PP Terry Allan enjoyed the Convention and learned to make a Peace Crane!


I also give special mentions to PDGs Anthony and Geoff for their work in looking after the secretarial and governance work of the Club.

  - The Energy Breakthrough


Pres Garry, it has been a privilege to work with and beside you for a second year as you have been guiding Maryborough Rotary into the future.

**External, Social and Fun Events:** External events included visits to the Advertiser Office and Centre State Asphalting, a working bee at the Shed, a Christmas Break-up at the new Railway Café - "Tracks", a Barbeque hosted by President Garry and Julie, a Barbeque hosted by Murray and Sally Henderson, an Easter Thursday Morning Breakfast at Burgz, a meal at the Girl Guides Hall with a presentation by two senior guides, and a Pride of Workmanship event at the Highland Society.

**Bulletin:** Austin Taylor continued preparing an informative and entertaining Bulletin each week up until May 2023 when he was forced to resign from the role due to ill health. PDG Geoff took over for the last couple of months of the Rotary year.



*Meeting Home:* The club was fortunate to be able to again make the "Mill House" Community House its base of operations for the 2022-23 Rotary year. With the assistance of the Mill House staff, we made a couple of tweaks to the way we operated during the year: our storage area was moved to a storage room just down a corridor from the meeting area, and an agreement was reached over the provision of a roast meal each week which would be made available on trays that members from each table would collect and return after the meal. That system seemed to work well.

A Large Agenda: Apart from the program, bulletin and arrangements for a base, the committee was kept busy during the 2022-23 year with the following objectives - produce the weekly running sheet for meetings, liaise with the venue regarding meals / facilities, complete physical set up for weekly meetings, set up and run the drinks bar at weekly meetings, manage and organize prizes & gifts for speakers, produce and provide working technology / zoom for meetings including PowerPoint presentations, and laptop, promote and facilitate fun social events, provide hosting at meetings to welcome members and guests including provision of name tags for visitors, provide an annual report to club members, produce a photographic record of meetings and club events, provide a written record of club events in the form of a weekly bulletin to members and friends, manage the club asset register, manage maintenance of club assets, monitor and record attendance at meetings, maintain a club history of club events, ensure club records are stored securely online and are accessible by members, facilitate the collection of finances at meetings, promote the effective implementation of club and committee budgets, monitor risk management for club events, manage and monitor legal compliance regarding child safety, working with children, covid compliance, food handling, provide legal compliance training for members, and monitor compliance with the RI Club Citation.

*Club Planning:* Due to the significant load of objectives allocated to the Administration committee, a separate sub-committee of the Board was established which would handle the Strategic Planning process. See the separate report.

A Revival of a Committee: The Planning committee in our club started out as a sub-committee of the Board, but in recent years was incorporated into the program of the Administration committee. This year, we realized that the Administration had more than enough to do, so we reverted back to the Planning Committee being a separate sub-committee of the Board.



Planning Update: Whilst the 2022-23 year was not meant to be the year for a new Strategic Plan, the Strategic Planning process was significantly revised based on recent experiences and changed emphases in Rotary. Rotary International research has shown that one of the main reasons members stay in Rotary is that they feel meaningfully engaged in the

service they do. If they don't feel that what they're doing is worthwhile, they leave. So, we have tried to build in a process of "Buy-in" into our planning program where members get the chance to say what they support in the proposed projects and customs available, and to indicate which activities they would be prepared to organize and work for. The plan is for that information to be used to prioritize the activities that members prefer to work for and increase the level of engagement of members. Next year's report will indicate how well that worked.

*Guidelines and Roles:* The other task allocated to the Planning Committee is to review and update the Club's "Guidelines" document and "Club Role Descriptions" document. Both of these items have been extensively revised and are in the process of being presented to the Board for approval.

# Community Service Report

This was another busy year for the Community Committee. The *Community BBQ* was a big focus for Maryborough Rotary. The plan was to run the BBQ on Saturday mornings, initially manned by Rotarians, but to encourage community groups to be involved. This transition steadily established itself, to the point that the BBQ was being run around twice a month by community groups, notably the Girl Guides, the Uniting Church, and the Historical

Society.

It was resolved at the Committee meeting in April that the Saturday morning BBQ only be run by community groups, with a Rotarian in attendance as BBQ Captain. Also, that Maryborough Rotary would focus on the Bunnings BBQ at Kangaroo Flat as a fundraiser, for the time being. The BBQ was used many times through the year at various community events. All Rotarians gave generously of their time. The BBQ trailer is recognised as a significant asset for the Club. Not only has it been an important source of funds generation, but it has also helped to promote Maryborough Rotary in a very positive way. Participation also engenders a wonderful camaraderie amongst members.

The Community Committee was heavily involved in *the Energy Breakthrough* last November, back after a Covid-enforced two-year break.

