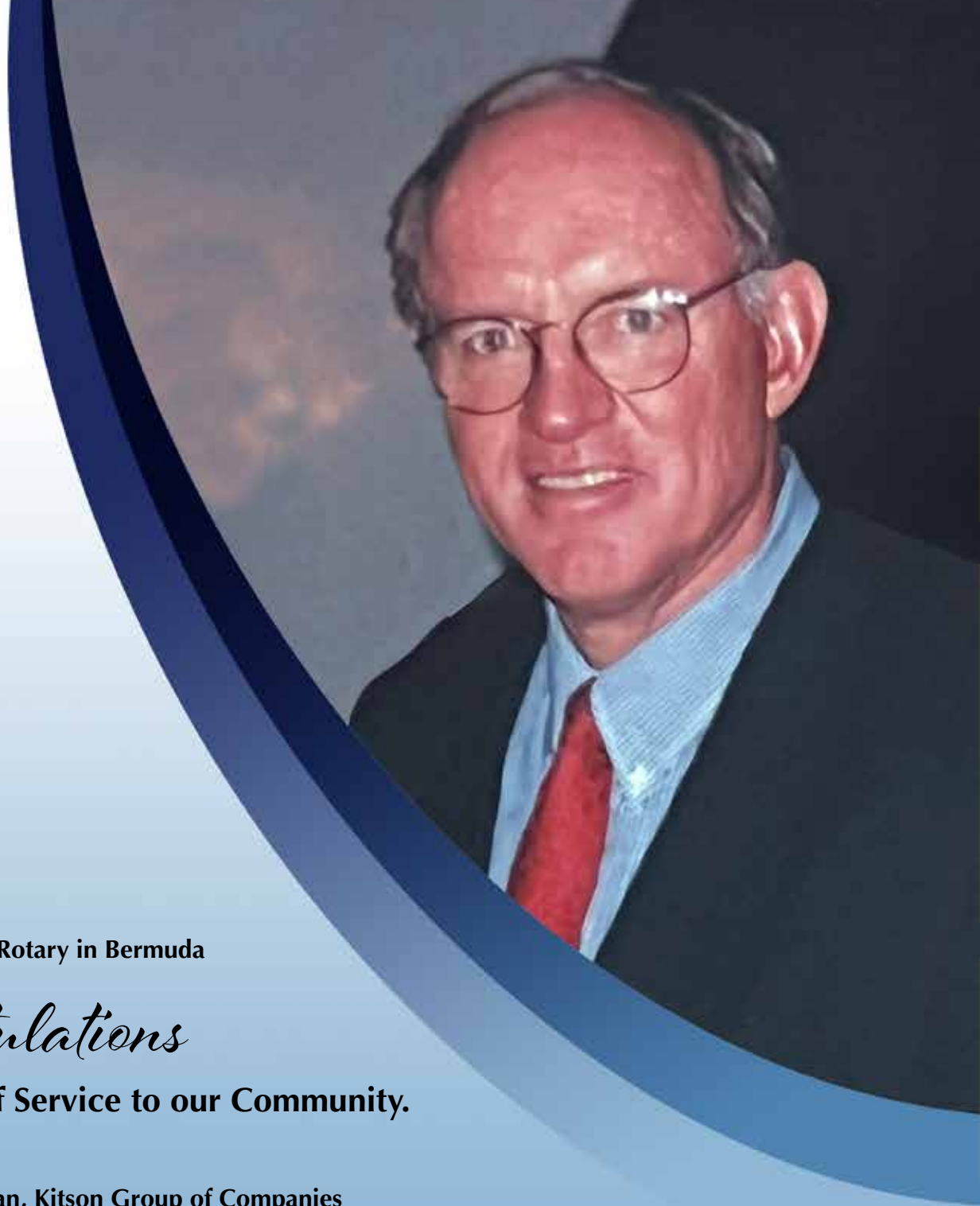

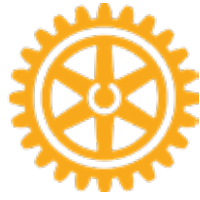

## Object of Rotary

---

*The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:*

- I. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;*
- II. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his/her occupation as an opportunity to serve society;*
- III. The application of the ideal of service by every Rotarian to his/her personal, business and community life;*
- IV The advancement of international understanding, good will, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional Rotarians united in the ideal of service.*

## Introduction

The Bermuda Rotary Clubs' place in Rotary International (RI) is special, if not unique. On this Atlantic island, our 4 clubs with some 104 members form part of an international District 7230, with over 1200 Rotarians in 46 clubs, 9 Rotaract clubs of young adults and 11 Interact clubs comprised of teenagers. The District includes Westchester, the Bronx, Manhattan Island, Staten Island, and Bermuda.

