#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2021-2022

2021-2022, what a year for our Club and our community, COVID19 driven distractions continued to impact on our day-to-day operation and still we "Carried On". This ebbing and flowing of the Covid19 situation during this past year was even more disrupting than the previous year.

This year we had a new set of words enter our lives, Snap Lockdowns, hastily implemented at very short notice. We lost a large degree of certainty for forward planning due to the lingering threat of Snap Lockdown Restrictions. Face Masks, Social Distancing, Sanitizer and Snap Lockdowns did in fact become our new "normal".

Despite all of these challenges and in fact because of these challenges, we have once again risen to the occasion and have had a successful year on many fronts.

Our regular weekly meeting attendances have remained strong, delivered both virtually via Zoom and Face to Face with a sensational array of speakers to entertain and inform our members and guests. We hosted District Governor John Clue where he shared a number of his experiences throughout his year as DG. We were also happy to host a visit from the RVFR (Recreational Vehicle Fellowship Rotarians Southern Region group) a lively bunch of caravan enthusiasts. A highlight meeting was a presentation by Rotarian Ken Hutt who was planning to paraglide off the summit of Mount Everest to raise awareness of the eradication of Polio throughout the world. Unfortunately, Ken's mission to paraglide off the summit was unsuccessful due to the fact that he contracted pneumonia whilst attempting to reach the summit of Mt Everest for the flight. But the "End Polio Now" banner was unfurled at the summit by members of his team and they all returned safely.

**Fundraising**:- Our club was very fortunate to receive a personal donation of \$2,000 from Warrnambool surgeon and inventor Phillip Gan and his wife Ping. This donation was quickly allocated to a request from the Warrnambool and District Find Your Voice Collective for a Defibrillator machine to be available at all their activities.

Restrictions heavily impacted our fundraising efforts throughout this year with many planned activities being cancelled due to Snap Lockdowns.

Our BBQ equipment slumbered for quite some time this year. After a number of cancelled events we are now active, generating income, providing fellowship opportunities for both our members and our customers, at the same time raising our Club and Rotary's profile within the community.

Once again, our marquee fundraising event the Annual Hole-In-One competition was a spectacular success. This year, the possibility of Snap Lockdowns created even greater uncertainty around running an uninterrupted month-long event in January. We went ahead with the planning and preparation with great optimism. Our sponsors were happy to support the event and our members like never before, rolled up their sleeves and enthusiastically supported the event contributing in excess of 1200 hours. This event is a club activity that requires a whole of club buy-in to successfully stage and we certainly got it. A special thanks to Chairman Peter Reeve and his Hole-In-One committee, our sponsors and our members. We are rightfully very proud of this event. Look for a more detailed report further in this Annual Report.

Again this year 2021-2022, we found ourselves in similar circumstances regarding uncertainties in fundraising possibilities and income expectations as last year. Therefore we used the same successful methodology in setting our committee budgets, where our committees were asked to set "Ghost" budgets framed in HOPE and with a 'Local' first approach in the event of projected fundraising income shortfalls.

Hope! applied to our events running, the success of these events and the levels of support we would receive. We were confident that if our events did run, they would provide community engagement, fellowship and promotional opportunities for our Club and Rotary.

THEY DID!. The events ran and were spectacularly successful, particularly considering the circumstances and challenges. This success enabled us to not only support all the budgeted items outlined in the following committee's reports, as prepared by our Directors. It also gave us the ability with our members approval to support a number of additional requests that came our way, the Tongan Tsunami relief appeal, Australian Flood Relief, End Polio Now campaign, the Ukrainian War relief appeal and \$9000 worth of blankets for people in our city who were in great need, to name a few. Our club is extremely pleased and proud to have generated these funds allowing us to respond and to provide this additional relief at very short notice.

**Membership:-** We began the 2021-2022 with a membership of 45 Active members and 1 Honorary member. Our club has experienced some movement across our membership with 4 inductions, 9 resignations (1 member Ian Heard, resigned and was immediately granted Honorary membership) and 2 deaths ending the year with 38 Active members and 2 honorary members.

