


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The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace is one of the cornerstones of the Rotary movement. With Rotary's active presence in more than 200 countries and geographical areas, our organization has established itself as a world leader in fostering *Peace Through Service*. We have accomplished a great deal in this area throughout our history, but we must continue to look forward and recognize that the future of Rotary — and the future prospects for world peace — rest with today's youth. To ensure a lasting legacy in this arena, we must engage young people in a meaningful way and empower them to carry Rotary's peace-building efforts into the future.

In 2012-13, Rotary International will hold three Rotary Global Peace Forums. Each forum will consist of a three-day program to engage and inspire Rotarians and community leaders. The forum in Berlin will emphasize the value of democracy and freedom. The forums in Honolulu and Hiroshima will focus on young people, including New Generations program participants (Rotaractors, Interactors, Youth Exchange students, and RYLArians), Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotary Peace Fellows, alumni, and young Rotarian leaders. I am encouraging each district to send at least two participants from these demographic groups. Bob's Annual Report 2012-13

Just as there is a beginning, so there is an end.

In Rotary, the beginning is the installation of a new president, full of aims for his/her year, and the end is when one hands over to his/her successor at the next changeover dinner. The time differential always appears to be less than 12 months.

This has been my second term as President, the first being 20 years ago and Rotary is certainly a different organisation than it was 32 years ago when I joined. However all things change, Rotary is less formal, yet still has proud traditions that we adhere to in the 4 Way Test. We cannot oppose change, just as King Canute of England learned, when he tried to turn back the tide in the 11th Century.

Several clubs and volunteer organisations have faced difficulty in recent years, with membership dropping. Looking at the gains and losses in this club in the last decade or so, we had in fact shown a net loss of about 17 members.

When the succession plan fell over two years ago, no-one was prepared to step into the role for the year past. It was suggested that "I give it a go" and bearing in mind my state of health, I obtained medical clearance to try.

I have in fact enjoyed the challenge and I believe that we have had a successful year as a club.

This has only been possible with the efforts of club members. Your support for me has been outstanding and I give you my grateful thanks for "carrying" me through the year.

Twelve months ago we were a group of 36 old and faceless men with only one lady member. At the rate of membership loss we needed to do something or go out of existence.

The genesis of the rebirth of the club was the decision to conduct a Strategic Panning day.

This was the brainchild of PE Garry Higgins and facilitated by DGN Geoff James.

We looked at all aspects of the club - strengths and weakness; did we really want to continue; if so, why?

We restructured the board, elevating Membership and Public Relations to the Board and formed a membership task force led by PP Anthony Ohlsen.

We all wanted the club to continue and to focus on all aspects of Rotary. A decision was made that if Rotary International could collectively eradicate Polio from our planet, what could Maryborough Rotary do to improve the lot of our local community.

We had to rebrand ourselves as a club and we needed fresh faces as members.

All this has happened. Director's reports following will show what has been done.

Overview - Club Achievements:

Membership: A grant was sourced from District funds to promote membership and P.R to the tune of \$1500 and the club had to match this. While the club had never been opposed to women in the club, we have never actually targeted them. A major New Member evening was conducted with a large attendance. Hosted by DGN Geoff James and PE Garry Higgins, members explained their thought on Rotary along with various programs conducted. It was actually a good education night for the whole club. Seven new members, of whom six are women, joined as a consequence. We gained a total of 11 new members for the year, with considerable further interest. All are progressing well and some have positions of responsibility in 2013-24.

We are introducing the concept of Friends of Rotary, for people who are prepared to help when required, but cannot commit full time to Rotary.

Public Relations: We needed to sell the club to the community. Rotarian Chris Frahn and partner Sue put together a monthly full page in the Maryborough Advertiser. Each month featured the Rotary monthly theme. This along with articles on Rotary activities has reinforced the Rotary brand in the local Community. The club went on Facebook as a means of communication. New Rotarian, Kate Ashton has done and is continuing to do a great job with our Facebook page. I acknowledge the co-operation of the Maryborough Advertiser and Community Radio Goldfields 99.1FM for their publicity of Maryborough Rotary.