The Bermuda clubs have played important roles in the worldwide organisation that is Rotary International. Indeed, from our Bermuda clubs have come: a President of Rotary International, Jack Davis (1977–78); one of the 3 official RI observers at the inauguration of the United Nations, Director of RI, Sir Stanley Spurling; and the first Executive Director of the PolioPlus programme, Walter Maddocks (1986–88). At the District level, 7 District Governors began their Rotary lives in Bermuda: Sir Stanley Spurling (1940–41); Jack Davis (1961–62); Tom Keill (1968–69); Walter Maddocks (1976–77); Bill Masters (1983–84); David Sullivan (2003–04); Barbara Edwards (2017–18).

Action is at the heart of Rotary. Each club president leads a plan for assisting charities and humanitarian agencies by providing a wide range of support by a variety of means. Every name in the list of Paul Harris Fellows represents a story of contributing to the community. These individuals have been recognised, with an award named after Rotary's Founder. Each club has also sponsored overseas projects in cooperation with a Rotary club near the project site.

At the same time, the Bermuda clubs have periodically combined efforts in support of such agencies as the Salvation Army and the Lady Cubitt Compassionate Association. Perhaps the most apparent example of long-term support of Bermuda's clubs working together is the Rotary International Student Exchange programme, which has been in existence for over half a century. While the clubs have hosted students from a variety of countries from around the world, they have collaborated in sponsoring Bermudian students to spend a year in countries, imbibing cultures, different from their own and learning to speak international languages. These students have testified to their life-changing experiences. Another club-wide investment in developing our young is the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards. It can be said that, if the Rotary clubs did no more than participate in these programmes, the clubs' existence would have been worthwhile.

At the time of Bermuda Rotary's 90th Anniversary in 2014, Bermuda's Rotarians united to erect the four-faced Rotary Clock positioned in the forecourt of Hamilton's City Hall. Each face represents one of the 4 clubs and points to the 4 corners of the globe, thereby representing both local and world-wide ambits of activity. Drawing upon the principles activating Rotarians, the clock also highlights the work of Walter Maddocks, whose massive fund-raising efforts — including from our local clubs — enabled the PolioPlus campaign to support on a grand scale the effort to expunge the polio virus from the Earth.

By working together, Bermuda's Rotarians view with pride the achievements of this century of service. These include the clubs' efforts to reflect in their membership and activities the social changes that have taken place in the communities in which they exist and which they serve. In this centennial year, Bermuda's Rotary clubs will collaborate with other organisations to plant 100 endemic trees, one tree for each year of Rotary's existence in Bermuda — Junipers, Palmettos, and Olivewoods — across these islands. A 17th-century writer, Thomas Fuller, has said that the person who plants trees loves more than himself. Such a sentiment epitomises the efforts of Rotarians to enhance human welfare.

As all service clubs adjust to changing social norms, Rotarians continue to be rewarded in spirit when giving back to their communities and working to enhance peace in the world. The results of the PolioPlus programme exemplify the value of the combined effort of Rotarians under the founding motto: "Service Above Self".

# Bermuda's Grand Old Man

1897 - 1961

## BERMUDA'S GRAND OLD MAN IS DEAD

Bermuda's Grand Old Man, Sir Stanley Spurling, Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George, holder of the Order of the British Empire, died early yesterday afternoon in the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital after suffering two heart attacks.

He was 81 years old. Of him Archbishop Stone and the Rev. Keith Herman, rector of Sir Stanley's parish, St. George's, said yesterday:

"He was one of the great outstanding figures of all Bermuda's history, whose life since the time of his retirement was really the history of Bermuda."

Yesterday evening the Church of England's Synod meeting concluded with a service in respect to Sir Stanley, a man of profound conviction who remained a member of the Synod until the time of his death. The rising was moved by Mr. E. P. T. Tucker, a fellow of St. Peter's, and for many years churchwarden of St. Peter's with Sir Stanley, until Sir Stanley's retirement last year.

When the meeting rose the Bishop, the Rev. A. L. E. Williams, said a prayer for the repose of his soul.

Today, at St. Peter's, at 4 p.m., the Bishop, Archbishop Stone and the Rev. Keith Herman will conduct the funeral service, which is expected to be largely attended.

### FAVOURITE HYMNS

Two of Sir Stanley's favourite hymns, "For the Beauty of the Earth," and "We Love the Place, O Lord," will be sung during the service.

1. The conversion of the old cruiser Charybdis.
2. The arrangement of the Furrows, Wilby contract with Bermuda.
3. The granting of permission to Pan American Airways and Imperial Airways to run a New York-Bermuda service.
4. The holding of the Empire Parliamentary Association conferences in Bermuda in 1922 and 1942.

