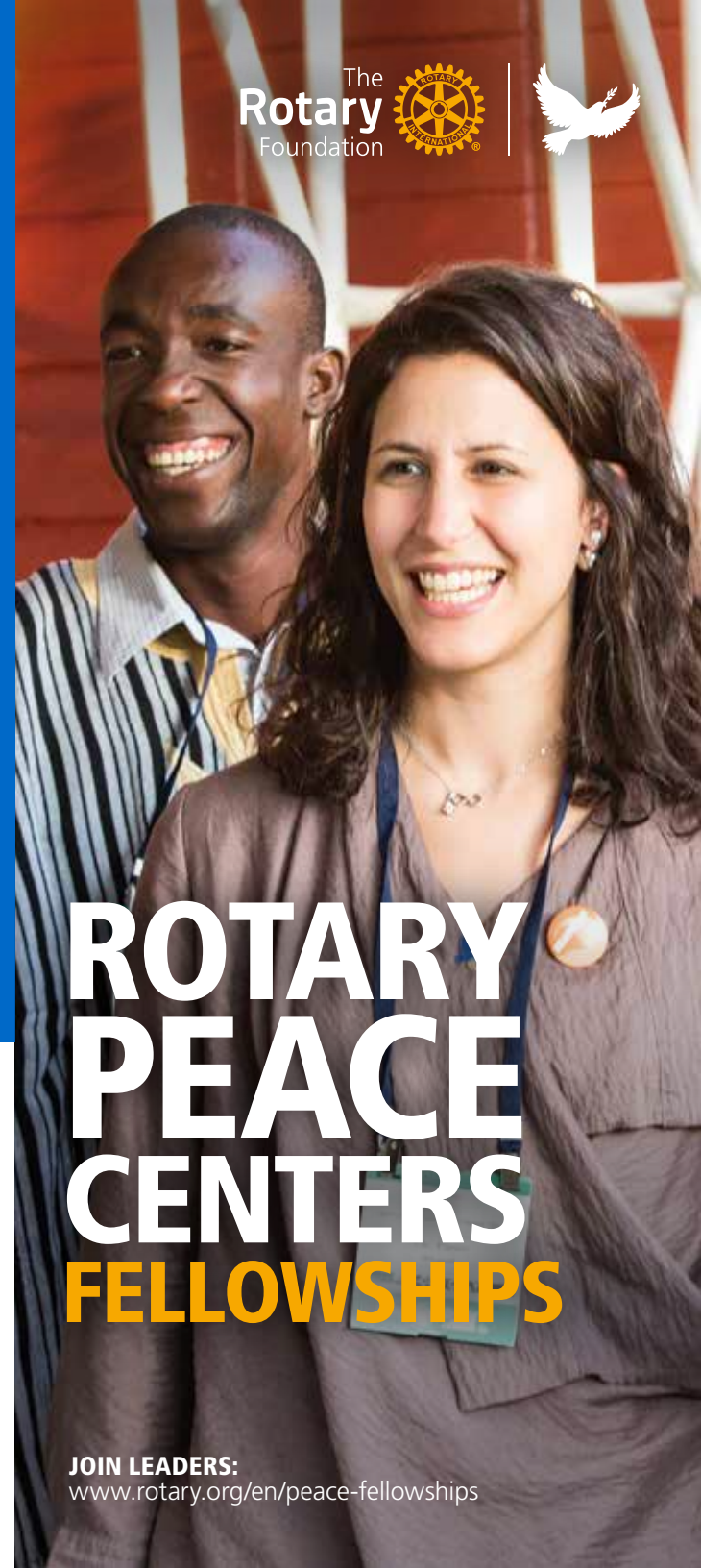

THE FELLOWSHIP

Up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 50 for professional development certificates are awarded annually for study at premier universities around the world.

The Rotary Peace Fellowship includes:

- Tuition and fees
- Room and board
- Round-trip transportation
- Internship/field study expenses

OUR PROGRAMS

Each Rotary Peace Center offers a unique curriculum and field-based learning opportunities that examine peace and conflict theory in various contexts.

Master's degree program:

- 15 to 24 months
- 2-3 month self-designed applied field experience
- Final thesis

Professional development certificate:

- 3-month program
- Intensive interdisciplinary coursework with expert lecturers
- Domestic and international field studies

ELIGIBILITY

Qualified candidates have:

- For the master's program, a bachelor's degree or equivalent, plus three years of full-time related work experience
- For the certificate program, a strong academic background, plus five years of full-time related work experience
- Proficiency in English
- For the master's program, proficiency in a second language (strongly recommended)
- Excellent leadership skills

HOW TO APPLY

Rotary Peace Fellows are selected through a competitive worldwide process.

- 1 Review the application and apply by 31 May at www.rotary.org/en/peace-fellowships.
- 2 Contact a Rotary district for endorsement, which includes an interview. District endorsement is due to Rotary International by 1 July.
- 3 Once selected, master's fellowship recipients apply separately for university admission.

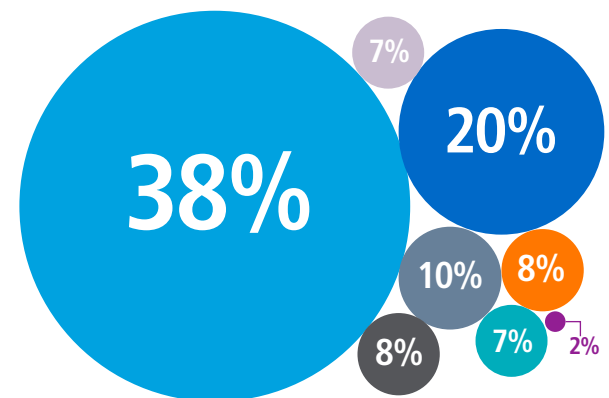
