Duties: This is a mentoring program partnership with SFCC that helps in the transformation of mentees back into the work force in the Displaced Homemakers Program and into new fields of interest and new professions through an AARP/Walmart Grant. Time commitment is six hours over a five-month period.

Santa Fe College Speakers Series

Duties: This committee will enlist Rotarians to serve as speakers for Santa Fe College's Annual Fall Leadership Series October 2014. It will fill requests for profession based speakers for Santa Fe College student organizations on a continuing basis. These speakers can also serve as mentors and resources for individuals in the student organizations

Youth Speakers Committee

Reports to: Vocational Service Chair

Duties: This committee organizes and promotes a local speech contest at the high school level. The topic is decided by the committee and includes the application of one or more of the principles of Rotary. By providing an opportunity for student speakers to improve their speaking abilities, this effort recognizes the best as encouragement to all. The committee selects a topic, promotes the contest, and arranges for qualified judges to select three finalists. The finalists are judged, and a winner selected, at a regular luncheon meeting in October.