The conversion of the Charybdis came during the First World War when the s.s. Bermudian, which carried vegetables from Bermuda and brought back mail and supplies, was requisitioned as a troopship. Sir Stanley successfully persuaded the Admiralty to convert the Charybdis into passenger-carrying by removing two of her boilers and most of her cabins, thereby providing 60,000 cubic feet of child-room space which safely took care of Bermuda's supplies for the remainder of the war.

### INVESTIGATION

After the arrival of Sir Stanley, the late Mr. J. P. Hand and the late Mr. A. W. Shaw undertook a lengthy investigation to find a shipping firm which would run regularly to Bermuda. Finally they were able to come to satisfactory terms with Furrows, Wilby, which has served the Island ever since.

When Pan American Airways asked permission to operate between Bermuda and New York,

Sir Stanley advised that permission be granted, with the proviso that Imperial Airways be given the same facilities. This was the start of a regular air service to Bermuda — an air service which today brings the bulk of the Island's visitors.

Sir Stanley was most proud of the 1944 Parliamentary Conference, because at the conference members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives attended as observers for the first time — a practice followed ever since.

### INVITATIONS

At his suggestions invitations were sent by the President of the Legislative Council to the President of the Senate (the Vice-President of the United States), and by the Speaker of the House of Assembly to the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Sir Stanley was born on August 3, 1879 on Banjo Island, St. George's. He was christened Salisbury after the Prime Minister of England, and Stanley after the great African explorer, his father believing that a man's name could influence his career. At the age of 14 he was told that his school days were over, but, on protesting, he was allowed to continue at Saltus Grammar School if he could pay his fees. This he did by working at night in a grocery store. He bicycled every day from St. George's to school, but this did not prevent his taking full part in the sports at school, for he was captain of the football team. His nicknames were "Salt Bag" and "Big Duke," the latter referring to his size.

Leaving school at the age of 18, he spent a year with the shipping firm of William Meyer & Co., afterwards proceeding to the United States, working his way on John V. Astor's yacht, and then working for Western Electric. The illness of his father brought him back to Bermuda in 1899, and two years later, when his father's death left a vacancy in the House of Assembly, he became the youngest man ever elected to the House. He held his seat continuously until 1942, a period of 41 years.

### INTERVAL

The interval came in 1912 when Sir Stanley was burnt in effigy in Market Square. The incident occurred soon after dredging started in for the Town Cut channel into St. George's Harbour. St. George's had agitated for the channel for years. At last it was under way.

Then the s.s. Duart Castle ran aground on a reef in Hamilton Harbour. Sir Stanley proposed that the dredger be diverted to remove the shoal, which was proving a danger to shipping.

This did not please the St. Georgians, and Sir Stanley, having been burnt in effigy, lost his seat. He regained it a few years later.

Sir Stanley served on the Executive Council from 1914 to 1920, and again from 1925 to 1931. In 1942 he was appointed to the Legislative Council, and had a six-year term. He also saw service on a large number of Government Boards.

He received the Order of the British Empire in 1918, was made a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George in 1925, and received his knighthood in 1935.

In 1938 he was chairman of a Colonial Customs Conference in Bermuda, and the following year was chairman of a similar conference in Jamaica. The conference achieved a standardisation of customs shipping forms for the colonial empire.

Sir Stanley was an ardent Rotarian. His highest honour came in 1932 when, having been a member of the organisation for 28 years, he was elected one of the 14 directors of Rotary International. Previously he had been a Rotary governor, and president of the Hamilton Rotary Club. Another major interest in Sir Stanley's life was Freemasonry, and at one time he was superintendent of Scottish Freemasonry in Bermuda.

Sir Stanley was also active in business, and was managing director of the Bermuda Electric Light, Power and Traction Co. (as it was until recently) for many years. During his life he served on the boards of the Bermuda Fire and Marine Co., Ltd., the Bank of Bermuda Ltd., the Bermuda Telephone Co., Ltd., the Bermuda Transportation Co., Ltd. and the Bermuda Railway Co., Ltd.

### PATRON

At the time of his death Sir Stanley was honorary patron of the Royal Commonwealth Society, in which he had been the moving spirit for most of his life. Up to last year he had been president of the society — a post he had held for many years. He then retired as president, but remained on the council of the Bermuda branch. At the annual general meeting of the society in early December he retired from the council, and was made honorary patron.

He believed strongly in Anglo-American relations, and was active in the English-Speaking Union. Interested in painting, he helped found the Bermuda Society of Arts. Another interest was the Lady Cubitt Compassionate Association, of which he was a patron at the time of his death.

Although he retired last year as a churchwarden of St. Peter's, Sir Stanley was a member of the Synod at the time of his death. He had been a member of the Synod for about 40 years, and had been a member of a delegation to the Archbishop of Canterbury, which urged that Bermuda, instead of being linked with Newfoundland, become a separate diocese, and that the Rev. Arthur Heber Browne become its first Bishop.