We remember with sadness the passing this year of 2 distinguished and decorated Rotarians John Clarke and Ralph Ludeman, they are both missed greatly and will be remembered for their friendship, their service to our club, to Rotary and our community. We send our thoughts to their families.

**Rotary 100 years in Australia celebratory project:-** Our Club was proud to support two projects in conjunction with the other Warrnambool Rotary Clubs to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Rotary in Australia.

One project was the purchase of 2 Personal Water Craft for close in-shore rescue from Torquay to Portland. This project has been completed with these craft housed in Warrnambool.

Our second supported program continues to be constructed. It is the creation of an Indigenous meeting place of cultural significance at Lake Pertobe in Warrnambool. This development containing paved areas with sculptures, totems and ground works incorporating indigenous plants and a curved stone seating area surrounding a metal bowl to be used for ceremonial purposes. It will be open to all and will be constructed on a small island within the Northern end of the Lake Pertobe area. This project is being funded by Rotary Clubs in Warrnambool, the Warrnambool City Council and the Victorian Government. We look forward to its completion and handover.

**Dr John Birrell Award:-** This is an initiative established by Rotarian Bill Hewett. This year's recipient was Sgt. Darren Smart a highway patrol officer from Hamilton. Darren was a very entertaining speaker with a lively question time following. Darren donated the \$2,500 award to the Hamilton Base Hospital towards the purchase of an MRI machine.

**Anzac Day:-** Our club laid a wreath at the Warrnambool War Memorial on Anzac day. Rotarian Noel Kenna and myself represented our club at the dawn service; it was indeed a privilege to be part of this important recognition.

**Club Recognitions and award:-** The Paul Harris Fellow Recognition and the Stewart Dumesny Award.

Once again we have four Paul Harris Fellow Recognitions, three members of our club and one member of our community. Details will be disclosed at the Changeover Dinner.

The Rotarian to receive the Dumesny Award this year will also be disclosed then.

Congratulations to all our worthy recipients, take pride in your recognition and the knowledge that the Foundation committee has chosen you to receive these prestigious awards.

The successes that have come out of this Rotary year are largely due to the efforts of all Club Members to contribute to the best of their abilities. You cannot ask more of anyone than to do their best whatever this is. When this happens, it creates marvelous results.

Reflecting on this year 2021-2022 there have been many challenges and many great achievements that have exceeded even our own expectations. As Rotarians we are trusted by our communities and the individuals and organizations we deal with. This expectation of those around us, is one of many things that keep Rotarians grounded and focused.

We should never forget that this TRUST has been earned by Rotarians everywhere through our efforts and interactions. We should never underestimate what a valuable asset that trust is. We have all had examples of people overpaying for our services at BBQ's and our Hole-In-One. They continually say "keep the change, we know what you do and we trust you". <u>You cannot BUY</u> this sentiment but you can EARN it.

We have been Nimble. We have been Flexible. We have been Determined. We have been United.

# **CLUB SERVICE & ADMINISTRATION 2021-2022**

Club Service and Administration covers a range of committees whose members assist with the administration of the club as well as running weekly meetings.

Due to COVID restrictions club meetings were held via zoom video from mid-July until late October when members were again able to meet face to face. During the pandemic many members could still provide some services to each other and the club.

Aside from the officers and directors of the board, who provide reports elsewhere, the duties and actions of members in other positions and committees of the club were as follows -

**Secretarial Assistant-Attendance** (Gordon McKinnon): Compiled members' attendance, apologies and leave-of-absence approvals. Regularly entered information to Clubrunner.

**Secretarial Assistant–Compliance** (Mark Taylor, Ray Welsford): Prepared and submitted reporting requirements to Community Affairs Victoria. Advised on insurance and other compliance matters. Ray Welsford relinquished these duties during the year and he is sincerely thanked for his diligence and thoroughness in carrying out this important task over many years.

