The 'Rotary World' however provides ample opportunities to make-up missed meetings and I relished this opportunity by attending numerous Rotary Club meetings in our district (Ararat and Stawell), in Australia (Castlemaine, Canberra and Tumarumba) and in the USA (Anaheim and Monterey).

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## BULLETIN REPORT

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Another 47 weekly bulletins were prepared through the 2002-2003 Rotary year following the overall format used in previous years with a little tweaking to the actual appearance of the publication. We've used an 8 X A5 page format with the four outer pages in colored paper (this year's color was pink), and the four inner pages were white. The front page contained this year's Rotary symbol, details of the Club's mailing address and meeting times, a copy of the four Rotary commandments, an indication of each night's meeting and the Bulletin number. This year we added photographs of the RI President, our District Governor and our local President, Secretary and Attendance Officer. The very back page contained a list of members in this year's committees. Inside the back and front covers, we included a list of all current members as well as a list of the Objects of Rotary. Apart from changes to membership, these pages also remained unchanged during the year. The four inner pages changed each week. Page 3 included a list of members on fellowship duty each week, members' anniversaries and reminders about absences. Page 4 usually contained a one page summary of the previous week's meeting, usually with one or two photographs. This was reduced from one and a half to two pages last year. Page 5 usually contained club notes and if there was spare space, a joke or article of general interest. In line with some suggestions from the Rotary officials who evaluate our bulletins, page 6 was usually used for an article relating to Rotary International issues or the monthly letter from our District Governor.

We've seen the main aims of our Bulletin as being:

- To keep absent members and members' partners informed of club events and previous meetings
- To remind members of upcoming events and projects
- To keep members informed of Rotary activities in the wider world
- To provide an historical record of Club events

Given these aims, we continue to encourage members to read each week's bulletin and make sure they take a copy home to their partners. Copies are sent to all members marked absent on the previous week's attendance sheet, to life members as well as the District Governor, the District Governor elect, the District coordinator of Rotary Bulletins, and Bulletin editors at near-by Rotary Clubs (currently, Stawell, Ararat and St. Arnaud).

In closing, I'd like to sincerely thank fellow Bulletin team member, Toby Bainbridge for taking over Bulletin production on those weeks when I was absent from the area, and to Peter McRae who produced a bulletin when Toby and I were both unavailable. I would also like to once again thank Highview College for providing almost 15,000 photocopies of Bulletin pages over the year, and to students of the "Rotary Support Student Involvement Group" at Highview who have assisted with folding bulletins and placing them in envelopes for sending to absent members and district representatives each week. The two main contributors in the group were Year 9 students, Bonnie Borland and Bianca Maher. On average, we've posted out around 23 Bulletins every week, which adds up to over a thousand

stamps or over \$500.00 for the year – not to mention the time of the students and around two to three hours of preparation time each week.. As I mentioned last year, our Bulletin demands a fairly large commitment from our club, so I encourage all members to provide feedback on how the publication can best serve the needs of our community. I wish the new Bulletin editor(s) well as they take over what has been for me a demanding but very rewarding way of contributing to the work of Rotary in this community.

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## BOWELSCAN

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At the time of writing this report, the May Bowelscan project is underway and it is expected that the sale of kits will be satisfactory. Last year Maryborough's sales showed an increase, whereas the rest of District 9780s results were considerably down on previous years. This may have been due to reduced advertising. As a result the District Bowelscan committee has increased both television, radio and newspaper advertising this year. We have continued with letterbox drops in Maryborough, Carisbrook, Dunolly and Avoca, as well as in the Maryborough Advertiser, which provides us with very reasonable rates to place the advertisements.

From this year, all Bowelscan programs throughout Australia are united through the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund.

The District 9780 Bowelscan annual meeting was held at the Maryborough Highland Society in April and was attended by representatives from Millicent, Portland, Ararat and Belmont. The programs are being constantly upgraded.

Once again Rotary is indebted to Haywood & Robinson's staff at both Maryborough and Avoca, and to Millikan's staff at Maryborough and Dunolly. I cannot stress strongly enough our appreciation of their willing co-operation.

Both negative and positive results will be notified once again this year, which will result in nearly 10,000 mail-outs.

As well as being an excellent public relations exercise for Rotary, I believe the program should be pursued in the future to encourage people to care for and be aware of their personal health.

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## PROBUS

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Fellow Rotarians.

Probus continues its rapid growth, particularly in the South Pacific region where there are now almost 200,000 Probians in about 2000 clubs.

Closer to home within District 9780 there are 137 clubs (at the time of writing) with about 12,000 Probians; compare this with 59 Rotary Clubs and about 3000 Rotarians. The 'off-spring' has certainly outgrown the 'parent'.

The only criteria for membership of Probus is to be no longer involve on a full time basis in the workforce. It should be noted that Probus clubs are not fundraising groups.

Locally, the Maryborough Rotary Club has sponsored four Probus clubs—Maryborough, Maryborough Ladies, Avoca and Dunolly.

The two Maryborough clubs both celebrated milestones in 2004; it was Maryborough's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary and Maryborough Ladies 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Avoca and Dunolly will always be outpost clubs in smaller areas, but they continue to serve the needs of their individual communities in their own special way.

In October, the two Maryborough clubs will host the Annual Seminar of Probus Clubs within District 9780 of which 300 delegates are expected to be in attendance at the Maryborough Highland Society.

In my own case, I have been fortunate to have been appointed for a three year term to the committee of Probus Centre South Pacific (P.C.S.P) which is the body responsible for policy and organization of Probus in the South Pacific region.

Finally. *Aging is a natural process, but Probians do it better.*