### ST. GEORGE'S HOUSE

Sir Stanley lived with his wife, a native of Somerset, England, in the house that he built in St. George's just after their marriage in 1904. He had two sons and two daughters. The elder son, Stewart Grenville, died in 1955.

The younger son, the Hon. Arthur Dudley Spurling, M.C.P., is a barrister with the firm of Appleby, Spurling & Kempe. His two daughters are Mrs. Alexander Fuge and Mrs. Gray Robinson.

Lady Spurling, before their marriage, was Frances Ellen, daughter of John Gush of Langport, Somerset, England.

An active man physically as well as in the affairs of the Colony, Sir Stanley's chief recreational sport in his younger years was golf. Before the railway was started in the Colony, however, he used often to cycle from St. George's to Hamilton and back again twice a day. On some occasions his business would take him all the way to Somerset so that by the end of the day he would have covered some 40 miles by pedal cycle. The speedometer on his bicycle never totalled less than 10,000 miles in a year and often went as high as 12,000 or 13,000 miles.

In the interview in 1956 Sir Stanley said of himself: "It has been a wonderful life — I feel I have not deserved it, but I have enjoyed it all."

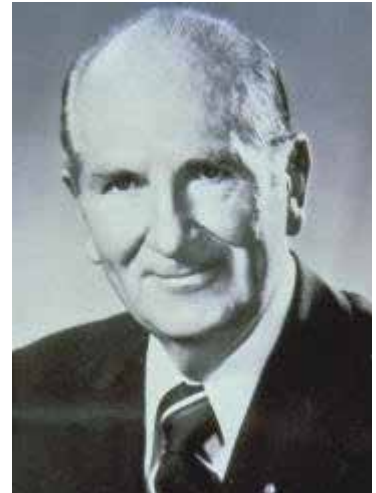

## W. Jack Davis: uncommon international leader

*Jack Davis – Rotary International President 1977-78, “Serve to Unite Mankind”*

**Jack Davis of Hamilton, Bermuda, Rotary’s President elect for 1977–78, was a director of The Bank of N.T. Butterfield & Son, Ltd, and retired senior partner in the firm of Pearman, Watlington & Company, which operates retail stores, automobile distribution and a Hamilton engineering firm. Born in Canada, he was educated there and in the United States. He is chairman of the Advisory Architectural Panel of the Bermuda, a founder trustee of The Willowbank Foundation and The Heydon Foundation, and a founding member of the Salvation Army Advisory Board in Bermuda.**



An article by Rex Webster with this title appeared in *The Rotarian* (July, 1977), as Jack Davis was about to commence his presidency of Rotary International. “Jack”, as he was always known, became a worldly and widely travelled man by virtue of his business and Rotary activities. Since the age of 22 years, he had made his home in these tiny Atlantic islands of Bermuda, though he had originated in the Canadian province of Ontario. He was born in 1911 in the small farming community of Foxboro near the city of Belleville. His father, Cornelius, ran a mixed farm; from an early age, therefore, Jack knew what it was to do his chores before and after school. He walked to and from school, loved sports and was active in scouting. Hard work and active participation were integral to his persona and view of the world.

Jack went on from his Belleville home and schools to attend the Rochester Business Institute in upstate New York. During his educational breaks, he worked at a tourist resort, named “Honeymoon Cottage”, near Niagara Falls in Ontario. The Bermudian owner, Charles Burland, was impressed and, in 1930, invited him to visit him in Bermuda. Here he met J. Hartley Watlington — who had been one of the 1924 charter members of the Hamilton Rotary Club — and was invited to join the staff of the Bermuda Transportation Company, a subsidiary of Pearman, Watlington & Company. Jack had arrived intending upon a short stay, but he decided to stay longer. Within a few years he was married to Doris Aubrey. Thus, with the year 1931 began his

business career, spanning some 30 years, which would lead in 1946 to a partnership in the firm and, during which time, his expansion of the interests would take him around the world.

Jack Davis was also a religiously devout man. He became much involved in the affairs of the Wesley Methodist Church, not merely as a member but also as a trustee and steward. He was also a founder trustee of The Willowbank Foundation and the Heydon Foundation, organizations devoted to counselling and the Christian mission. Jack's Christian spirit underpinned his devotion to serving humanity through service.

Jack joined the Hamilton Rotary Club in 1943. Soon an active member of club committees and participant in projects, he was elected president in 1948–49. By 1961–62, his work had expanded to include his election as Governor of Rotary District 723(0). There followed his becoming a Director of Rotary International (1968–70) and the organisation's Third Vice-President (1969–70). That led to deep involvement in the world-wide activity of R.I. In succession, he served as a presidential aide (1970–72), member of the presidential nominating committee (1973–74), and a member and chairman of R.I.'s planning committee (1971–74). During those years, Jack's travels on business and Rotary affairs took him to over 40 countries; and he served as a representative for the president of R.I in 7 countries.