Assistant Secretary (Ray Welsford): Provided secretarial backup and support in the event that the secretary was unable to act or required assistance.

Assistant Treasurer (Mark Taylor): Assisted the treasurer whenever requested. As an authorised signatory to bank accounts also provided on-line verification for the payment of accounts as needed.

**Streatrader Proprietor** (Gordon McKinnon): The club operated a 'temporary food premises' (barbeque trailer) and, as such was required to register with our local council by providing 'proprietor' and trading details on behalf of the club. Gordon also acted as the Bunnings barbeque registration contact.

**Sergeant-at-Arms** (John Jehu, Noel Kenna): In consultation with the President, managed the orderly conduct of weekly meetings. Prepared the meeting room prior to each meeting and ensured that club property was cleared and safely stored following each meeting.

**Meeting Programs** (Maggie Dwyer, Jo Bell, Mike Toone): Sourced guest speakers on varied topics for weekly meetings. Liaised with directors to include speakers relevant to their portfolios. Arranged a chairperson to introduce the guest speaker segment. Arranged for a "Charity of Choice" to be chosen by each non-club speaker so that a donation could be made in lieu of a presentation gift.

Fines (Glen Riddle): Prepared a roster of members to conduct fines sessions at weekly meetings.

**Club Bulletin** (Ray Welsford, Tim McLeod, Greg Wood, Paul Atack): Produced a weekly Bulletin which provided a summary of meeting highlights, reports, coming events and rosters. Ray and Tim are to be commended as they covered Greg's lengthy ill health absence during this period. Arranged with Paul Atack for email distribution to members.

**Social Events** (Nicole Larter, Mark Taylor): Provided occasional fun and social activities for the enjoyment of members and partners.

**Risk Management** (Michael Bellamy, Maggie Dwyer): Ensured that the club had suitable risk management documents in place for each approved community activity. Ensured that records were maintained and filed appropriately.

**Social & Other Media** (Peter Reeve, Mark Taylor, Paul Atack): Entered images and information highlighting various club activities to our social media site. Utilized opportunities to publicise the club's work through traditional media outlets.

**Clubrunner & Website** (Paul Atack, Mark Taylor): Ensured current organizational and member details were entered into Clubrunner. Regularly updated these sites with news and information.

**Member Wellbeing** (Andrew Coffey, Lindsay Miller): Monitored the health and wellbeing of club members and their families. Where appropriate, informed members of recovery progress, any special circumstances or other needs.

**Working With Children Checks & Statistics** (Nicole Larter): Encouraged members to obtain and renew Working With Children Checks. Maintained a register of holders. Collected and recorded the numbers of volunteer hours and participants who worked on community activities.

**PROBUS** (Maggie Dwyer, Everard Noske): Supported local PROBUS clubs and attended their changeover meetings.

**Historian** (Ray Welsford): Maintained a suitable archival record of club publications, activities and historical material.

#### **Fundraising Committees**

**Barbeques:** (Team leader Peter Hasell, John Jehu): Due to COVID restrictions for a third of the year the barbeque committee could only operate at a limited number of venues during the latter months. Their aim was to raise funds for club projects and charitable donations using the club's barbeque trailer at events in the community

On recent occasions, club members were rostered to operate the Bunnings barbeque, the May Races barbeque at the Warrnambool Greyhound Race Meeting, plus a number of other, smaller one-off barbeque events. John Jehu is to be commended for the way in which he managed the BBQ committee in the latter period of the year. (See further report later).

**Hole-in-One:** (Team leader Peter Reeve): The HiO competition was managed by a large committee and tasked to raise funds for club projects and charitable donations, as well as providing community entertainment over the summer holiday period. As in the previous year, the event was again not unduly impacted by COVID restrictions. Many local businesses provided tangible support and sponsorships, while receiving good exposure in return. The event also raised awareness of Rotary and its service work in the community.

