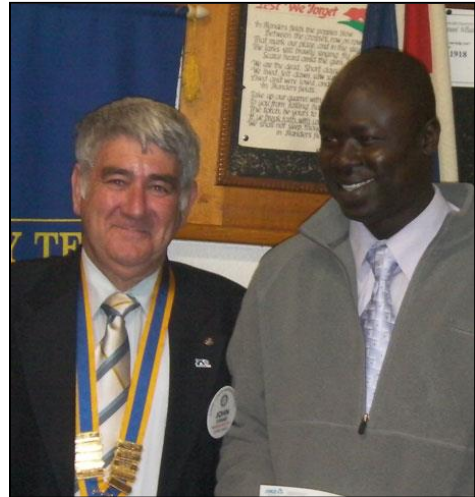

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

I have thoroughly enjoyed my role as Sergeant at Arms for the 2010/2011 Rotary year.

I was unsure as to my role and function until I spoke to Rotarian Warren Norton from Geelong East at the 2010 District Assembly in Stawell. Warren graciously provided me with a wealth of information and advice as to what a Sergeant at Arms is and how a Sergeant at Arms should conduct oneself.

Brief History of the Role

"The actual title of Sergeant at Arms, came in the days of the Crusades when Philip the August, King of France, instituted a special corps to guard his person in the Holy land in 1192.

Men-at-arms were common enough in all armies of the time, but Philip's escort - being Cavaliers, or gentlemen - were styled "Sergents d' Armes" " to distinguish them from the lower orders, and whenever they appeared in public they did so encased from head to foot in armour."

The office of Sergeant at Arms is still a position in the UK Parliament and has two main areas of responsibilities: -

First, he/she has duties relating to the Order and Security of the House of Commons. He/she is responsible for maintaining order in the Chamber, Galleries, Committee Rooms and precincts of the House of Commons and the control of access to them.

Second, the Sergeant at Arms Department also has Housekeeping Duties that include the allocation and booking of accommodation for MPs, cleaning of the House and the supply of stationery, laundry and other stores

The Sergeant-at-Arms in Rotary

Is the Sergeant-at-Arms an Officer of a Rotary club? Yes.

The Sergeant-at-Arms plays a vital role in allowing the Club President and Chair to concentrate on conducting the weekly meeting.

Specifically, the function is to handle the physical preparations for, and the mechanical part of, the Rotary meeting. Unobtrusively, to guide its general conduct, to help maintain an orderly, dignified, and effective Rotary club meeting, one that will make a right kind of impression on club visitors and guests.

The Sergeant should be constantly on the alert to prevent any occurrence that might detract from the dignity and prestige associated with Rotary clubs and as such plays an important role in the overall success of each weekly meeting

Frequently, the Sergeant-at-Arms can give some special assistance that helps to make guests feel "more at home." But more important is the manner in which they carry out their duties. It can directly influence the clubs attendance record.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is responsible for the effective management of the weekly meetings; ensuring

- that the meeting starts on time
- that the meeting room is set up correctly for each meeting and that it is cleared at the end of the meeting and all property securely stored
- that members and guests are greeted upon arrival and made to feel welcome
- that the Guest Speaker is greeted and is taken care of throughout the meeting
- that appropriate decorum and respect is given to any speaker holding the floor during a meeting
- fining anyone who is out of order in their conduct during a meeting
- conducting a fines session that is based on appropriate humour and stories

I can say without fear or favour that I performed my role as Sergeant-at-Arms in a professional and steadfast manner conducting myself with aplomb, style and empathy for those that were fined (harshly but fairly) and never once pushed the envelope when telling a joke.

A small band of members that were available at very short notice gave assistance and the erection was completed in a very short period of time, resulting in a new facility for the town's folk and visitors to the city.

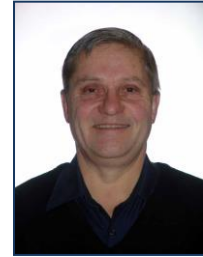
The Manse project is a truly great contribution to the local community.

The projects initially programmed for the year were:

Shelter Box - Decided to hold over for the current year

Dinka Books - \$400 donated to assist in the publication of Dinka stories in English for Dinka children living in Australia.

Sudanese School - \$700 donated to the Akon Primary School to construct new classrooms and buy sports uniforms. Additional money from fundraising will cover the roofing of the new classrooms from a proposed \$500 donation and selling roofing sheets for \$10 a sheet. In addition, other Group 7 Rotary clubs have agreed to contribute towards a donation for the school in the next year. These two projects have been managed by Robert (Malley) Rowe, Maryborough and Juach Deng, Castlemaine and Sudan. Their dedication has moved both these projects forward.

It was decided to hold over Donations-in-Kind for this year.

Apart from our usual programs of providing a range of scholarships to local school students, our promotion of the annual Science Camps, our support of the "Sleeping Stars" program and our ongoing monitoring of the proposed youth Mentoring program, the major project in this Rotary year was our running of the RYPEN camp at Adekate Lodge, near Creswick.

This project proved to be a huge undertaking for the small group of key organizers, but the positive responses from participants made the venture definitely seem worthwhile.

Forty-two applicants applied for the RYPEN camp, however only 38 completed the event. Two applicants sent their apologies due to illness, two simply did not arrive and one participant was sick on arrival and went home on the evening of the first day. One participant arrived without having received the paperwork from the school.

All comments from post-camp surveys were positive. The general aspects of the camp were rated highly, especially the meals, activities and camp site; indicating that 'Adekate Lodge' is an ideal location for a RYPEN camp. The selected guest speakers supported the ethos of the RYPEN camp and covered important aspects of leadership and personal enrichment. The participants enjoyed all topics, but especially the 'team work' led by Shane Green. The outdoor activities were all very popular, with the 'rain shelter', 'touch ball' and 'low ropes' rating 94%, 83% and 83% respectively. Participants also enjoyed mixing with different people and making new friends.

Everyone gained valuable information that they felt will help them in their lives. Participants felt they learnt about effective team work, personal strengths and weaknesses, social skills, own personality type, importance of volunteering for the community, getting out of their comfort zones, better communication and how to lead better. One participant said, "(This camp) put me back on track with study and school and my objectives for the future." Another added, "I have learnt that my life is going to be determined on what I do from my age now, and that team work is an important part of everything."



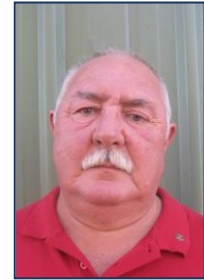
Two Rotary couples assisted at the camp, with the help of the Adekate Lodge managers. Though everything went according to plan, it was felt that extra adult supervision would be beneficial. One of the boys fell during the 'touch ball' game and sprained his wrist and was taken to the emergency department at the Ballarat Base Hospital for medical attention, just in case the wrist was broken. This left only one male and two females for the Saturday evening, which is not desirable.

Our committee believes the camp met program objectives of the development of individual leadership skills, contribution to team activities, cooperation and problem solving together and fostering generic life skills. It is thus a valuable and worthwhile Rotary activity and needs to be supported by the whole club.