Several members were to the fore, providing judges and supervisors, and ran the very successful BBQ - an excellent fundraiser - and generally displayed Rotary to advantage.

Maryborough held **two bike** rides this year. The first was on the Friday before the A F L Grand Final - in September.

It started from and finished at the Summerfield winery at Moonambel.

Around 200 riders from all parts of Victoria had the choice of three routes through the magnificent Pyrenees ranges.

The second ride was in March - again setting off from - and returning to - Summerfield Winery.

While rider numbers were less for the September ride Summerfield Winery was considered a good base for the future and was a great success.

A big thanks to Committee member PP Brian Reed, who with the help of his capable wife Robyn, did the organisational heavy lifting for both events.

The **SayNO2familyviolence** project was again ably stewarded by Committee member PP Gary Higgins. Club members PP Thea Allan, Rtn Lowan Clarke PP Martin Mackay and are supported by Salvation Army, MDHS and Victoria Police members.

Gary recently announced that the SayNO2familyviolence toolkit had been launched. This is a How-To-Do-It for any project and was prepared for Rotary by Arc Ventures' Raelene Williams and will be a valuable aid in the fight against family violence.

Also, the website is up and running in time to be useful for the Zone 8 project also working on Family Violence

The Committee provided members to participate in, and help develop, the Bristol Hill Peace Park project, with other community groups.

Baby Books have been provided to the Hospital, and to all new arrivals to the Central Goldfields Shire, for many years. This excellent project has been largely the "baby "of PP Derrick Marsden. This year the project was extended to grade four students at the Central Goldfields Shire primary schools - a great initiative.

The Committee has been in involved in helping develop ways to support Club Fundraising initiatives to help pay for Community projects.

The Community Committee has had great input from all its members and has been a pleasure to chair.

On behalf of all the members, I would like to congratulate Gary Higgins and his team for a job well done - for their two-year stint - to revitalise and refresh our club after the difficulties of Covid.

This year we finally completed our SayNo website. This has been an incredible achievement for our Club and will provide a resource to local women and children impacted by family violence. It will also provide an opportunity for every Rotary club in the world that wishes to get involved in a community-based program the same as ours.

https://sayno2familyviolence.com.au/ will take anyone to the interactive website.

The website also catalogues our project from its beginning to the present and our members can certainly be proud of the hard work over the years.

One of the unintended outcomes of our project is that Zone 8 (Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Islands) has also adopted the fight against family violence on a global scale. Maryborough Rotary is at the forefront of shaping this project and our experience will be invaluable in taking the project forward.

One of the major aims of the sayNO project has been to impact institutional change. Recently I had the opportunity to tour the "Nurturing Room" at the Maryborough Education Centre. What an amazingly unique and impactful concept!

Some years ago, local teacher, Kelsey Chandler, undertook an international scholarship to Scotland and Ireland to learn about nurturing programs. This was part of our Club's social capacity building program and here we are, six years later, seeing the fruits of our labour providing ongoing support for vulnerable children in our community. This program in our local education centre is also providing a valuable resource to the teaching staff at MEC.

The other major focus of our sayNO project has been to reform the Services Working Group. It "ran out of puff" as a result of the impact of covid, diminishing Government funding and the changing landscape of service provision in the field. This has only been possible because of the credibility that our Club has earned over the many years of the project.

As we know, women feel most confident in disclosing issues around family violence to their GP. Our project was instrumental in organising a forum between local GPs and the Orange Door to create an important dialogue that immediately resulted in GP referrals to the Orange Door. This is a great boon for local women.

# **Foundation Report**

To encourage support for the Rotary Foundation, the Committee choose to highlight the value of Rotary's own charity, the Foundation.

We are fortunate that Club Secretary PDG Anthony Ohlsen serves as District 9780 Foundation Chair and he continued to advise our committee and club on the value of the Rotary Foundation as our own charity. Anthony emphasises that this is a charity that we can determine and influence how our donations form funds are used worldwide.

We invited **Rotary Foundation Cadres** PDG Ron Pickford from Ballarat and PP Mark Balla Global Box Hill Nth Rotary, Water & Sanitation Rotarian Action Group WASRAG

Ambassador to speak to us about the involvement as Cadres.



In September, **PDG Ron Pickford** spoke of his work as a member of the Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisors. Basically, the role of a TRF Cadre is to safeguard Rotary Foundation funds through overseeing an evaluation process and provide advice to those applying for and using the money held by the Foundation.

#### To quote,

Using my collective expertise, I serve as a Rotary International Humanitarian Cadre Technical Advisor and site auditor for

water, sanitation, environment and low-cost housing in some of the most dangerous and poorest communities in the world, India, Philippines, Fiji, Africa and South America. These service activities are some of my most rewarding life experiences.

#### Rotarian Mark Balla aka Toilet Warrior.

At the RI Convention in Seoul in 2016 Mark was elected to the board of **WASRAG** (Water & Sanitation Rotarian Action Group).

