Welcome to this Summer Newsletter. Whilst Australia has been on holidays, Disaster Aid Australia has been hard at work. Our Disaster Aid Response Team (DARTs) have been busy in Mexico, Philippines, Bhutan, Nepal and we are currently assisting in Bali.

### **Philippines Tropical Storm Tembin**

Just days after mudslides caused by tropical storm Kai-Tak left dozens of people dead in central Philippines a new storm, Tembin battered the Mindanao Region on 21st December 2017.

The storm hit with sustained winds of 100 km/h and gusts up to 150 km/h.

By 28th December, following an initial reconnaissance, two Balay Mindanaw Dream Teams began the work of installing Disaster Aid SkyHydrants<sup>™</sup> in Barangay Dalama in Tubod and Barangay Mindalano in Salvador.

One of the teams at the Lanao del Norte Incident Command Post can be seen loading up their transport.

By the end of the day both units were installed and providing safe water to the residents of the two Barangays.

Subsequently, DART Dave Tuzurski travelled to the Philipines with additional SkyHydrants<sup>™</sup> to enable Balay Mindaw to assist additional Barangays.

### **Chiapas Earthquake Response Update**

Australian DART members Helene Bo Morse, Peter Newton and Di Holland have been busy working in Chiapas late 2017.

#### HOUSING

Disaster Aid have been helping local people build back better by providing materials including steel reinforcing to make new houses much more resistant to earthquakes, at just over \$1,000 per household.



#### CHIAPAS HOSPITAL

A triple SkyHydrant<sup>™</sup> unit at the Chiapas Hospital has been installed.

After testing by Mexican Authorities the water has been approved as suitable for consumption.

This will result in considerable savings to the local hospital which has previously had to rely on daily purchases of bottled water.

#### SCHOOL

The Ignacio Zaragoza Primary School has been re-opened following repairs to damaged classrooms.



Nueva Palastina had been identified by our hosts the Rotary Club of Gutierrez as needing assistance in obtaining access to safe water.

The town has a population of 8,691 persons, including 4,990 children living in 1,952 dwellings.

Almost all of the local population are indigenous with 34% of the population speaking one of many the indigenous languages, but not Spanish.







### Mount Agung Evacuees, Bali

Although the Volcanic eruption of Mount Agung in Bali has dropped from the International News many Balinese people are still severely affected.

Currently there are 19 camps for evacuees from towns close to the Volcano that need to be supplied with food and bottled water.

**Disaster Aid Australia** has agreed to help the **East Bali Poverty Project** with their vital humanitarian aid to refugees from the volcanic eruption.

Two of our Disaster Aid Response Team (DARTs) will be flying to Bali with SkyHydrants<sup>™</sup> in February to provide safe drinking water to four of the camps.

### A Message from Bhutan

We recently received a message of thanks from Yeshey Dorji of the Rotary Club of Thimphu

#### WATER - GIVER OF LIFE

Our planet earth is sometimes called the Blue Planet – a name derived from the color and abundance of water.

All life forms on earth are sustained by water; it is a life giver, it purifies and is a great source of strength, but it can also cause great destruction.

The most important use of water is for drinking purpose.

Water is central to healthy growth of children and adults alike.

While Bhutan has the highest per capita availability of water in the region, access to clean and safe drinking water is a huge challenge.





Disaster Aid Australia's (DAA) recent partnership with the Rotary Club of Thimphu to augment its efforts to deliver safe and filtered water to schoolchildren in rural Bhutan is a welcome intervention.

Five SkyHydrants<sup>™</sup> have already been installed in five schools spread across the country.

It is our hope that DAA will continue to contribute towards the Rotary Club of Thimphu's ongoing endeavors to safeguard the health of school children in rural Bhutan.

Thanks is also being offered to Andrew Gunn and Phillip Gribble, the DAA Members who travelled difficult terrain to install these systems.

### Ban Chaikuan, Police Border School

Disaster Aid Malaysia have been busy working toward improving the water supply to the Ban Chaikuan Police Border School.

This 'Safe Water for Every Child' project involved replacing existing non functional equipment with a compact SkyHydrant<sup>™</sup> GEM unit.

The project also involved re-purposing their clean water dispenser, tank and pump to work with the new SkyHydrant<sup>™</sup>.



### **Report from Green Gecko**

We have just received an update on a SkyHydrant<sup>™</sup> installed through the Green Gecko Project in Cambodia.

The SkyHydrant<sup>™</sup> was supported by generous Rotary donations.

This unit has now been installed for several months and is working well with the maintenance program being adhered to.

It supplies hundreds of litres of fresh drinking water to the children and their families every day.

The children love the drinking taps and it encourages them to drink more water.

Green Gecko Project supports former street children and their families in Siem Reap, Cambodia.