It should be noted that Peter Reeve had relinquished his team leader role after many dedicated years of service to the HiO competition. Unexpectedly, five weeks out from the commencement of the HiO this year, Greg Wood, who replaced Peter as team leader, had a major medical emergency and Peter stepped seamlessly straight back into the role, again ensuring the ongoing success of the event. For that we thank him. This year Ian Heard, who was the embodiment of our HiO initiatives over the life of the event, moved after 40 years of service as a Rotarian to being an Honorary member of the club. Ian's involvement over the years was invaluable and his efforts were incalculable. Sadly, we also acknowledge the passing in December of our long time HiO Committee member and dear friend, Ralph Ludeman. His dedication to the HiO made the event what it is.

# **INTERNATIONAL SERVICE REPORT 2021-2022**

#### Overview

In 2021-2022 International Committee again broke its recommendations to the Rotary Club of Warrnambool East into three groups, a small number for which funds would be released early in the year, a second group for which funds would only be released after the February wash up of the HIO fundraising results, and a set of contingences. In the latter half of the year several emergency relief style projects were identified and addressed.

# Projects we supported this year

#### Interplast

Interplast Australia is a non-profit organisation, which provides voluntary medical teams to undertake a program of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery in neighbour developing countries where Interplast Australia has been asked to assist with local medical and nursing education. We have supported Interplast now for at least 14 years, this year we contributed \$500 to Interplast in our early release of funds.

# **ROMAC-** Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children

The purpose of ROMAC, an initiative of Australian Rotarians, is to bring seriously ill or injured children from developing countries where medical attention is unavailable for life-saving or dignity restoring treatment. Children from over 20 countries have had treatment facilitated by ROMAC over the last 10 years. The Committee agreed to continue our support this year, and again contribute \$500 to ROMAC in our early release of funds.

# **RAM-** Rotarians Against Malaria

The battle against Malaria requires a global effort. Rotarians Against Malaria is focused on implementation and provides the means to have the largest impact for the dollars expended. Malaria is relatively easy and inexpensively preventable and treatable. Malaria control can have a dramatic impact on economic development. The Committee agreed to continue our support this year, and again contribute \$500 to RAM in our early release of funds.

#### ShelterBox Australia

ShelterBox is a global Rotary humanitarian program that provides shelter, comfort and dignity to people affected by natural and other disasters. Since 2001, it has provided the rapid deployment of emergency shelter to more than 500,000 people in over 40 countries. This year we released the budgeted \$2,000 in September and \$1,000 for a third ShelterBox towards the end of the Rotary Year.

# **RAWCS- Rotary Australia World Community Service**

Rotary Australia World Community Service Ltd. (RAWCS) was formed to enable Australian Rotarians, Rotary Districts and Rotary Clubs to assist disadvantaged communities and individuals through humanitarian aid projects. Over the years we have been supporting RAWCS, it has morphed into a financial infrastructure that facilitates fundraising for projects that deliver humanitarian aid and charitable support in Australia and overseas. So, to support RAWCS we need to identify a specific project on the RAWCS web.

This year in the early release we forwarded the budgeted \$500 to a project in Timor Leste aiming to provide solar panels to and provide a reliable & sustainable electricity supply to the Teresa Orsini Clinic, boarding house, and local village. The Teresa Orsini Clinic is the only maternity and health facility in the sub-district of Maucatar located in the Cova Lima Province south west of Suai in Timor Leste. The clinic also supports approximately 50 teenage girls in a separate boarding house.

In May we were contacted by the Geelong Rotary Donations in Kind team, to assist them in funding a container dispatch. In response to their request and after discussion at the May Board Meeting, we agreed to send an unbudgeted \$1500 to the DIK team via RAWCS.

We also used the RAWCS structure to lend support to the Volcano eruption and Tsunami appeal for Tonga (RARF) and the RAWCS National Flood Appeal to assist families and businesses following the major floods in Queensland and northern New South Wales. \$7000 was allocated to the Tonga Appeal from the budgeted International Committee Emergency Relief and Emerging Projects contingency set aside at the start of the year. \$4000 was allocated from the budgeted Community Committee Contingency to support the Australian based relief appeal after discussion at the March Board meeting.

