Humanitarian Grants Program

The Humanitarian Grants Program provides grants to fund club and district service projects in local and international communities.





Humanitarian Grants Program

Matching Grants support international service projects involving Rotary clubs or districts in two or more countries.

Volunteer Service Grants subsidize travel for humanitarian service in Rotary countries.

District Simplified Grants support short-term humanitarian projects that benefit the community.

Health, Hunger, and Humanity Grants (3-H) fund long-term, self-help, and grassroots development projects.



SHARE

SHARE is the system which districts use to participate in Rotary Foundation programs.

Each district's contributions to the Annual Programs Fund are split, with 50 percent going to the district (District Designated Fund), which can be spent on programs of the district's choice, and 50 percent going to The Rotary Foundation (World Fund), which funds programs for which every district may apply.
