

2002-2003




Fellow Rotarians and partners, well it's said that 12 months is a long time, I can assure you that three years ago when elected as Vice President I would have agreed but now at the conclusion of my 12 months as President I'm not so sure.

From the handover dinner last year, the momentum from the previous year carried on. It seemed that each week a new challenge or a new project was being put forward.

The launch of the mobile BBQ certainly contributed to the momentum, it has I believe galvanised the club members into realising that it's not difficult to get out amongst the community to promote Rotary, to enjoy the experience and to raise funds. From the first catering job it has been constant with the BBQ being used at the Energy Breakthrough, the Great Victorian Bike Ride for breakfast on the Friday morning and then for morning tea on Saturday at Drummond (midway between Daylesford and Malmsbury), at various Golf Club events, Carols by Candlelight, Uniting Church Function, Council Emergency Planning meeting, the Nestlé Auction, it just roles on and on. What I am pleased to see is that it is not the same members who are putting their hands up all the time, this is great to see. To Gerard Harris, thankyou for the huge effort you have put into this project. With regard to the actual BBQ, there has been a considerable amount of interest from other clubs to have a BBQ built for them.

What else have we been involved in, where do I start:-

- Polio Plus the club has made a concerted effort to meet the call of Rotary International in raising sufficient funds for the eradication of polio in the next 5 years. Our contribution has exceeded \$5,000
- Youth Exchange we have once again sponsored an outgoing student in Selena Chapman, Selena is currently in Denmark. We have also had an inbound exchange student in Youko Hoshizaki from Japan. Maddie Alverz-Harris is our next outgoing student, Maddie is heading for Finland and we have another incoming student in the next few weeks, Anna Pimental from Brazil.
- Clean Up Australia Day we have participated in CUAD at the Ballarat Road site.
- Yearly Auction initially we thought we would have a rest from the auction but thanks to the generosity of Nestle and the keen sense of adventure by Rtn Peter Brown to suggest that the Rotary Club of Maryborough could organise an auction to dispose of surplus goods, boy did we put in a grand effort, almost 100% participation for the day, thankyou Peter and your helpers and Nestle for the commission of in excess of \$12,000.
- Energy Breakthrough always a big weekend for the club, this year no exception as we manned Maryborough Toyota corner and used the BBQ to supply hamburgers etc for sale, thankyou to all involved.



- Nurses Home well, what started out as a tour of the site of the new buildings at the hospital courtesy of Rtn Bernie Waixel early in 2002, became a project of much fellowship, brute force and a sense of achievement. To basically strip out/salvage anything of value from the 3 storey complex prior to its demolition and then to sell the materials and donate the proceeds back to the building fund was a huge task. But it was fun and achieved a donation of approximately \$10,000 to the building fund
- Brian Dowie Park a couple of working bees were held at the park to cut grass, prune trees and in general tidy up the surrounds, sadly enthusiasm seems to be waning slightly but I'm sure the park will continue to be a show piece for the club.
- Christmas Function this year we had a mystery tour travelling by buses via Dunolly, Natte Yallock with the final destination being the Blue Pyrenees Winery. A great night and meal was had by all who attended. The wildlife on the way home was almost to close for comfort.
- Sale of Rotary Art this year saw the club deciding to sell the 4 paintings it owned from the days of the Rotary Art Show, whilst not a unanimous decision, the outcome was I believe in the best interest of the club, Shapiro Auction House was engaged to undertake the sale. All four paintings have now been sold. With the income from the sale of the first painting being donated to the Hospital Building Fund.
- Centenary Celebrations whilst late starting with this, we have established a
  committee to investigate the most opportune way of celebrating the Centenary of
  Rotary, the club is investigating the possibility of providing much needed accommodation for trainee doctors and family of in care patients at the Maryborough Hospital,
  plus considering the construction of a sound shell for the community and also a toilet
  block at Brian Dowie Park, just one of these will be a fitting event, it may be possible
  to achieve all three.

