major community project based upon creating a "Harmony Park "keeping a watch over our community.

- It advocates with the community, Local and State Government authorities to get approval and support for the project.
- It undertakes a community planning process that includes our local indigenous community, representatives, ethnic groups and community members.
- It conducts community working bees to establish the project by enlisting the social clubs from Truefoods and MDHS, CGSG and other relevant community groups.
- These working bees become events within themselves with Maryborough Rotary providing childcare, food, music and a festival atmosphere. Each working bee could be themed around a different culture.

IMAGINE:

- Our tower emblazed with a giant portrait of one of our indigenous elders keeping Watch over Country and artwork depicting the ethnic makeup of our community.
- Our Community Committee leads the conversation around being included in the "Arts Trail" and the development of the concept.

- Our International Committee engages our local indigenous and international communities to assist with the project and have input into the development of the concept.
- Our Membership Committee liaises with the social clubs to supply the workforce to complete the project.
- Our Vocational Committee co-ordinates all the skills required to complete the project.
- Our Fundraising Committee sources the required funding.
- Our Youth Committee coordinates child care and organises entertainment.

This recommendation was put to the board.

The Board commit to undertaking a "Diagnostic Reset".

The Board adopts three principles upon which all projects are based upon.

The Board present these recommendations to the Club with the view of undertaking a Strategic Planning session to further develop the Reset.

Youth Committee

I am sad to report that nearly all our youth projects were postponed last year.

We did however continue our long tradition of sponsoring two scholarships at both MEC and Highview, to the value of \$500 to each school.

While we are not provided with any of the awardees details, the awards are dedicated to the following two outstanding rotarians.

This is the information on our Rotary Scholarships that we presented last year.

Charles Mowbray Art Scholarship

Charles Mowbray came to Maryborough as the manager of the E S & A Bank (now known as the ANZ bank) in the sixties, joining Rotary in 1965. Charles and wife Patricia had 4 sons, all of whom were educated at the Maryborough High School. Charles was a highly respected member of the community and a dedicated Rotarian who was very interested in the Arts. It was Charles who fostered the annual Rotary Art Show. Charles was Treasurer of Maryborough Rotary from1971 to 1976 and was recognized a Paul Harris Fellow in 1991. This Scholarship is awarded for artistic excellence to a VCE student.

Doug Hutchinson Community Builder Scholarship

Doug came to Maryborough as the Vice-Principal of the Maryborough High School and was particularly keen to ensure that local youth had access to quality education. He worked tirelessly in this endeavour and was highly regarded within the local community and Rotary. He worked in many Rotary projects, particularly those involving the youth of the local area. Doug was President of Maryborough Rotary for the 1977/78 year and was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow. Doug enjoyed lawn bowls in his leisure time and his wife Jean was the first lady president of the Maryborough Highland Society. This Scholarship is awarded to assist a student at any year level who displays exemplary behaviour and ongoing commitment to the values of Maryborough Education Centre and the wider school community.
