Speaker: Ross Siragusa, III

Ross, AKA Mr. Ketchup, is the Head of Global Agriculture and Seed at Kraft *Heinz* Company. Siragusa is based out of Kraft Heinz's office in Stockton, California, and has been head of global agriculture and seed for the company since 2008. He also was director of global agriculture for the then HJ Heinz from 2008 to 2013. In addition, Siragusa previously served as president of the California Tomato Growers Association from 2004 to 2008.

Ross told us that each acre of a field will produce about 60 tons of tomatoes. That's up from about 40 tons per acre just 15 years ago. The tomatoes themselves are a mix of tomato varieties that are specially bred to produce red, thick ketchup.

A mechanical harvester approaches at the pace of a brisk walk. It's a giant factory on wheels. It collects the tomato plants, shakes fruit loose from the vines, and sends a stream of bright red tomatoes into a big truck driving alongside. Within a day, a processing plant in Los Banos will turn these tomatoes into paste. Weeks or even months later, the paste will become the central ingredient in ketchup.

Now none of this can happen unless you have the perfect plants to make ketchup! This is where Ross and his team really shine. The development of the perfect seeds is Ross's passion. Seed development is key to making the very best end product. They use no GMO in their product and it takes five years to produce one new seed type.