Vocational Service: Participation by individual members in courses, especially the Beacon Polish program, mock interviews was one facet. Our Pride of Workmanship Awards, which is always a highlight of our Rotary year, was awarded to people working with youth. A new innovation was the awarding of a scholarship, up to the value of \$5000, to one successful applicant. This award went to Ms Eva Julian – a primary school teacher









at Maryborough Education Centre. Eva went to a world conference in San Diego and since returning has worked hard in the role of strengthening positive relationships, among young people. This was a worthy venture for the club. Thanks to Committee Chair PP Tom Davies and VP Graeme Rogan for their efforts.

Community Service: Led by Rotarian David Hare, this committee was again busy:

PROBUS: The four clubs we started are all still functioning well, two in Maryborough, one each in Avoca and Dunolly. Bowelscan – Held in May again this year, with more than 900 kits available. Results are not yet known.

Youth Services: Initially led by Rotarian Guy Blanch and more latterly by Rotarian Shane Dellavedova, much has been accomplished.

- · Conducted another successful RYPEN camp.
- · Annual scholarships to both secondary schools.
- Sponsored Odd Sock circus program at MEC which included students from Talbot PS.
- Provide a book for each new baby born at local hospital.
- · Sponsored Chaplaincy committee.

Unfortunately there were no RYLA participants this year. At the time of writing, we are seeking applicants for Summer Science School and Defying the Drift. We are also investigating the possibility of hosting an exchange student again.

International Service: Supporting various international programs. The club has purchased four Disaster Aid boxes for emergency accommodation in disaster areas. I acknowledge the generous support of the small, but dynamic Eddington community for their generous donation of \$950 towards the purchase of boxes.

Foundation: The Rotary Foundation is a financial trust that was set up in 1917 and is one of the largest financial charity organisations in the world. It gains funds form benefactors such as the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and contributions by Rotarians and clubs for Paul Harris recognition and other means.

This year we pledged \$100 per member contribution to the fund. Importantly, these funds can be accessed by District and clubs for appropriate projects. We have also contributed our share to Polio Plus – the Polio eradication program, which has almost rid the world of polio.

Special Events: We conducted a successful Peace Forum. Not as well attended as we would have liked, but successful and should be conducted again.

We had adequate attendance at Conference and District assembly and were awarded the District Aitken Public Relations and Media award.

Past President and PADG Geoff James is the successful nominee for District Governor in 2014/15. This will give the club some exposure since we will be hosting the 2015 District Changeover and District Conference. It will take maximum effort from all members to both assist Geoff and to ensure that it is a successful year.

Congratulations Geoff and Meryl, one of our newest Rotarians.

We have applied for a Rotary International Presidential Citation. At the time of writing, we await the result.

Sadly our last foundation member (1952) Lindsay Willersdorf, aged 97, passed away. Remarkably Lindsay was also a foundation member of APEX in 1939. We were delighted that last year he was presented with a plaque to commemorate his membership and our 60 years, in service.

John is our longest servicing member, being inducted in 1965 and this year his contributions to the Rotary Foundation elevated him in station to a sapphire level of Paul Harris recognition.

The administration of the club is dependant on effective communication and of good financial management. I thank Secretary Thea Allan and Treasurer John Williamson for their diligence in these matters.

I was pleased that PP Terry Allan was prepared to produce the Bulletin each week. Communication to members between meetings is important.

Our meals have been convivial at varied sites and our regular dinners at the RSL hall with catering by the Havilah auxiliary. We thank them sincerely for their efforts.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank Robyn Jennings for her help at my changeover and through out the year.

Finally, I again thank all of you for your efforts. The world would be poorer without Rotary as well as this town. Be proud to wear your Rotary badge.