On commencing his presidential term, Jack Davis chose the theme "Serve to Unite Mankind". At the 1978 Rotary International Convention held in Tokyo, Jack initiated the "Health, Hunger and Humanity (3H)" programme. Grants of \$100K to 500K funded projects that sought to bring groups together on the advancement of human welfare. One of the earliest such grants was to support a project to inoculate children in the Philippines against the polio virus. This project effectively became the precursor of the PolioPlus programme, with which another Bermudian Rotarian, Walter Maddocks, became intimately associated.

After Jack's death (1 April, 1981), a Rotary International Marker was raised at his birthplace in Foxboro, Ontario, as a memorial to his 38 years of Rotary service. At the Rotary Peace Park in Melbourne, Australia, Jack Davis is remembered with other past presidents of Rotary International (beginning in 1935) with a memorial tree, a Red Ironbark. It symbolizes "strength and continuity", thus representing Jack Davis' dedication to uniting mankind through service. In Bermuda, the Rotary clubs funded the "Jack Davis Student Pavilion", an accommodation and research facility for visiting marine archaeology students at the then Bermuda Maritime Museum complex at the Royal Naval Dockyard.

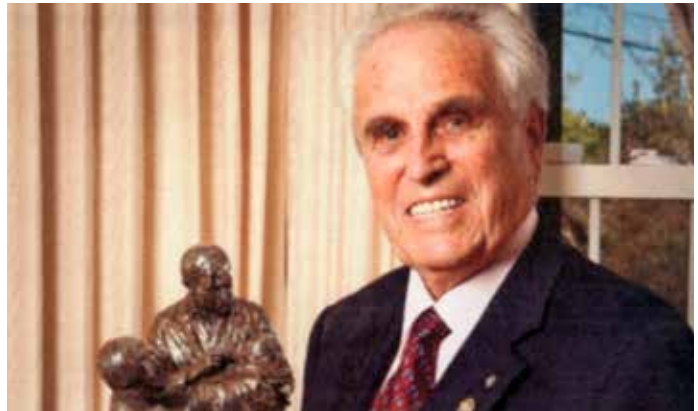


## Walter Maddocks: One of a Kind

Jonas Salk made history in 1955 when he created a vaccine to rid the world of polio, and by the late 1970s the disease was virtually eradicated in the United States. But it would take an army of volunteers to rid other nations of its devastating disease. Bermuda resident Walter Maddocks became one such soldier in the war against polio 1986.

At the time, he and his wife were living a serene life on a Kentucky farm, relatively unaware that the disease was still ravaging populations in Africa and Asia. Then a member of his Rotary group requested Maddocks to give up the lovely life he had been living in the U.S. in order to better the lives of others elsewhere. It would mean a two-year commitment, geographical relocation, international travel, relentless fundraising and no pay.



Maddock's wife, Margaret, was uncertain. "She said, 'Oh, we couldn't do that, the farm is too busy.'" Remembers Maddocks. "Then there was a long pause and she said, 'It's too important to say no, isn't it'?" He agreed and thus began a two-year journey that he accepted with determination and without complaint.

"Ninety-two percent of polio occurs in children under 3 years of age," says Maddocks, "And if you've seen the pictures of these horribly deformed children, you wouldn't need to ask why. As Margaret said, "it's just too important to say no."

As the new executive director of Rotary's first international polio immunization program, Polio Plus, the couple moved from their beloved Southern mansion to Rotary headquarters in Illinois. From there Maddocks travelled to 12 countries and countless cities pleading his case and asking for money to help protect children against polio.

Bill and Melinda Gates were just some of the people who generously contributed to the effort to eradicate the disease. Rotary clubs themselves were prime targets for Maddocks's speeches and requests. "are you the stupid bugger who thinks we can raise that kind of money?" asked one Rotarian, according to Maddocks. Another San Francisco Rotary member complained to Maddocks that his band of organizations could only raise \$7 million of its \$9 million goal. Maddocks flew to San Francisco at once to rally the troops and left with an inspired group that eventually raised more than they ever thought possible: \$10 million.

That contribution helped Maddocks exceed his own international fundraising projections for the entire two-year campaign. "We set a goal of \$120 million," says Maddocks. By 1988-, two and one half years after the campaign began, he had raised over \$264 million. That colossal amount of money funded vaccination programmes all over the world and saved the lives of thousands of children. "There were 355,000 cases the year before we started. That was down to 2,500 last year," says Maddocks.

But a handful of countries including India, Egypt and Nigeria are still reporting cases of polio, which means immunization efforts started by Maddocks in 1986 are still going on today.

