

During the last ten years there have been substantial changes to the public infrastructure. The Maryborough Hospital has been expanded and upgraded, The Maryborough Education Centre has replaced public schools and the areas they left are being re-developed for Senior housing, new supermarkets and other retail outlets have changed the city significantly.

The Club has always been financially sound. We have had reserves which enable us to meet emergencies and funds for many areas of need are often raised as a by product of fellowship/fun activities.

The BBQ trailer has provided a facility through which the Club could provide a service for Community organizations who needed food to be served but who had a lack of facilities or manpower. It also provided an opportunity to raise funds for our many other local or international service projects. It meant that members had to complete a food handling course and that a good deal of effort is needed to maintain the equipment and acquire and store the food.

Erection of Marquees has become a significant community activity. These marquees are owned and maintained by Council and stored, managed and erected by our Rotary members for all types of community functions. Funds raised go to other projects .







Our International activities have enabled links with Sudan and we have supported funding of School, Book and water projects. In 2003/4 we forwarded a full truck of obsolete medical equipment to Corio Rotary Club to be sent to the Pacific Islands. That year the Golf Day raised \$2100 which supported Romac, Interplast and Valahi in North Vanuatu with a water tank. Peter Silver led International committee in assisting Deniyaya Hospital by funding a heart operation and Doctor training. The club, along with individual member donations, raised over \$10,000 for Operation Cleft that saw numerous children in Sri Lanka and other countries, be given the gift of a smile and a new life after cleft lips and palates were operated on.

We assisted a small committee lead by Leo Dridan in making arrangements for a young boy to attend Primary school in Ampitheatre during the second half of the school year in order to gain English language skills to improve his prospects back in his home country of Nicaragua.

This family came to the Deniyaya Hospital seeking

assistance for the dad, however Dr. Tennakonn identified that both children had cleft palates. They were the impetus for the Maryborough Rotary Club becoming involved in the Operation Cleft program being run by the Rotary Club of Box Hill Central. Both children have now been treated and enjoy a normal and healthy life.



After the Tsunami in 2005, various club members helped build a nurses station at the Deniyaya Hospital in remote Sri Lanka. Rotarians Mark Edmundson and Robert Rowe had fun sourcing electrical conduits. Members also assisted is building a community centre at Weligama Sri Lanka Club funds were also channeled







Auction sales have been a major contributor to our funds for community service. Our members including Robert Rowe and Bryce Rawlings have made excellent auctioneers. Our methods have developed with Derrick Marsden now in charge of a comprehensive computer accounting system.

The Nestle **auction sale** proposed by Rtn Peter Brown to dispose of surplus goods was a great effort and earned commission in excess of \$12,000.

To strip and salvage anything of value from the three storey Nurses **home complex** prior to its demolition and then to sell the materials and donate the \$10000 proceeds back to the building fund was a huge task. The Club undertook the job and it was a great success.

Community Service has been a special focus of the Club including Bowelscan, Polio Plus, Shine on awards, and Pride of Workmanship Awards. The Club has continued to grow its community serving assets, a new home for equipment and storage in the Shed at the Maryborough Aerodrome plus a barbeque trailer, a marquee trailer, cool room trailer and other items. All due to the diligence and fore thought of members. These facilities enable the Club to provide services and to raise money effectively and efficiently.



The **Barbeque Trailer has** become an essential part of club activities. It enabled us to assist, amongst many, the Little Athletics Club, Carols by Candlelight, and the Energy Breakthrough. The BBQ trailer is in almost continuous use. It is both a vehicle for fundraising and community service. It is now housed in the Rotary Shed.



The funding, design, building and management of "*the shed*" at the Maryborough Aerodrome was a major project. Prompted by PP Fred Treble and driven by PP Peter Treble and Rtn Noel Quaiffe and supported by many, it required a lot of effort and a substantial effort by the Club. The shed now houses all of our materials including the BBQ trailer, cool room trailer, marquees and marquee trailer and other tools and program materials.

Century Of Rotary

The Manse Project was first formally discussed by the Club at a meeting in 2003, the project was adopted as our Centennial Project celebrating 100 years of Rotary International, and found ways of raising funds and obtaining commitments from groups and individuals, including the Maryborough Highland Society, the family of the late Wes Parsons, trades people and partners in the project, the Maryborough District Health Service. As a result, the Manse (circa 1860) was opened in 2008/9 as accommodation for the family and relatives of patients at the hospital, there is also room for visiting medical students. The six bedrooms, four bathrooms, kitchen, and living rooms provide comfortable accommodation for family members. The total cost was \$350,000 and Rotary invested almost 300 man hours. The drivers of this project were PP John Bryant and PP Bryce Rawlings supported by members past and present.

John and Jean Ritchie led the way with Bowelscan for many years, Toby Bainbridge took over and PP Bob Osborne has carried on with this important program.

The Tsunami Appeal was launched at the Highland Games in 2005 to aid to help relieve the suffering. Members rattled tins and collected coins at the games and with donations from the Boot Scooters, Rotary members and the community a cheque for \$10,000 was sent off to District 3220 in Sri Lanka for use in the distribution of food, water and blankets. Rtn Peter Silver, Director of International Service was the driver in this effort.

Shelter Box is a disaster relief program which provides emergency tent accommodation and facilities for people in times of disaster; we support this program also,

PROBUS CLUBS have become a most important activity in the lives of older Australians PROBUS has grown to over 200 clubs and 200,000 members in Australia and New Zealand The four PROBUS clubs sponsored by Rotary in the Maryborough area have continued to prosper.
