## **Vocational Service Awards**

VOCATIONAL SERVICE MONTH ends tomorrow. We can look back on another highly successful Brown Bag DineAround, and forward to today's Vocational Service Award winners, who exemplify this important Avenue of Service. Vocation plays an important role for Rotarians <u>throughout</u> the year — especially in our commitment to ethics. Rotary's *Four Way Test* and the *Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions* service as our guides to ethical behavior.

The **Four-Way Test** was conceived in 1932 by Herbert J. Taylor, a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago and RI president, 1954-55. Assigned the task of saving a company from bankruptcy, Taylor developed the test as an ethical guide to follow in all business matters. The company's survival was credited to this simple philosophy, which was adopted by RI in 1934.

The **Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions** was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for (<u>Object of Rotary</u>).



As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

- Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

# New auction payment process available this year

The goal is to speed up the receipt of money for the Foundation, save the club credit card fees, make certain everyone has their 2012 tax forms in a timely manner – and speed up the check-out process, as well (as long as you keep track of your auction winnings!).

### **New Polio Plus initiative**

In addition to our Rotary Foundation goal, our club has committed to raise a total of \$2,000 for the "Polio Plus" drive, RI's international initiative to eradicate polio. Starting this week, we will have sheets of 20/45-cent



"Stamp out Polio" stamps available for purchase for a minimum contribution of \$25 per sheet. The stamps may be used as postage, or the sheet may be kept as a collectors' item. We hope to raise \$700 through this effort after recouping the cost of the sheets, all of which will go to Polio Plus. Beginning this week, our \$50 speaker fee, and our split the pot raffle will be directed to Polio Plus.