The club has seen the induction of four new members for the 2002-2003 year and whilst we haven't quite met the goal set, we have certainly achieved quality in with our new members, our first new member Sharon Fanning, Sharon is no stranger to Rotary having previously been a member of the Rotary Club of Nullumby in NT. Sharon has the classification of Banking Services and was inducted on the 05/12/02

Noel Quaife was our next new member and was inducted on the 01/05/03 and has the classification of Textile Services.

Our most recent inductees are Garry Higgins and Stephen Walker both were inducted on the 22/05/03; Garry has the classification of Pastry Cook and Stephen, Forklift Training Services.

During the year we had a one reasonably sad occasion albeit for the right reasons with PP and PHF Lindsay Willersdorf relocating to Melbourne to be closer to his family. Lindsay as you will recall was a charter member of the club, rather than accept Lindsay's resignation



from the club the Board seen fit to bestow an Honorary Life Membership on Lindsay, the least it could do for a member with the club history that Lindsay has.

To Peter McRae for keeping club records intact and also for the effort in putting the Annual Report together, thanks Peter.





Our invested funds have grown to \$45,265.47 as a result of further painting sales.


Our club funds have balanced out well and leave the club with a small operating fund to carry us into 2003-4.

#### Membership

The calibre of the speakers was often demonstrated by the number of questions which followed the speech.

#### Sergeant at Arms

Sergeant David Hare, assisted by Rob Bursill and Trevor Potter, effectively opened and controlled the meetings, ran interesting fines and heads and tails sessions and entertained us with (mostly appropriate) jokes that kept members and guests amused.

#### Bulletin



Robert Bursill has taken on the role of stocking the fridge and catering for partners functions. An application has been lodged with Liquor Licencing for a Club license from 6pm to 9pm on Thursdays.

I would like to congratulate President Anthony for his year of service *Sowing the Seeds of Love*. I am looking forward to working with PE John Bryant and other club members in 2003/04 *Lending a Hand*.

This year started with the demolition and salvage of the interior of the nurses home, most weekends were taken up removing desks, doors, wardrobes, light fittings etc. these were stored within the building for our sale day in November. The day of the sale resulted in a large crowd moving in to view and purchase goods at 9:00 am. We completed the sale before 12:00 noon with cash sales on the day of around \$4,000. This combined with money already received resulted in an amount of approximately \$10,000 being donated to the hospital building fund.

Our medical alert booklets are still being sold within the community, we are currently awaiting our third package of books to sell, the books are available at the chemists and local surgeries.

The BBQ trailer hit the scene in July and we have used it our auctions and the Energy Breakthrough to sell food to the public, it has also been used for catering for our club nights away from the hall, providing a BBQ for the CFA and other organisations in the district including the Golf Club and the Uniting Church. We also used it to provide breakfast at the Great Victorian Bike Ride in December, this resulted in five Rotarians taking the trailer down to Drummond (near Kyneton) to provide morning tea on the following day. This was a great exercise as all income from this was from out of town (the bike riders). A possible off shoot of this is an invitation to travel with the riders and cater along the route.

The BBQ trailer is proving to be a good provider of funds for the club and is also promoting Rotary to the community.

The Energy Breakthrough proved a huge commitment for the club this year with not only manning the Maryborough Toyota corner but it also involved three days of cooking in the food court, this resulted in a \$1,900 turnover for the weekend.

In December we were approached by Nestlé via Rotarian Peter Brown to conduct an auction of surplus equipment from the Nestlé factory. This we took on with some trepidation, but in March, with almost a 100% turnout by club members over the weekend we had a very successful day. Thanks must go to Peter and his assistants from Nestlé for organising the auction layout and the paperwork, which the club will be able to use for future auctions. The day resulted in a turnover well in excess of Nestlé's expectation with the club receiving a commission of \$12,700. The money has been distributed as donations of \$1,000 each to the seven CFA units in the Tullaroop group and a donation of \$1,000 to the Maryborough SES. The \$4,700 balance was split between Polio Plus and Rotary Foundation.