While Maddocks has spent many years of his life in the fight against polio, another disease has claimed his attention. "I don't know what kind of cancer I've got. I just know I have cancer," says Maddocks. No complaint. Just fact.

Walter Maddocks is a fighter. Smart money is on him, He' determined and devoted to his beliefs. As a Rotarian for 50 years, he supports the organization's philosophy of volunteerism and has instilled that belief in his family. His wife says, about one of their daughters, "She knew the mantra of Rotary before she knew the Lord's Prayer," says Margaret Maddocks.

Through Rotary, Maddocks leaves a legacy that has helped thousands of people all over the world and still does today. But he shuns the spotlight. "Rotary is not about individuals. It's about the organization and the service it provides. The less we can emphasize the individual the better."

Rotarians made an exception for Walter Maddocks. They produced a one-of-a-kind bronze statue for a one-of-a-kind member. Which depicts a Rotarian administering vaccine drops to little children. "They had never done that before," says Maddocks. "it was quite special." And so was Walter Maddocks.

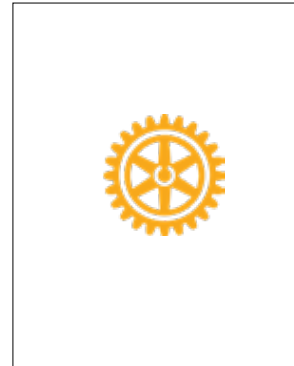

## Rotary Club of Hamilton

Rotary began in Bermuda with the formation of the Bermuda (later Hamilton) Rotary Club.

This club, number 1674, was chartered on 15th March, 1924. The origins arise out of the work in 1923 of John H. Troy, a member of the Rotary Club of New Rochelle. As the special representative of the President of Rotary International, he met with interested members of Hamilton's business leaders and the professions who instituted themselves as a club on 6th February, 1924, with 26 charter members.

On 14<sup>th</sup> January, 1925, at a regular meeting of the club at The Hamilton Hotel, John Troy presented the club both with the charter and a splendid gift from the New Rochelle Rotary Club. This was the magnificent bronze call bell that is in use to this day. It is embossed with the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes, the coats of arms of Bermuda and New Rochelle and various symbols, including Bermuda's lily, to signify the international nature of the Rotary District (now #7230) to which we belong.

Within two years of the founding, the club was signally honoured with the visit on 16<sup>th</sup> January, 1926, by the founder of Rotary International, Paul Harris. Beginning with the nomination of Jack Davis in 1968, the club has named more than 170 Paul Harris Fellows in recognition of their significant contributions to the local community. The club has been visited by one other President of RI, Nitish C. Laharry, in October, 1962.

The club has made notable contributions to the District. Five District Governors coming from Bermuda have been members and Past Presidents of the Hamilton club: Sir Stanley Spurling (1940-41); Jack Davis (1960-61); Tom Keill (1968-69); Walter Maddocks (1976-77); and Bill Masters (1983-84). Sir Stanley Spurling, Jack Davis and Walter Maddocks have also distinguished records in Rotary International.

The Hamilton Rotary Club is proud to have sponsored Bermuda's three other Rotary clubs: St. George's (chartered 18th June, 1951); Sandys (25th March, 1972); and Pembroke (18th May, 1981). As Bermuda's oldest "traditional" club, our members continue to meet at midday, originally at the Hamilton Hotel, then at the Bermudiana and Princess Hotels, and now at the Royal Hamilton Amateur Dinghy Club overlooking Hamilton Harbour.

In 1984, Hamilton Rotary Club was the first of the Bermuda clubs to invite a woman to become an active member. Our first lady president was elected in 2003, since which there have been more women leading the club. Interact clubs for young people have been successfully revived and are active in the secondary schools. The ongoing history of supporting youth development programmes continues through active participation in both the Rotary International Student Exchange programme and the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA). Support for the further education of young Bermudians remains important. The Ted Crawford Scholarship in Mathematics and Information Technology is a full two-year award tenable at the Bermuda College. It is named after a former Rotarian and Head of the Bermuda Technical Institute. Further, with funds derived from repaid loans to students provided by the Rotary Student Loan Fund (now discontinued), new financial aid programmes are being developed.

The club remains noted for the longstanding tradition of broadcasting the presentations of invited speakers on topical and pertinent issues in Bermuda, as an important community service for the interest and benefit of the public at large. In addition to participation in Keep Bermuda Beautiful litter-clearing events, Rotarians of this club in recent years donated time, energy and resources to the revival of the Agricultural Show as well as to club events such as "Walk a Mile with Your Child", fund-raisers like an "International Night" and "Casino Night", and a 10K run/walk to finance insulin monitors for children with diabetes. Since 1924, the club has assisted many of Bermuda's charitable and welfare agencies with contributions towards their work with needed funds and manpower. The club has also regularly sponsored humanitarian projects overseas, most recently in India and Uganda.