# **Fred Hollows Foundation**

The Fred Hollows Foundation is inspired by work of the late Professor Fred Hollows, whose vision was for a world where no one was needlessly blind. Working to continue Fred's vision, The Fred Hollows Foundation in Australia, New Zealand and the United Kingdom form a global network to increase our collective impact in eradicating avoidable blindness around the world. This year we released the budgeted \$1,000 in September.

#### **East Timor Water Projects**

Over the last fifteen years the Club has been involved in the support of an ongoing project in East Timor. This started with the support of the efforts initiated by Dr Noel Bayley and has involved hands on projects driven by Andy Graham ably supported by many from our Club and the Water East Timor Committee.

Water East Timor (WET) and our Team were unable to launch the planned new initiatives last year because East Timor continued to be ravaged by Coronavirus. So, we carried forward \$10,000 from last year.

This year after a series of discussions with the WET committee members we agreed to support their planned Asulau Water Project. This effort will provide running water to around 250 people, including 50 households, and a school with around 120 students. Water will be sourced from a perennial spring, this project is like those in other villages we have supported in the past. The primary benefit of the project will be equitable access to a safe and secure drinking and hand-washing water supply for 250 Asulau villagers (including 120 pupils at the village school).

We released the budget \$10,000 after discussions at the May Board Meeting. The WET Committee have agreed to give the Club an update on this and their ongoing projects early in the next Rotary Year.

# **Ukraine Appeal**

\$1,000 given to the special fund established by The Rotary Foundation to receive funds aimed at providing humanitarian aid to the people of Ukraine.

#### **Cambodia Trust (EXCEED)**

For over ten years Rotarian Joy Irvine (now deceased) supported the Cambodia Trust in her retirement, spending a significant amount of time in Cambodia and working on overarching committees. The Club supported Joy's work over these years.

For some years now, the Club has budgeted to support Joy's family in some form of recognition of Joy's work in Cambodia. Unfortunately, their original plans did not come to fruition. However, Wendy Mitchem and I have found another way to recognize Joy's work. Paul Lougheed, the CEO of Southern Way, identified a project supporting the youth in Cambodia – a Rock Climbing Wall.

Paul was a little short of the funds needed to complete the project and we agreed to fund that shortfall by donating \$500, a plaque recognizing Joy's work in Cambodia will be attached to the completed wall.

# **Paul Harris Fellow Recognitions**

A Paul Harris Fellow Recognition is made every time someone makes a donation of US\$1000 to The Rotary Foundation, or such a donation is made by someone in honour of another.

In the Rotary Club of Warrnambool East Inc., there is a tradition of using this process to honour both Rotarians and members of the community who have made a significant contribution in some way. To date, 40 Rotarians and 26 Non-Rotarians have been so honoured, the first being PDG Frank Jacobs on 13 September 1985.

In 2021-2022, the Club is pleased to recognise the work of four more people, three Rotarians, one a community member.

# **Rotarian PP Collin Brinkmann – Paul Harris Fellow Sapphire Recognition**

Collin has been a member of Rotary for 35 years – 21 years at Hamilton North and Warrnambool East for 14 years.

He was President at Hamilton North 1994-1995 and was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow Recognition by that Club in 2008 for outstanding contribution to Rotary.

After moving to Warrnambool, Collin and his late wife Carmel were both inducted to the Rotary Club of Warrnambool East, Collin by President Richie Milne on 10 April 2008 and Carmel by President Dennis Murphy on 22 February 2009. Kylie has facilitated All Abilities Advocacy South West, and projects such as Bungee Jumping, Lawyers and Love, the Speak Up Space, Lights / Rights / Music, and the Staying Connected Project.