The club has once again participated in *Clean Up Australia Day*, on Ballarat Road, this was followed by a sausage sizzle and fellowship.

I must thank the members of the Community Service Committee and the Rotary Club as a whole for the commitment to our working bees and projects in what was one of our busiest Rotary years.




#### Fund raising

Forty-seven weekly bulletins were prepared through the 2002-2003 Rotary year following the format established by previous Bulletin editor, Derrick Marsden.

We've used an 8 X A5 page format with the four outer pages in coloured paper (this year's colour was yellow), and the four inner pages were white. The front page our Four Way Test and an indication of each night's meeting. Early in the year, we also added the Bulletin number. The very back page remained unchanged and contained a list of members in this year's committees.

Inside the back and front covers, we included a list of all current members as well as a list of the Objects of Rotary. Apart from changes to membership, these pages also remained unchanged during the year.

The four inner pages changed each week. Page 3 included a list of members on fellowship duty each week, members' anniversaries and reminders about absences. Early in the Rotary year, we spelt out the weekly duties in more detail, allocating a member to each of the required duties of welcoming members and guests, taking money and managing the bar. Pages 4 and 5, the middle pages, were used for a summary of the previous week's meeting, usually with one or two photographs, and page 6 was used for club notes.


Half way through the year, we reduced the previous meeting summary to one page and included several general articles e.g. a series on the 50 Self Help Classics. After some feedback from the District Assembly, we decided to include more information on International Rotary Projects, and recent editions have reflected this change.

To fill up gaps, we've included various "self-help" quotations, jokes, and facts and figures about Rotary. A survey on the Bulletin format was presented to members early in the year, and whilst there weren't a large number of replies, the survey revealed that members were generally happy with the way things were. Thanks to those members who took the time to reply.

We've seen the main aims of our Bulletin as being:

- To keep absent members and members' partners informed of club events and previous meetings
- To remind members of upcoming events and projects
- To keep members informed of Rotary activities in the wider world
- To provide an historical record of Club events


Given these aims, we continue to encourage members to read each week's bulletin and make sure they take a copy home to their partners. Copies are sent to all members marked absent on the previous week's attendance sheet, to life members as well as the District Governor, the District Governor elect, the District co-ordinator of Rotary Bulletins, and Bulletin editors at near-by Rotary Clubs (currently, Stawell and St. Arnaud).



In closing, I would like to sincerely thank fellow Bulletin team member, Toby Bainbridge for taking over Bulletin production on those weeks when I was absent from the area, and pass on my thanks to our other team member, Peter Brown, to Highview College for providing over 14, 526 photocopies of Bulletin pages over the year, and to students of the "Rotary Support Student Involvement Group" at Highview who have assisted with folding bulletins and placing them in envelopes for sending to absent members and district representatives each week. On average, we've posted out around 20 Bulletins every week, which adds up to almost a thousand stamps or nearly \$500.00 for the year, not to mention the time of the students.

Our Bulletin demands a fairly large commitment from our club, so I encourage all members to provide feedback on how the publication can best serve the needs of our community. Since Toby and I will be continuing in the job again next year, we look forward to this feed-back so our Bulletin can improve.



D9780 has a strong presence here and I participated in a series of Probus education/liaison days along with presenting the discussion paper at the District Assembly.

Within some states strong associations have been develop. I have been President of the Victorian Probus Assoc. for almost four years.


The whole governing body of Probus is vested in a committee of RDU - Probus Centre South Pacific, comprising of nine members nation wide, I have jut been appointed to this committee, and will relinquish my state role in November.

At a local level, both clubs celebrate milestones in 2004 – Combined Club 20 years, Ladies Club 10 years. Both clubs are still suffering with an ageing problem. #### **Football Tipping**




