Other Club functions

Brian Trenery District Governor visited the club early in the year to inspire us. Members attended District and Club changeovers in June and July and District Conference in March and District Assembly in May.

Meetings were held at Havilah while the RSL roof was repaired; at Brian Dowie park after a clean up; and Group 7 meetings were held at Ararat, Beaufort and Stawell.

Service and Support

Marquee erections to support and raise funds for Little Athletics Open Day; Energy Breakthrough; Carisbrook Flood Relief for their Carry On Carisbrook celebrations; the Vision Super Triathlon; Australia Day pancakes; Teddy bears Picnic; Great Victorian Bike Ride; Veteran Cycling weekend; Relay for Life with a high fundraising team and BBQ next morning.

We also helped MEC Chaplaincy Committee through Oaks Day, VIP Pharmacy evening, and a Trivia evening; Old Aviators Museum opening; Carols by Candlelight, and supported Goldfieldsfm Radio 99.1. The outside of the Manse project is at last completed. We held a barbeque at Goldfields Radio; and investigated an upgrade of the old Methodist Sunday school / school hall.

Rotary District and Broader Programs

The Club has been well represented at District Conference in Warrnambool, District Assembly at Stawell and at Group 7 Changeovers and Beaufort's 25th birthday

We donated to Rotary Foundation, Polio Plus and had another successful Bowel Scan Program. We have bought one Shelter box through Disaster Aid Australia.

Two couples will be leaving for a Rotary Group Friendship tour to District 5580, encompassing Rotary Clubs in Minnesota and North Dakota, USA in July.

New Generations

District 9780 runs two Rotary Youth Programs of Enrichment (RYPEN) camps for 14-17 year olds in the district, one at Millicent SA and the other at Adekate camp Dean, near Creswick. The Rotary Club of Maryborough runs this local program and members are involved as organisers, speakers and Camp Parents. This project is one of the highlights of our Rotary year.

Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) for 18-25 year olds had three local young people attend.

We continue to provide scholarships for 5 young people at MEC and Highview, support the Sleeping Stars theatre program and books for newborns at the hospital.

Talbot student Hannah Pollock was successful in attending the National Youth Science Forum. Our prospective Exchange student and Rotary Adventure in the Community student withdrew for various reasons. We still propose to have Youth Exchange with one incoming and one outgoing for 2013. The Youth Mentoring program is a work in progress, as is the engagement with the Go Goldfields program. We are committed to giving on-going financial support to MEC Chaplaincy Committee.

Our thoughts have been with those Rotarians who have lost loved ones and are caring for loved ones and with Carolen Fisher on the untimely death of husband John, who was so passionate about the Old Aviators Museum

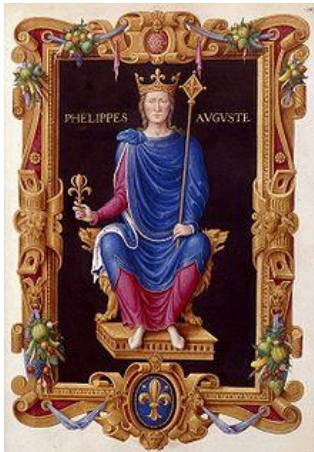
SERGEANT-AT-ARMS

At the time of writing, this major Rotary Program is part way through.

Last year more than 700 kits were sold, with 23 positive results. We do not know who they were, or whether all were concerns, but at least we know that a number of lives were saved.

There is sometimes confusion about bowel testing programs, since the Anti-Cancer Council and the Australian government offer similar programs. However, these only offer the programs at specific age levels (e.g.60 or 70 years of age), whereas the Rotary Program operates each year.

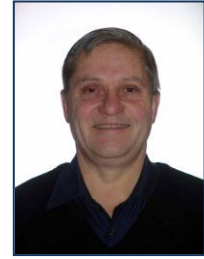
Hopefully, 2012 has been a successful program.

The projects initially programmed for the year were

Disaster Aid Australia

Maryborough Rotary continues to support Disaster Aid Australia and decided to donate \$1000 this year, \$800 for a disaster aid box and an additional \$200 for other Disaster Aid assistance areas.



Dinka Books

\$400 donated to assist in the publication of Dinka stories in English for Dinka children living in Australia.

Sudanese School

\$700 donated to the Akon Primary School to construct new classrooms and buy sports uniforms. Additional money from fundraising will cover the roofing of the new classrooms from a proposed \$500 donation and selling roofing sheets for \$10 / sheet. In addition other Group 7 Rotary clubs have agreed to contribute towards a donation for the school in the next year.

These two projects have been managed by Robert (Malley) Rowe, Maryborough and Juach Deng, Castlemaine and Sudan. Their dedication has moved both these projects forward.

During the course of the year, an opportunity to participate in the Rotary Group Study Exchange program arose and the club put in an expression of interest and has decided to reactivate our activity in the Rotary Youth Exchange program.

9. To appreciate the broad youth network and their specific needs.

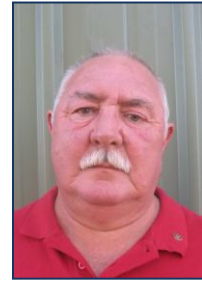

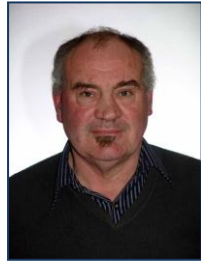