Congratulations to Garry Higgins for assuming the role of president in 2013-14. A lateral thinker, Garry will lead you well and consolidate the strengths of our club's Strategic Plan, as we part from Peace Through Service to Engage Rotary, Change Lives.



Unlike most of my fine sessions for the year this report is short.



As yet another Rotary year draws to an end, on behalf of the Vocational Service Committee, I submit the following report.

At the start of the year we identified a number of worthy projects for our committee to work on.

- 1. To facilitate Rotarians to work with mock interviews of students. Meetings have been held with Teachers at the MEC and an action plan developed for interviews on 16th August. We have 16 students to interview, with a list of prepared questions. We are seeking help on the day from other Rotarians to complete this project.
- 2. Shine on Awards. Rtn Graeme Rogan has identified a worthy applicant to compete for this Award in the coming Rotary year.
- 3. Appoint a facilitator to run business and professional lunch time meetings with specific topics and an opportunity to present Rotary Vocational ethics and standards. A number of Local Businesses have been contacted and have expressed an interest in participating. We are asking for more interested businesses and hope to generate sufficient participants to start up meetings in the not too distant future.
- 4. Pride of Workmanship Awards and Scholarship. This year our theme was "Working with Families". The Rotary Club of Maryborough, together with help from the Go Goldfields Alliance worked to identify people in our community who are working to deliver better outcomes for all families in our community. A \$5,000 Scholarship to be awarded to the selected applicant to help with travel and associated costs of study of world's best practices in a location of their choice.


Also on this night, a frequent visitor over the past few weeks, Robert Butterfield was inducted in to the club.

Youth

As the interim youth director, since the departure of Guy Blanch half way through the rotary year, I can only report on the major project, which is the District 9780 RYPEN camp organised by our club. The club also continued its annual support of local student scholarships at both MEC and Highview College.

RYPEN report.

Introduction

RYPEN is an acronym for 'Rotary Youth Program for Enrichment', which is a leadership development program for young people aged between 14 - 17 years. This year the camp, organised by the Maryborough Rotary Club, was held at Adekate Lodge in Creswick on 5th to 7th April, 2013.

Program Objective

To provide participants with information, knowledge and skill enhancement

opportunities designed to develop and build:

- · Self-confidence,
- Personal development,
- Individual leadership skills,
- Team work ethos,
- Cooperation and 'Problem Solving' techniques, and
- Foster generic life skills.

RYPEN Program 2013

The program was based around the key speakers, Shane Green, Rob Turley and Geoff James, who presented sessions supporting the RYPEN objectives. Shane Green introduced the concepts of 'Team Work'; showing how teams can fulfil people's needs by outlining Maslow's Theory of Motivation, individual personality types and characteristics of effective teams. Shane also establish 'camp rules' for this year's program seeking participants to think about the 'team mission' and 'team values', about what they want to achieve over the next three days and 'above or below the line' behaviours. The 'Blind Faith' activity, which involved two groups, Engineers (the


eyes) and the Construction workers (the blind-folded bodies), to build a house using enlarged lego blocks in 40 minutes, illustrated the importance of working as a team and lead into the topic of communication. Practical activities provided opportunities for the participants to present impromptu talks about themselves, while highlighting body language, facial expressions, eye contact and creating first impressions, cumulating into a 'personal action plan'.

Rob Turley, the Adekate Lodge Manager, divided the group into teams for the duration of the camp. Teams were allocated kitchen duties for nominated meal times to get them involved in the running of the camp. Rob organised a variety of out door activities that supported and extended the concepts of Team Work and Communication, for example; plank walking, water pipes and carpet squares.

The physical environment of the camp, nestled in the Creswick forest, fostered a feeling of togetherness and unity, away from the comfort zone of 'home life' and without the interruptions of modern technology (very limited phone service). Rose Turley prepared a variety of healthy wholesome meals to satisfy the hungry teenagers. She also helped to organise them for their kitchen duties. Geoff James introduced 'personality profiling' and each participant completed their individual personality profile using the Myers-Briggs Personality Typology. This activity generated much discussion and enhanced their understanding of themselves and others who had similar profiles. For one particular person, a 'light bulb moment' occurred when he realised that his profile was the same as two of the high-achievers of the group.