Thomas Haskins Davis was the only known surviving Charter member when the Club celebrated its 50th anniversary in June 2001.

## Rotary Club of Sandys

The Rotary Club of Sandys, Bermuda formed in May of 1972, with 20 members under the leadership of its Charter President C. L. 'Jimmy' Vallis.

The third of Bermuda's four clubs to be formed, from the outset Sandys Rotary was a pioneer for events that became known throughout the island, and the District. Some of these survive to this day, though under the auspices of other organizations.

Many will remember the annual Motorcycle Gymkhana, which provided Bermudians over a 9-year period the opportunity for a self-deprecating laugh at us and our friends.

In the early eighties Sandy's Rotary established the often copied 'Super Raffle', arranging two - one of \$50,000 and a subsequent \$25,000 effort.

Other events, that did not endure but were very successful at the time, include the annual 'Blowhard' Sailing Regatta - which brought all of Bermuda's clubs together for a day of fun, competitive sailing; the Sandys Strollers (our own wandering minstrels), the Longest Golf Drive Competition. Many of us will never forget, the two international Circus events

- which alone generated some \$370,000.00 of fund-raising, and were seen, collectively, by over half of Bermuda's population!

Bermuda was intrigued by our efforts to make ice in January of 1991. We prevailed, however, allowing the Ice Show to proceed (a first and only!). The Club's Carnival another first - complete with a Ferris Wheel, Bumper Cars and the like, on White Hill Field was another challenge. The untimely death of the overseas promoter, the night before we opened a three week Carnival, did not deter our membership to raise \$80,000 for scholarships and deserving charities throughout Bermuda.

We gave Daniel's Head its 'hair', with new Casuarinas plantings. We have had a long association with Sandys Secondary School - playing them in, of all things, a one-sided soccer match, and also hosting their seniors for a vocational outing on Darrell's Island. Our club is the only organization to have honoured, with gala banquets, Bermuda's local craftsmen, in the persons of Mr. Bert Darrell, Mr. Alfred Birdsey, Mr. John Davis and Mr.

Hubert Smith.

Without the efforts of Sandys Rotary, who would know that the following events survive to this day:

- The Annual East/ West Soccer Match (first organized at the National Stadium).
- Good Friday Kite Flying (first put on by the Club at Whale Bay).
- The Annual Teacher Awards (established by the club held at the Sonesta Beach).
- The Jazz Fest (organized staging/seating and ticket sales for the inaugural event).
- The XL Tennis Tournament (we do the parking).
- Our annual Christmas Party (originally with Santa Claus and the Police Choir).

These Community and Vocational Service events have allowed our club to support the Packwood Home, the Sandys Rest Home, Sandys Secondary School, Warwick Academy and Warwick Secondary Schools, Agape House, the King Edward Hospital, The Sandys Community Center, various other schools, and organizations, and numerous individuals, in the furtherance of their activities and goals.

Our club is the driving force behind the Rotary Youth Exchange, Group Study Exchange and Youth Leadership Awards programs in Bermuda. Partnering over the years with private industry the Rotary Youth Exchange Program has benefitted from their generous sponsorship. This partnership has allowed for over 100 young people from Bermuda to go overseas for a year of academic & cultural exchange, and Bermuda has reciprocated the same number of foreign students exchanging to our island!

We have been active in International Service - sponsoring humanitarian programs in Haiti, Africa, Guatemala, Uganda, and sending a Rotarian work crew to Brazil to help construct a soup kitchen in the town of Birigui.

To culminate many of our achievements, our Club was able to offer one of its members for service with Rotary International. David J. Sullivan (Sully) a Rotarian from our club is the Past Governor for our District 7230! He lead 47 Clubs and over 1,800 Rotarians from New York and Bermuda. DG Sully, along with his wife and family, has taken our club's entrepreneurial spirit of camaraderie, friendship and Rotary fellowship throughout the District & Rotary International for the past twenty years.

Not bad for a bunch of bye's from the Parishes!!!

## Rotary Club of Pembroke

The Pembroke Rotary Club was formed as a consequence of several members from Hamilton Club seeing the need to establish a Breakfast club in Bermuda. On December 16th 1980, The Hamilton Rotary Club approved the organization of an additional club within its territorial limits. The committee was made up of our then District Governor Eddie Berger along with then Hamilton members, Bryan Gibbons (referred to as our Godfather), Bill Masters, Ed Rego, Danny Mannus, Owen Darrell and Walter Maddocks.

On March 12th 1981, a meeting was held at the Rum Runners restaurant by the steering committee and a nucleus of new members. At that meeting the Rum Runners was confirmed as the weekly meeting place on Thursday mornings commencing at 7.30AM. In order to establish the club in its own right, a minimum membership of 20 was required, whilst at that point there were only 10 prospective members in attendance.

