In 1985 the Saint John's Shelter was established 30-day emergency а shelter to 20 women saint john's and their children, once



sleeping on the front steps of St. John's Lutheran Church in Sacramento. Growing and evolving from those humble beginnings, the Saint John's Program for Real Change now has an extensive program that can serve up to 270 formerly homeless women and children. They provide a comprehensive and integrated continuum of care for women in crisis and their children. The program provides housing, mental health services, life skills training, educational programs, employment training, child care & support. The mission at Saint John's is to "unleash the potential of women and children in crisis by breaking the cycle of poverty and dependence, one family at a time." As part of the employment training program, St. John's formed a restaurant, Plates, at their Business Park campus. With the pandemic in 2020, the restaurant was shuddered but they now provide catering services and Red Door Desserts, selling boxes of cookies for order. Proceeds from these programs directly support homeless women working to build self-sustaining lives for them and their children. Order cookies now. The Point West Rotary club has do-



nated \$9700 for the purchase of high chairs, outdoor storage shed and improvements to their playground.