A night of entertainment was led by Phil Melgaard of 'Odd Sock Circus', who continued the ethos of the program with his theme song, 'We're all odd socks and we're all in this together'. Phil taught the group how to juggle and spin plates and then asked them to perform a skit. The evening was full of laughter and fun, proving that the simple things in life are often the best.

1. General




Scale: 1 = Poor 5 = Excellent

2. Topics of Guest Speakers:





Comments:

Many positive comments were provided. Everyone enjoyed the camp with particular references made about; mixing with different people, making new friends, team and out-door activities, challenging themselves, learning new information and having fun. Many participants reported gaining valuable information that they felt will assist them in the future.

Two helpful suggestions were also provided; "better equipment list" and "longer camp". The equipment list can be more detailed; however the camp duration cannot be extended due to work commitments of camp leaders. A variety of comments were made, which have been grouped as follows:

- Team work; "everyone has a role to play", "learnt about how to be a great leader", importance of team work and communication/body language, understanding personality types.
- Social skills; making new friends, getting along with people, learning "not to judge others", gaining confidence in public speaking, "everyone has similar fears", getting out of their comfort zone, "ways to better my life and achieve more", "how to contribute to my school and the wider community" and increasing overall confidence and understanding.
- Personal gains; "learn what's good about myself", "believe in myself and never give up", "just be myself", "We're all odd socks", "learnt about my personality / strengths" and "how to make better choices".
- Guest speakers / staff; "loved the activities with Shane and Geoff", "staff were awesome / great", "loved Shane Green and the 'Odd Sock' circus", "awesome food" and all gave valuable information.







Evaluation / Discussion

This year the camp was over-subscribed, which caused us to consider whether the camp could run successfully with more than 40 participants. After much discussion with all involved, it was decided to cap the numbers at 40 to maintain the camp's key objectives. Participants were re-selected by refining the age group to 15 – 17 years old, in line with previous RYPEN criteria. The thirty-seven students, who attended the camp, displayed greater maturity, as shown by a higher level of engagement.

Seven adults assisted at the camp, with the help of the Adekate Lodge managers. The camp went according to plan, in beautiful autumn weather. The extra adult supervision was much appreciated as it not only provides moral support, but security.

The evaluation of the 'pre-camp information' indicated a need to again revamp the application process in order to improve the dissemination of camp information to and from participants. A more detailed list of 'what to bring' would also be beneficial. The general aspects of the camp were rated highly, especially the meals, activities and camp site; indicating that 'Adekate Lodge' at Creswick is an ideal location for a RYPEN camp.

The guest speakers supported the ethos of the RYPEN camp and covered important aspects of team work, leadership and personal enrichment. The participants enjoyed all topics, but especially the 'Odd Sock Circus'. All the outdoor activities were very popular, with the 'rain shelter' activity again ranking at the top. Everyone enjoyed the camp and felt that they gained valuable information to help them in their future.

Summary

The 'Adekate Lodge' at Creswick continues to be an ideal location for a RYPEN camp. Rob and Rose are wonderful to work with and are committed to providing an excellent environment and learning experience for the participants, as well as nutritious meals.

The RYPEN camp facilitates the development of a 'team culture' through recognition and understanding of individual personality types, of leadership skills, of team work and the appreciation of different roles in solving problems together; thus fostering generic life skills and achieving the program objectives.

RYPEN continues to be a valuable and worthwhile Rotary activity, which needs ongoing support by the Maryborough Rotary club, including those who have a passion for the development of our youth and are keen to provide assistance.

Thank-you to the Maryborough Rotarians Terry and Thea Allan, Geoff James, Martin McKay and Rob Butterfield and Rotarian Deb Quin from Sunrise Rotary club in Swan Hill, who helped conduct another successful RYPEN camp.