On March 19th 1981, at the club's third meeting it was agreed that the club would be called the Pembroke Rotary club. The total attendance at that meeting was 25 of which 17 signed membership forms and by the next meeting, an application for membership in Rotary International was completed with 32 charter members.

The Club received its Charter on May 12, 1981 and was officially presented to the Club by then District Governor Alan Nemlich of Scarsdale, NY on July 25th 1981.

The first president was Leonard O. Gibbons, who went on to serve as Chamber of Commerce President , a Member of Parliament and Minister of Government..

After a ballot taken during our first meeting, it was decided to name from several names put forward, a weekly chronicle called The Pembroke Rotary Chronicle.

Over the years, Pembroke Rotary has gone from strength to strength while members have come and gone. Today, only 4 charter members are still with the club with Past Presidents John Kessaram and Delano Ingham maintaining 100% attendance for the entire period.

The Club has been involved in numerous projects over the years and one of its most notable community events was the building of a Geriatric garden at the Hospital. At the club's beginnings, it had the Haven and the Adult Education School as its "Pet" project for providing assistance. The club assists several local charities with their fund raising by volunteering annually to sell tags on their tag day.

For fund raising, a 'fines' mechanism was set up where members were made to pay whenever their name appeared in public news or they spoke of another member.

The club built a fitness park at Admiralty House, planted cedar trees, annually cleaned Fern Island, In addition it hosted visitors from the Rotary District and other organizations with Home Hospitality where the club received monetary donations for each person a member hosted for dinner. The list of projects goes on.

Eventually, we started to put on an annual Childrens' Fair which the club called "The Childrens' Sesame Street Fair". Because

of copy-right, we were forced to change the name to The Street Fair. As it turns out, this fair continues to be a great success up to the present. In recent years the Fair has grossed approximately \$130,000, the proceeds of which has gone to assist various schools and Rotary projects.

The club has been involved, off and on, in the Rotary Youth Exchange program with Timothy McKittrick as its first outbound student. With a \$10,000 donation from one of the club members, an interest free loan was set up for students wishing to further their studies. The club was able to build this fund to over \$30,000.

The club was involved with Polio Plus, Plant a Tree on Me, Operation Milk Flow and, most recently, arranged for Generators to be set up in Hati.

The club has presented more than 90 Paul Harris Fellow Awards to date and continues to look for projects to satisfy the ideals of Rotary International.

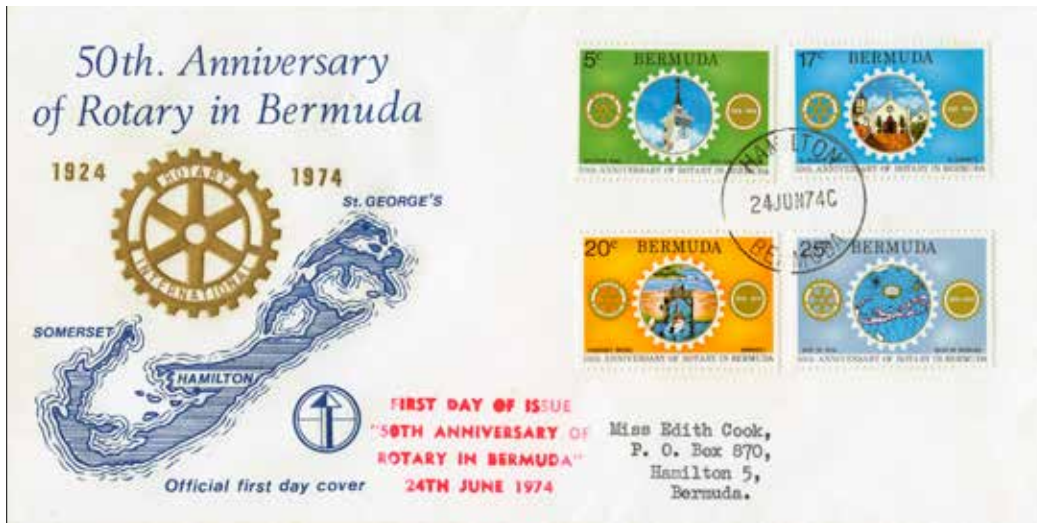

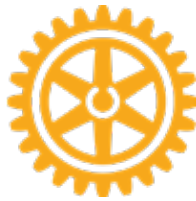

From the earliest days of the organization, Rotarians were concerned with promoting high ethical standards in their professional lives. One of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is The 4-Way Test, which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor (who later served as RI president) when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy. This 24-word test for employees to follow in their business and professional lives became the guide for sales, production, advertising, and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary in 1943, The 4-Way Test has been translated into more than a hundred languages and published in thousands of ways. It asks the following four questions:
