


ing, as they rode off into the sunset towards their mid western NSW dream. We look forward to their many visits over the coming years as well as the many stories that will no doubt follow. We also remember the passing of Rotarian and PHF Wes Parsons.

Lots of club fellowship activities were planned for the year, however, some of them had to be left out because we were just way too busy with projects, programs and fellowship to fit them all in.

On behalf of the club, and where possible, I attended a number of Annual General meetings of various community clubs and organisations. I have to report that the most interesting and far reaching of these was the Bowelscan AGM. The commitment and dedication of this group of people, some of whom were Rotarians (but all volunteers), with a PHD Student Doctor thrown into the mix, was simply amazing. Our club met at the RSL Clubrooms on 36 occasions, the Golf Club (4), the Highland Society (2), the Blue Light Camp at Maldon (RYPEN), the Flagstaff Hotel, Leilani's Restaurant and two BBQ's at the Adventure Playground. The Fellowship boys provided the BBQ trailer at the Manse, the Airport and the IGA carpark. We also had one pie night.

Throughout the year, the board met at various places on eleven occasions and my thanks to the members and partners for their hospitality and warmth. Other initiatives saw Partners Nights being held on the last Thursday of each month, all meetings started at 6.30, drinks charges were raised and then introduced on Partners nights. I congratulate President Robert and his board on a very successful year. His year has been a busy one with many activities covering all committees and with his inimitable




ability at the helm, we have had many laughs.





International Service

Over the past twelve months the International Committee have set in place a number of initiatives to further develop the ties and relationships with remote villages affected by the Tsunami in Sri Lanka.

The Committee plan to provide further assistance to a 120 bed hospital that serves 200,000 people and provide educational resources for two schools in the area.

In the area of health we partially funded an emergency heart operation for one of the patients from the remote village of Deniyaya and we are currently organising to fund a doctor from the Deniyaya hospital to visit Australia on a study tour. The aim of the this program to enable the doctor to gain experience in the application of hygiene and infection control methods used in Australia and also provide some practical experience in hospital and clinical management.

The schools have benefited from a large shipment of books and school aids over the past few months. In addition, we were able to secure over seventy "Milo" cricket bats and balls from Cricket Victoria to distribute to the schools. It is also interesting to note that the village we are assisting is approximately 50 kms from the famous Galle cricket ground which was destroyed by the Tsunami.

The majority of the funding was raised at our Golf day. Thanks go to everyone that sponsored a hole and assisted on the day with special thanks to our major sponsor J.A DODD Ltd.

Finally thank you to the committee for their help and to President Robert Rowe for his enthusiastic support in all our endeavours.





Vocational Service

The efforts of Vocational Service during the past 12 months have been directed into two major Rotary events.

The Pride of Workmanship awards were held in November before a packed gathering at the Maryborough Highland Society of over 150 employers, family, guests and Rotarians.

The awards recognised twelve outstanding young apprentices for excellence in both their work standards and skills as well as their work attitude.

The quality outlined in the employer citations showed that Central Goldfields Shire can be very proud of the achievements of its youth. Apprentices were chosen from a wide range of vocations including hairdressing, mechanics, baking, cooking, agriculture, printing, electrical, plumbing, joinery and building and construction. Each

apprentice was presented with a commemorative plaque and as this was presented a citation from their employer was read out.

Guest speaker for the night was VECCI field officer and 2004 Victorian Outstanding Apprentice of the year Mr Andrew Dower. Andrew gave an inspirational address on how he worked his way up from a young joiner with a Ballarat kitchen Company to travelling the world



on a Big Brother technical Scholarship culminating in working in London and undergoing leadership training with the Royal Marines.

On his journey he had won a Worldskills Gold medal in 2002, was Team Makita National young Achiever of 2003, Rotary Club of Melbourne Apprentice of the year 2004 and was a finalist in 2004 in the Australian ANTA Apprentice of the year. Andrew told the audience that too much emphasis was put on tertiary qualifications and that a person commencing in a trade could also become a high achiever.

In responding on behalf of the employers McPherson Printing Representative Mr John Jackson spoke of the quality of the young recipients and how important they were to the future success of any business.

Apprentice Chef Matthew Rowles then thanked the Rotary Club of Maryborough for providing the opportunity for apprentices to be recognised through the awards.

All in all the night was a resounding success.




Our other major event was the 2006 Southern Districts *Shine On Awards*.

The *Shine On* awards were then presented by Brigadier Ball and our nominee Mr Kristan Gray was a recipient of one of only seven major awards.

The response on behalf of the awardees was given by Sam Byrne, a sixteen year old blind student from Bendigo.

The Southern Districts *ShineOn* Awards presentation will be remembered as one of our clubs greatest undertakings and also as one of ShineOn's most successful events in its short history.

A big thank you to the members of the Vocational Committee especially Rtns Glyn Castanelli, Glynn Jarrett, Toby Bainbridge, Geoff James, Bob Osborne and the many members who contributed their time on the day.

The car raffle held during summer raised \$800 which went towards both events. The *ShineOn* awards were generously sponsored by Goldman Sachs JB Were for \$5,000.

The last year has been a very positive experience for the members of this committee.

We began by having our first meeting as general wide ranging discussion group/think tank with ideas on how to best assist the youth of Maryborough. As a result members endorsed the valuable existing programs such as the Youth Science Forum, RYLA and RYPEN, as well as coming up with ideas for some new areas of activity.

- RYLA. (Rotary Youth Leadership Award) Scheduled for 25th June, 2006, interviews are still being conducted. This award is for young people 18 to 24 years old to promote potential leadership qualities in young persons in our community for the future.
- RYPEN. (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment) This program was run on the last weekend of April, with Rod Brown as coordinator. Participants experienced various team/skill building activities, a bike ride, camp fire cooking and discussion groups, with the Rotary dinner being held here on Saturday night. I am sure all those who attended got a lot out of the experience which will help to prepare young people for the demanding years ahead.
- Youth Science Forum. Charles Williamson, son of John and Alison Williamson attended this year's Youth Science Forum in Canberra, with very positive results. The visit comprised site visits, general study skill seminars and development of social networks. Charles has raised money towards a proposed visit to the Canada wide Science Fair in Quebec in May, by conducting a film night of "Walk the Line". A \$200.00 donation has been made to the NWSF to assist Charles in his trip to Canada. Charles is one of only six Australians chosen to be invited.
- Jenny Brown, local Rotary exchange student, returned from Japan in January 2006. She stayed with four families in Fujisawa, starting school in year 10 and going on to year 11 in April 2005. She enjoyed her time there, and considers that going there was one of the best decisions she has ever made, as she found out not only about people in another country, but also more about herself. She learnt to speak Japanese while there and is now continuing her study of Japanese back in Australia.
 - This year there were no incoming or outgoing Rotary exchange students.
- Cakes and puddings fundraising efforts raised \$1400.00. Thanks to all those who bought or sold these for their contribution to fundraising, especially Derrick Marsden.

- Assistance to Maryborough youth experiencing difficulties at home and at school by sponsoring one or two young people a year to attend suitable programs. This year a young person from the area attended Typo Station, in N.E. Victoria, which is an independent 'not for profit' organisation operating a life skills alternate education and mentoring program. This is a unique early intervention activity for young men aged between 15 and 17 years with a 'get back to basics' approach. The two year journey begins with a residential experience at Typo Station completed over five weeks, including a 9 day hike into the high country. Participants return to Typo Station for follow up programs and receive ongoing mentoring over the next two years. Our first participant has recently returned, having had a very positive experience which he hopes to come to a Rotary meeting to report on soon. Just as a side note, at the Portland Annual Conference, several other Rotary Clubs expressed interest in this idea and requested contact information for Typo Station.
- The Youth Committee instituted a new fund raising effort, the Melbourne Cup extravaganza (raising about \$1500 for the Typo Station program) held at the Maryborough Harness Racing Club. The night was both enjoyable and successful, and it is planned that this will be a yearly event in the future. I would like particularly to thank Rotarian Gary Higgins, his friend Les Chapman of the Maryborough Harness Racing Club for their efforts, and local businesses for their support in making this night such a success.
- Connection and communication has begun between Rotary Maryborough and local youth services with a view to assist with specific existing programs as the need arises. In this area we have identified that there is a lack of focus and connection as many groups are proceeding without being aware of what others are doing in the same area. We were lucky to be assisted by Mel Taylor from the Council Youth Workers Network, who has recently got together a booklet listing all youth services currently available in Maryborough, and noting particular gaps and areas which need further attention. We have made known the Typo Station initiative to other groups so that they will be aware of what is possible for specific young men who may benefit from this experience.

Particular areas of note are:

'Theatre of the Oppressed' visited by various members of Rotary in April. This program uses theatre to act out areas of concern to youth. Because of it is a hands on creation by youth, for youth, it is a very effective tool to assist young people in understanding themselves and the world around them, and hopefully making the right choices as they go along. Ray Ollerton is very involved in the promotion of this program.

This year has hopefully set a new course in some areas for the Youth Committee, its success can be judged by the fact that many of the members of our team, having enjoyed the inspiration and good fellowship of this year, have requested to stay on for a second term to see these initiatives through. I would like to thank all those involved for their assistance, commitment, hard work, enthusiasm and positivity, and look forward to a further year of their good company.

The Probus movement continues to grow, particularly in Australia and New Zealand (2200 clubs and 200,000 Probians) where there are more clubs than the rest of the world combined. It is regarded as Rotary's best community service project.

Probus in Australia is 30 years old this year. In our area the clubs was started by the Maryborough Rotary Club (Maryborough Combined, Maryborough Ladies, Avoca and Dunolly) each function in their own unique way.

Avoca and Dunolly have small membership. Dunolly in itself has an age problem in that there are few younger retirees in their catchment area.

Recently Ballarat East Rotary Club started A club in Clunes with thirty members.

In my role as Rotary District Probus Chairman, and a member of the P.C.S.P (Probus Centre South Pacific Committee) I visit many clubs. Also in our district I conduct a series of education/information days for clubs each year, and this helps to keep the quality of clubs at a sound level.

I have just been successful in gaining a rare second three year term to P.C.S.P.

The growth of Probus has not yet peaked with the 'baby boomer' era entering retirement mode, further growth is expected in the next few years.

In District 9780 we currently have 145 clubs with about 12,000 Probians.

My thanks to the club for its support and tolerance towards me in my Probus activities.