He is a Global WASRAG Ambassador and member of the Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Experts. In March, we were honoured to meet him by Zoom, Mark is a Past President of the Rotary Club of Box Hill Central. After a business trip to India, Mark's eyes were opened to the fact that most schools in India didn't have any toilets and this was preventing children, particularly girls from attending school. It was also causing concern for female teachers who had no bathroom to use the whole day.



Mark learnt how much toilets can make an impact on underprivileged children in India. 75% of schools don't have enough toilets. By changing this, enrolment has increased for girls and the number of girls dropping out of school when they hit puberty has decreased. His book 'Toilet Warrior' has just passed 20,000 copies with proceeds going towards the Rotary Foundation. He has also featured in a TEDX talk called 'Toilet Humour is Serious Business.'

#### Centurion Level -what does this mean?

The Committee sought to encourage members to each aim is to donate annually \$100. This used to happen through dinner meeting fees, and now we ask people to contribute as they wish.

To quote our President Garry Higgins, "Have you as a Rotarian, thought about how you can become a 'centurion', or how you can be a regular contributor to Foundation? Perhaps a donation in recognition of your birthday, a special occasion or a tax-deductible donation or a small donation at each dinner meeting; it all adds up!"

#### How did we do in donating to the Rotary Foundation in 2022-2023?

The Maryborough Rotary has contributed over \$4500 to the Foundation. This is up from the previous year. This is in addition to the donations that individuals make privately direct to the Rotary Foundation. As members become more familiar with their donation options, the committee expects this to grow next year.

#### End Polio Now

The Club noted World Polio Day -24 October and the ongoing support of this worldwide eradication program. Plans are to focus on this in 2023-2024.



Currently those items suitable for recycling are soft drink and beer cans, beer bottles, plastic water bottles, juice bottles up to and including one litre.




The Mill House was inspected by Jason and Tim as a possible depot and they spoke with Manager Michelle who is eager to be involved in the scheme.

### International Service

The pandemic's effects were keenly felt by the International Committee faced with a reduced number of projects to inspire and to support and some uncertainty as to how to help raise the funds needed.

The Committee's desire to avoid the pressures of reactive fundraising each time a natural disaster or similar occurred was 'solved' by a commitment to donate two Shelter Boxes and two

Aqua Boxes annually. We trust that donating these annually or as funds become available to make those donations enables Rotary to provide aid and support as soon as practicable after a disaster is detected.

The Ukrainian sunflower seed project in which packets of seeds are sold to raised funds to provide support to Ukrainians displaced by the war has raised \$630 at the time of writing.

At the Pride of Workmanship dinner, the raffle raised \$666 for the Rotarians against Malaria netting program.

A significant portion of the target of \$750 for the Rotary Turkey/Syria Earthquake recovery has been accumulating in a tin at Parkview Bakery, demonstrating once again that if we don't 'ask' - we won't raise the funds required to meet our commitments.

We will look to replace the tin with images and advocacy for the 2023-24 year very shortly.

The Club had the opportunity to learn of significant projects such as that of Mark Balla, the 'Toilet Warrior' although fundraising in that instance might not be by way of a donation tin at Parkview Bakery!

The Committee has been investigating the potential donation of hospital equipment to Donations in Kind when the Maryborough Hospital upgrade renders much of the current equipment redundant.

We also pause to remember with sadness a Rotarian we have lost.



## **Project Management**



It was a slow start to business in the first half of this year. Two Main Projects that have been progressed are;

#### Community Group's Use of the Rotary BBQ

A Survey was circulated to the Community Group in and around the Maryborough area, and a BBQ Policy was then sent out to all the Community Group and they responded by requesting dates to use the


BBQ.

This is operating smoothly now, and any issues that arise from the Community Groups using our BBQ are being systematically resolved.

#### Bristol Hill Peace Park Project

In 2022/23, our Club identified the Bristol Hill Peace Park as a major project. The tower had been "condemned", the precinct had been neglected and the management was "unknown".



The tower has had its structural integrity assessed and this has been deemed as safe.

A contract has been signed to replace the fence guard and to re-render the exterior of the tower. It has been established that the Department of Energy, Environment Climate Action (DEECA) is the management authority, which is in consultation with Parks Victoria to incorporate the Bristol Hill reserve into their sphere of management.

Central Goldfields Shire has been actively supportive of the work.

Maryborough Rotary has conducted several community consultations with some very positive outcomes and a *Friends of the Tower* group has been established to further the project.

Some working groups have been established as part of the *Friends of of the Tower* including Communications, Environment, Peace Park, Restoration and Maintenance, History and Youth Engagement.

- 2. Maintenance/Restoration
- 3. Youth Engagement
- 4. Peace Park
- 5. Environment
- 6. Communication.