Her passion for the Find Your Voice Choir has provided Kylie with an opportunity to evolve a dialogue with regional communities that seeks to illuminate the lived experience of disability. Kylie acknowledges that inequitable access to community can and does undermine the capacity of people with a disability to achieve more than just social inclusion, thus she continues her advocacy for universal inclusion.

The Find Your Voice Choir is a project supported by our club, and furthermore is one of the four local community projects our club supports with the weekly speaker donation of \$25.

Co-founded in late 2017 with Warrnambool singer/songwriter Tom Richardson, the Find Your Voice Choir truly is a celebration of human spirit.

Witnessing firsthand the response and demand for creativity and community, the choir has developed from humble grass-roots meetings into showcase performances at the Port Fairy Folk

Festival, Queenscliff Music Festival, Rotary Concert for Peace and the Palais Theatre, Melbourne as part of the 2019 season of Australia's Got Talent. That performance currently has over 40 million online views & growing.

Current membership of the choir surpasses 250 individuals from across the South West of Victoria in one, collective voice; farmers, teachers, quadriplegics, nurses, fishermen, transgender persons, artists & Aboriginal Australians all uniting & performing side-by-side with a focus on sharing their voices and shifting the narrative to one that focuses on ability rather than disability.

Kylie's commitment and achievements makes her very worthy of the award of a Paul Harris Fellow Recognition.

### THE ROTARY FOUNDATION REPORT 2021-2022

The Rotary Foundation is the charitable arm of Rotary International and using Foundation Grants, Rotarians are able to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, supporting education, and the alleviation of poverty. The Rotary Foundation is supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and Friends of the Foundation.

I wish to acknowledge and thank all members of the Foundation Committee for their contribution to Rotary International and our club throughout the year. As requested by the Board, each Committee was asked to nominate a Deputy Director, and Mike Bellamy, the most recently retired Foundation Director filled this role. In the coming Rotary year, the Deputy Director will be Stephen Timms.

During the Rotary themed November "Foundation" month, our club shared a Zoom meeting with the Rotary Club of Maryborough at which our guest speaker was Rotary District 9780 Foundation Chair, PDG Anthony Ohlsen.

The Rotary Foundation committee assessed the criteria of the Rotary Foundation humanitarian and vocation training project guidelines and eligibility criteria including timelines but no club projects were identified which met the very stringent criteria.

Throughout the year, the committee continued to raise the awareness of Foundation opportunities and projects at club, district and international level. The committee promoted one off and ongoing contributions to the Centurion Program, the Annual Programs Fund, and the Polio Plus Fund.

The Centurion Program is a program to recognise donations of AUD \$100 to The Rotary Foundation. The donation can be made as a single payment or accumulate over the period of the Rotary year. The committee continues to encourage members to become a Rotary Centurion by making their own personnel donation to the program. I thank and commend our members who contributed to or made ongoing financial commitments to these funds.

The club made an additional \$2,400 contribution to the Polio Plus Fund in recognition of the fundraising efforts of Rotarian Ken Hutt from the Rotary Club of Berry, who intended paragliding off Mt Everest to continue to raise awareness of the importance of polio eradication. These funds were made available via a contingency allowance in the budget of the International Committee.

Following our Club Assembly in April, additional funds were made available to the Multi-Donor Club Contribution with an additional \$US500 contribution to the Australian Rotary Foundation Trust "Annual Giving" fund equally disbursed in the individual name of each club member. This will continue to grow our club's foundation legacy.

As has been the custom of the club, funds were allocated to support the humanitarian and educational programs of the Rotary Foundation by sponsoring Paul Harris Fellow Recognitions. This year, the Foundation Committee has chosen four persons to be recognized in this way. In addition to the usual two awards, due to accumulated contributions over an extended period, the committee has now exhausted additional funds due to accumulated contributions to recognise an additional two Paul Harris Fellow Recognitions per year.

These prestigious awards acknowledge the outstanding contribution these recipients have made supporting the values of Rotary within our community, and we congratulate the recipients for 2022.
