by Past President Mark Griffith Sr. We still sing that darn song.


Announcements- Dorothy encouraged us to buy tickets to the Eileen

Program- Zika Virus by Jonathan Bellush, Club Scientist



Of course we can't recap the entire program, you had to be there, but here are some facts we learned:

Zika is a virus, it needs a host (human, mosquito) to live in. Without a host a virus cannot survive.


Symptoms- very few, sometimes

none, but often slight fever, sore throat, sore muscles and joints.

Women who have recovered from Zika virus infection appear to be immune. While it

sounds like it would be easy to develop a vaccine like Salk's 1952 successful polio vaccine, this is not an easy feat. If it was, explained Jonathan, we would already have an effective HIV or cancer vaccine. (Albert Sabin produced the first permanent oral polio vaccine in 1963, right across the street, at Lederle Labs in Pearl River).

Currently, in addition to no vaccine, there is no treatment for Zika.



Of babies born with Zika infection, 20% may appear normal. Microcephaly is only one of the results of the disease.

Men may carry the disease and infect their partners through sex, long after exposure. The WHO recommends men abstain from sex or use condoms for six months after exposure in Zika prone areas.

50% of all pregnancies worldwide are unplanned greatly raising the risk of unintended Zika infection of babies.

Zika was first discovered in 1945.

The virus was first isolated in April 1947 from a rhesus macaque monkey that had been placed in a cage in the Zika Forest of Uganda, near Lake Victoria, by the scientists of the Yellow Fever Research Institute. A second isolation from the mosquito A. africanus



followed at the same site in January 1948.

Efforts to combat Zika are currently aimed at reducing mosquito transmission. Aside from targeting mosquito breeding areas, releasing sterilized male mosquitos is being tested. Another method being explored by a Cornel lab is releasing male mosquitos infected with a bacterium, Wolbachia pipientis. When these males

mate with local females, the females pick up Wolbachia which causes them to lay eggs that will not hatch.

Unfortunately, Aedes species mosquitos, the ones that transmit Zika (Aedes aegypti and albopictus), quickly develop insecticide resistance making spraying much less effective. Aedes aegypti are common in California and while no local cases of Zika have been reported there is concern about returning travelers from the Olympics in Brazil and other "hot spots".
